
#### Cover look

aking in a bird's eye view of the colours that are currently capturing our attention, you might not think that a whole lot has changed in the colour forecast – and you wouldn't be completely wrong, either. Many of the key trends that have been in fashion for years have stuck around, though it's their subtle transformations that are important to take note of if you're looking to incorporate the most fashionable shades into your spaces.

Almost universally, the hues whose popularity has held fast have been steadily evolving from their fully chromatic selves into more hushed, greyer variations – but that doesn't mean there aren't still a couple of surprising new trends beginning to take shape.

#### Spice is nice


Show-stopping bright reds were having a moment last year, but the trend has shifted sharply and swiftly toward ruddier variations. Now, its terracotta ranging from slightly lighter Resene Sunbaked and Resene Santa Fe to browner Resene Moccasin and Resene Raging Bull that have become the hottest trending hues around – and their popularity is only heating up. Try these spicy shades with desert pinks, beigey blushes or earthy olives like Resene Just Dance, Resene Despacito and Resene Untamed balanced with toasted browns like Resene Swiss Caramel and Resene Sambuca for a scorching hot look that's the epitome of what's 'in'.



# a stroke of genius

This lounge strikes an ideal balance between trendy and timeless, but what really makes it work is the assortment of vases, bowls, candle holders and coasters that have been painted Resene Karaka, Resene Pewter, Resene Soothe, Resene Bud and Resene Just Dance to directly connect them to the artwork. The result is a space that feels cohesive and unified.

The lower half of the wall has been grounded in Resene Karaka while the top half is in Resene Pewter to keep the feature from feeling too dark. For contrast, the outside of the bookcase is painted soft Resene Soothe while the inside is painted Resene Eagle, the coffee table is in Resene Pewter and the ombre planter is in (from top to bottom) Resene Bud, Resene Pewter and Resene Karaka. To echo the visual texture of the brushstrokes in the painting, plenty of tactile textures have also been brought in, including the velvet sofa and cushions, a woven throw, a knotted rug and fresh plants. They work together with the colour scheme to build a warm, soft space to relax in after a long day.





#### Natural expression

While nature has long been a common inspiration for decor, woodland tones including mushroom greys, such as Resene Grey Olive, and earthy browns, such as Resene Coffee Break, are right up there among today's most popular hues. Flora and fauna motifs continue to be wildly popular, including bold tropical patterns, animal prints and brass statuettes of lions, tigers and jaguars.

The prevalence of green continues to flourish, though it's primarily in shades ranging from muted mint like Resene Secrets and silvery sage like Resene Peace, to enviable olives like Resene Waiouru. Emeralds and jades, too, remain in vogue - look to shades like Resene Atlas and Resene Mother Nature for a quick accent update.

#### Sunset pinks still shining

Love it or hate it, pinks of all shades continue to be a hugely popular choice for soft furnishings and accessories - especially bedding and cushions. A certain 'millennial' shade may have been the one that started it all, but it's dustier sunset shades like Resene Just Dance, Resene Soulful and Resene Soothe that are now taking centre stage. This trio looks great together for a tone-on-tone look or try painting them on rattan chairs, a table and accessories to build a boho-chic bedroom or lounge.

#### A little bit of lilac

As a diverging trend from millennial pink, lilac has been making a quiet appearance in the design world. Resene Ethereal, a barely there blush with the slightest hint of lilac, is a shade we've been seeing again and again, but purpler versions like Resene Mozart and Resene Dreamtime have been showing up too. These shades are a restful and romantic alternative to pink that pair well with warm and cool whites as well as grey-greens, making them the perfect choice for a feminine bedroom. >



# batten down

Batten walls are a popular on trend choice, but they don't have to surround the entire space – nor do they have to go all the way from floor to ceiling. Instead of a headboard, this bedroom uses battens to create an interesting focal point above the bed. The room divider in Resene Raindance, Resene Liberty and Resene Mystery creates both interest and motion thanks to its curvilinear tops which seem to mimic crashing waves. Oceans of light and airy white bedding has been layered with more textures and stormier shades that pull the colours of the artwork out into the room. The side table in Resene Fast Forward plays up the green undertones that are present in the darkest accent cushion while the vase in Resene Mystery and the lamp base in Resene Raindance bridge the gap in contrast between the darkest hues, the Resene White Island walls and the Resene Quarter Concrete floor.

We have also seen these popular purples making their influence on greys, browns and blues. Expect to see a lot more of colours like Resene Sixth Sense, Resene Rocky Mountain and Resene Time After Time. Try the former two together with rubies and emeralds like Resene Smoulder and Resene Atlas, the latter with a deep indigo like Resene King Tide and a steeped off white like Resene Half Tea in a bedroom.

#### Murky waters

While true blues like Resene Raindance, Resene Bismark and Resene Mystery remain popular bright and beachy options that are perfect for spring and summer, deep dark sapphires continue to be among the most coveted jewel tones. Look to shades like Resene Indian Ink or Resene Twilight Zone for building a cocoon-worthy tonal bedroom or use them in smaller doses on accessories or a statement piece of furniture to add a punch of contrast to define a more neutral space.

Like many of the most prominent trendy hues, the pendulum has begun to swing towards murkier shades like Resene Coast and Resene Safehaven as the favoured darks. Try them with other dusty denims and coastal chromas like Resene Liberty and Resene Lazy River.



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If you're looking to embrace the next 'big thing', it's worth looking to greener hues like Resene Green Meets Blue and Resene Fast Forward. Try these shades with a lichen green like Resene Unwind, a creamy yellow-toned white like Resene Rice Cake and a spiced marmalade orange like Resene Bi Hoki.

#### Mellower yellows

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



# How to choose the right builder for you

The builder should also be asking you lots of questions as they also need to get to know you and your project and understand what your expectations are. It is a good idea to be clear about what is important to you when it comes to your building or renovation project so you can be open about this when meeting potential builders.

#### TIP 3 Trust your gut feelings.

Spend some time with a few different builders or building companies. Make sure you feel comfortable with your chosen builder. On any project there will ups and downs – you need to be able to work through these with your builder as smoothly as possible.



# turning over a

A post-quake overhaul inspired by its surroundings.

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fter the Christchurch earthquakes damaged Stephanie Waterhouse's beloved 110-yearold villa, she had two choices before her: rebuild or move. Surrounded by acres of lush parkland, her mature neighbourhood, St Albans, is eclectic, interesting and centrally located. For her, it was an easy decision to stay in the area she loves and rebuild.

With the support of architect Don Jamieson and architectural graduate Joshua Dubbeld, they set about creating a comfortable home that celebrates the area's prevalent mid-century style while incorporating hints of contemporary design elements. The result of their efforts is a compact and considered build painted in a blend of Resene colours inspired by the raw, natural beauty of the Christchurch region.

Stephanie's vision for her new home was one that used honest materials to craft an open yet comfortable layout with northerly oriented living areas to allow for enhanced natural lighting and heating. Don and Joshua made use of the available space on the site to create two gables with a covered courtyard in between that's ideal for both at-home entertaining and private relaxation, allowing her to embrace an indoor/outdoor lifestyle.

"Stephanie has a love of colour, which was evident in her existing villa. It was decided early on in the project that colour should be featured in abundance alongside natural, low maintenance materials," Don explains.

She was especially passionate that her new home should represent the myriad of colours that exist in nature, especially hues reminiscent of the immediate area, such as the volcanic rock of Port Hills and the harbour where Stephanie goes for walks.

"The colour choices are intended to reference the surrounding environment as the eye moves from the earth to the sky, from the flora inspired green of Resene Norway, to the moody sky blue of Resene Longitude," says Don. "Every colour leaves its own distinctive impression, while referencing the natural finishes."

Resene Secrets

The natural colour palette used on the exterior extends through to the inside of the home, blending seamlessly from the outside in.

"We wanted to evoke a strong sense of home and permanence," Joshua says. "I wanted Stephanie to move into the house and immediately feel comfortable, like she had lived there her entire life."

To ensure familiarity, Stephanie reintroduced much of her furniture from her previous villa, salvaging a butcher block and transforming a kauri door into shelving for plants in the kitchen. She says she was

keen to create a 'honey glow' within her home, producing the colours you see on the Canterbury Plains during summer when the fields are golden. These accents run throughout the home, which are emphasised by the use of timber and other natural materials.

Deeper into the property, the living spaces deviate from golden and copper tones, boasting lofty vaulted ceilings painted in warm Resene Eighth Spanish White. Light from north-facing vistas pours down through the skylights and plant life is dotted throughout, bringing raw natural elements directly into the space. Through to the dining room, the walls are painted in the soft, blue tones of Resene Longitude, capturing nature further. Each bedroom is painted a different shade of green, with Resene Norway in the master and Resene Secrets and Resene Ashanti in the spare bedrooms.

"The finished result is such a perfect home for me," says Stephanie. "Everything was chosen for a reason, everything has a story and a place, especially in those materials and objects salvaged from the damaged house. And I love how the light changes all the colours depending on the time of day."

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

I have given this dining space an organic feel through the use of green and timber while the angular forms of the white wire chairs give it a bit of an industrial edge. The stunning artwork draws your eye to the back of the room where it can continue on through the open shelving to the kitchen beyond, but it also brings the colour continuity of the Resene Quarter Rice Cake ceiling and adjacent walls on to the feature wall while furthering the nature theme. While this house is contemporary, there are elements of the dining space that feel like a call back to classic 70s design. The plywood details also give it a similar vibe to some holiday homes. I wanted to keep the furniture modern and have added a feature wall in one of the latest Resene fashion colours, Resene Excalibur, behind the buffet unit, which is topped with a vase of fresh lavender and other accessories that lyrically evoke the colours of summer. Against the classic Resene Colorwood Pitch Black timber stain of the ply and the Resene Alabaster walls, I wanted the room to feel fresh, homey and little different from the normal. 

The home has a seamless flow from wall to floor, ceiling to accessories, a match made in colour heaven."

# endless paw-sibilities

### **Sitting pretty**

Which cat doesn't enjoy a good sunbath? If your sills aren't wide enough for Fluffy to curl up for a nap, make her a fold-down window seat where she can sun herself. The bottom of our pet perch features painted stripes of Resene Liberty and Resene Ecru White to match the paint colours on our wall and architraves when not in use, but you could decorate yours with any colours or pattern you like. Avoid the potential for cat-astrophe by making sure you use strong enough chain to support the weight of your furry friend – and that it's properly secured to your wall or window frame.





### **Pack leader**

It's a dog-eat-dog world out there – do yourself a favour and make a handy set of hooks like these so that finding your keys will be one less thing you'll need to worry about. We used three short offcuts of flat-profile trim. If you have a bigger family with more drivers or dogs, make a wider version so that there is a special space for each pack member. We used Resene Liberty behind the 'his' and 'her' hooks, Resene Rebel for Fido's, then used Resene Ecru White for the labels. The wall behind is in Resene Coyote.

### Vanity fur

Paint a fetching silhouette of your beloved friend by enlarging a favourite portrait – ideally a side view that shows off their full pet-ential – and tracing an outline on to a blank canvas using carbon paper. Pick up a couple of testpots from your local Resene ColorShop (we used Resene Cleopatra for our background and Resene Salsa for our parrot to contrast with our Resene Dark Knight wall) then use a small, flat artist's brush to fill in the silhouette edges first, followed by the background. Once the fine outline work has been done, use a Resene testpot brush to fly through the rest.

easonal transitions often inspire an adjustment to everyday life. Much like you change up your wardrobe when the weather gets warmer or cooler, a change of seasons is the perfect time to spruce up the design scheme of your home, inside and out. Rotating your decor allows you to take advantage of all of the wonderful colours, patterns and textures out there and avoid the boredom that can lead to impulsive purchases that clutter up your home.

While you will likely not have plans to buy big ticket items like new furniture or drapes for each season – or space to store them – making a few changes can do wonders for perking up your home.

### Change up your cushions

One of the easiest ways to mix things up in your home is by exchanging your throw pillows for new colours and textures. For instance, autumn is the perfect time to cover the couch in rust and ivory knit throw pillows. During the summer, you might consider blue ombre pillows that resemble splashing beach waves. In the winter, go for warmer fabrics like wool knits or plaid flannel for a country look. If you can't find what you are looking for, you can always add a few splashes of colour with a Resene testpot or two.

### Switch up your bedding

Another simple piece of changeable decor is your bedding. 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While it's fairly straightforward to think about textural changes in terms of textiles as the seasons switch – namely, to lighten up in the summer and go cosy in the winter – it's worth noting that texture is not only picked up by our sense of touch but with our eyes, too. Our eyes can tell our brain whether something is rough, fuzzy, smooth, shiny or chunky simply by looking at it – and both colour and pattern play a part in that.

Think warm and soft fabrics for winter. Choose upholstery that makes you want to touch it: suede and velvet are great choices because of their comfort factor. Richer, darker colours and heavier patterns can also work well in the colder months.

### Adjust your artwork

Artwork makes a huge impact on the look and feel of your space, and it usually doesn't take much space to store extras. Pick up a pair of large canvases and some Resene testpots then try your hand at making one warmer weather piece and one for cool weather to coordinate with your seasonal schemes. Since they'll be the same size and require the same hanging hardware, it's simple to swap them out when the weather changes.

Frames, too can be easily changed out either by slipping in new prints or by giving them a quick lick of paint. >

Area rugs really have a way of pulling an entire room together. What's best about these floor coverings is that they're portable and versatile, so take advantage of how they can easily transition your space from one season to the next.

Instead of purchasing a warm weather area rug, which are often rough to the touch, why not paint one onto your floor that coordinates with your summer scheme? In the colder months, you can cover it up with a soft, chunky rug that goes with your cool weather palette so that you'll always have visual texture on your floor that's gentle on the toes.

### Bring the outside in

Artist Max Patté deconstructs technology to capture a world of colour.

colourful person

t's been ten years now since British born artist and sculptor Max Patté arrived on New Zealand's shores, with a goal of travelling the world to broaden his horizons, find fresh inspiration and gain exposure to new places, cultures and practices. A graduate of the Wimbledon School of Art, he brought with him years of training in anatomy and sculpture, a resume full of jobs in the London film industry and experience as an Associate of the Royal Society of British Sculptors.

What he didn't know at the time was that, a decade later, his work would be world-renowned and have attracted a star-studded host of high-profile clients, with Sir Ian McKellen, Peter Jackson and Steven Fry included among their ranks.

Today, Max lives in Wellington with his family, the same city that houses his iconic waterfront sculpture, *Solace in the Wind* – which many consider to be his breakthrough work that catapulted his career into the artistic stratosphere. He is also well recognised for his larger-than-life cast iron horses, *The Frolic and the Fancy*, which stand magnificently at the Hills Golf Club & Sculpture Park in Queenstown.

Inspired by nature, his sculptures capture the deep shadows created as the sun dips below the horizon. But after working for years with clay and metal, he has since altered his course to more colourful territory with a greater focus on lightworks and paint. Now, the bulk of his more recent portfolio relies on a spectrum of Resene paint to help him create an eye-catching array of visually graphic pieces.

While Max's previous collection titled *The Infinity Works* concentrated on colour, shape, light and space, his current body of work, *The Droplet Series,* is an extension of this idea. Inspired by the growing technological world, it's an aptly named collection as each painting is made up of 'drops' of circular shapes using bold Resene paint colours.

Max says his art is influenced by how the consumer perceives images through apps and social media, and the visual glitches that can occur when an image fails to load. The image is then broken down into colour components, lacking the detail of the original image – thus rendering the content incomprehensible.

"I wanted to focus on areas with more 'punch', concentrating on bolder and more saturated colours. So, I



took this concept and manifested works in my studio using the technology I have at my fingertips," he explains. "The end result is a visual sculpture comprised of a multitude of colours, each one resting in a perfect spherical mass." While the droplets could be mistaken as one dimensional, the surrounding negative space enables a spherical quality that's reminiscent of raindrops on a window.

Max turned to Resene's extensive collection to successfully capture the break-down of colour he needed to accomplish his goal. It was a process that required a great deal of experimentation and research and, in the end, he purchased 250 different Resene testpots to achieve the desired effect.

"Of course, few people ever see or understand these lengthy processes. It's always nice to talk to potential collectors who visit the studio. It gives them a better understanding of a finished piece and helps form a connection between them and the work," Max explains.

The Droplet Series is now part of Max's private collection based in his Wellington studio which can be visited by the general public. Max says he is looking forward to the end of the year and 2020, when he gets to flex his creative muscles once more.

"It's going to be busy, that's for sure," Max reveals. "But I have some really exciting and quite different works planned."  ${\rm \textbf{H}}$

### Max's favourite colours


Max says his clients are often big fans of the names of Resene paints, but his favourite colours are those that he often finds reoccurring in his work.

"I love Resene Broom, Resene Picton Blue, Resene Home Run and Resene Pink Lace. Pink is a tricky one. I have a work in mind that would require a huge amount of variation in pinks from very subtle pastel, bordering on creamy pinks through to bright, almost luminous pinks that could add a real punch," Max explains.

He says that he has learned a great deal from talking to Resene technicians and understanding that this colour variation is possible.

uckland's Grey Lynn neighbourhood is famed for its sprawling white villas and residential streets lined with greenery, but it's only over the past two decades that gentrification has placed it among the city's most desirable suburbs.

Auckland City Council built a couple rows of simple and understated houses in the early 1920s along one of Grey Lynn's major roadways, which were occupied by workers. At first glance, they resemble petite bungalows with exteriors painted in shades of white to enhance the texture of the stucco, each contrasted by a striking red roof.

Twelve years ago, Philip and Jane became the lucky owners of one of these unique properties. Together with architect Malcolm Walker, they undertook a renovation of the home, working

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towards honouring its heritage while applying a modern twist.

"Although we had an idea of what we wanted, we didn't really know how it might be achieved," says Philip. "We enlisted an architect for new ideas on how to utilise existing spaces. Malcolm offered sympathetic options with the property's heritage in mind, enabling us to explore ways we could complement it with a creative colour palette."

After a two-storey extension to the back of the property was built in the early 1990s, Malcolm sought to better integrate it for a much more cohesive flow.

"Circulation and the nature of the spaces were thoroughly revisited to erase the previous bitsy approach to planning and lack of light," Malcolm explains. the original house while highlighting the spectacular views of Western Springs and the Waitakere Ranges."

Picking the right colour palette was also important to help enhance existing features and open up the previously low-lit space. The completed renovation boasts an interior that has been lovingly restored, finished in a confident palette of Resene pinks, whites and earthy tones with a touch of midnight blue.

If one were to calculate the total wall area and break it down by colour, Resene White would come out on top as the predominant colour used. However, it's the exceptional way that striking accent hues have been incorporated that give it the unique, artistic and personable flair and make Philip and Jane's home a standout.

Upon entering, the tone for the space is set by an expansive woven mat hanging in the hallway, comprised mainly of jovial yellow, vibrant pink and rusty orange. At the end of a hallway, a stripe of yellow glass has been inset.

Further along, a wall has been removed and the existing stairway has been opened up to create more space and the addition of several skylights, spilling light into what was once a very dark area. The stairwell itself is accented in a two-storey swath of vivacious Resene Glamour Puss, providing a connection between the refreshed three-level split kitchen, dining and living spaces.

"I have a memory of visiting the house of a stylish person in the 1970s. The living room at night was a lovely, warm soft pink that bathed one in a beautiful light. Since then, I've always wanted to use pink, but haven't done so until now," says Philip.

Resene Cosmos, a softer pink, was used on the ceilings of the hallway. Much like Philip's description, it generates a dreamy blush glow that floods through to adjoining rooms and bounces off the adjacent Resene White walls, creating a sense of warmth. To tie the exterior and interior together, a touch of Resene Cosmos was also used to colour the entry soffits.

Deeper into the property, the kitchen has been completely refreshed and modernised. It's a room now painted in Resene White paired with a moody, smoky grey countertop and dark cabinetry. It's a transformation that Jane especially loves, as she wasn't particularly fond of the kitchen before.

The couple were also keen to integrate their existing furniture and accessories within the new spaces.

"Although it's an older house, we wanted to achieve a contemporary, uncluttered look even though we have quite a few possessions and pieces of art. There was a lot of thinking required before decisions could be made about how our furniture could work with different options," she says.






### simple, streamlined design plays to its strengths



### Designer **Georgia Langridge** suggests this alternative scheme:

The overall concept I wanted to achieve, like with most spaces we design, was to keep the base of the room nice and neutral, allowing more transient pieces such as the barstools and decorative objects to provide a punch of personality that can evolve with seasonal, trend and taste changes. I started by analysing the space, which had great elements to work with. What was immediately apparent was the tremendous light that came into the space through the existing large windows. I liked how it provided a contrast to the full height dark joinery on the left; this immediately gave a great sense of light and shade which I wanted to play up on. To balance the right side of the space, I added a streamlined mesh pendant and custom shutters in Resene Stack, which both control light allowances.

### Designer **Becky Lee** suggests this alternative scheme:

If I had to create a hashtag for this design, I think #desertglamchic would fit it! My starting point was the artwork, *Midnight at the Oasis*, which has been used as the inspiration for the hand-painted tiles across the back wall. For me, the desert evokes images of the muted tonal colours of rocks and minerals, and shimmering mirages. The varied finishes from the high-gloss Resene Rocky Mountain floor to the brushed brass accents reference the mirage while the panelling brings in a luxe old world aspect. The cabinetry is finished in Resene Despacito – the softest bone-meets-pink – and Resene Smoothie, which is earthy and complex. A large veined Caesarstone benchtop adds a mineral element while the barstools playfully contrast the hard lines and repeat the circular motifs of the sun design and cupboard handles.

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

Clever use of colour and a bit of planning are all it takes to create inspired kids' spaces with staying power.

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R enovating a child's bedroom can be fun, but you shouldn't need to start from scratch every time they outgrow their decorating scheme. With many people feeling their homes are short on space, it's important that each room be designed well. Kids' rooms should be designed with the same level of pragmatism as any other major living area in order to make the most out of the multi-purpose spaces that they are: a place where your children will sleep, play, study, create and entertain their friends.

By making thoroughly considered colour selections from the start, the evolution from nursery to childhood bedroom to teenage hangout can be done with ease.

### Setting the groundwork

When the exciting news arrives that a baby is on the way, planning a nursery is one of the most fun preparation activities for soon-to-be parents.

Over the course of a 24-hour period, newborns typically sleep 14 to 19 of those hours, so it's important to have a place where they can get their rest undisturbed by the other goings-on in your home. Typically, this means baby is going to need a room all to themselves.

When making the leap from a guest room or home office to a nursery, it's important to keep things simple and to consider how the room will need to evolve in 10 or even 20 years' time. Sticking to classic colours that will endure through one or more transitions is one of the simplest approaches to start off your scheme.

Designer and colour consultant Sylvia Sandford says that it's not a bad idea to begin with a neutral base such as white, cream, duck egg blue or dove grey, such as Resene Poured Milk, Resene Rice Cake, Resene Duck Egg Blue or Resene Grey Seal, as other hues will present themselves through the myriad of accessories, toys, charts, pictures, pin boards and other decorations that you'll be layering into the space.

"By the time you hang things from the ceiling, put artwork in frames, add in a colourful pendant light and some age-appropriate drapery, there will be plenty going on."

If you do have your heart set on a particular wall colour, however, you should go for it – it only takes a day or two to repaint – but keeping the often expensive flooring and window treatments neutral will save you in the long run. Just remember, children tend to outgrow traditional baby hues early, so you might find yourself repainting over these choices sooner rather than later.

If you're struggling to come up with a colour scheme for your nursery, look to science to decide. For the first three months, babies can only see black, white and grey, so focus on contrasting colours, such as black and white, because they're much easier to see than lighter, non-contrasting colours. Conveniently, this makes nursery renovations easy when it comes to choosing colours! Try Resene Rice Cake for a warm, neutral white and pair it with Resene Noir for a highcontrast look.

If a monochrome look isn't your thing, try contrasting grey with a splash of colour, such as a

subtle yellow like Resene Yuma, or go bold with one red feature, which could be a feature wall behind the cot head or a fun piece of furniture and frames. Red is one of the first colours a baby can see, at around three months of age. Try Resene Pohutukawa, Resene Poppy or Resene Code Red.

Consider a wallpaper like those from the Resene Jack 'N Rose 2 Wallpaper Collection – while they are designed for kids, many would look just as appropriate in a home office as they would in a nursery.

When in doubt, consult a Resene Colour Expert. They can help you to pick the right palette and make a plan that'll take your room seamlessly through the eighteen or more years that your child will be living at home.

When you're ready to pick up the roller, Sylvia says paying proper attention to preparation is one of the most important things you can do from the outset.

"No painting over old wallpaper or layers of old paint. Start with as clean a slate as possible and seek advice for the appropriate finishes as these are going to be surfaces that will ring in changes over many years. Good initial preparation will allow you to layer up colour as time goes on with little effort."

"While all rooms should be repainted frequently to re-energise them and freshen them, the work you put in at the beginning will stand you in good stead."

When it comes to furniture, the nursery stage is a great time to take it easy, but once you hit the 'incredible years' – ages three to six – and beyond, you can start to get creative. Upcycling old furniture such as painting an old set of drawers in brighter colours, or even just their handles, can instantly transform a room.

### Outgrowing the cot

As your child's personality develops, their room can become more of a reflection of their individuality and tastes. Themes are a really fun way to define a kids' space. Try to pick things that they'll likely enjoy for a few years rather than just the flavour of the month. Sometimes more generic themes will work better than ones based on pop-culture. Look beyond TV and movies to imaginative worlds of jungles, deserts, sea, space, animals or royalty for inspiration.

"It's sometimes hard for families to allow children's rooms to move away from the very coordinated

scheme that may have been created throughout their home. However, there is usually a sense of continuity that already connects the rest of the home to these children's rooms," says Sylvia.

She points out that your home likely already has the same skirting, architraves, doors and hardware throughout.

"So paint becomes a real friend in kids' spaces because of its ease of application and the change it affords."

"When making the move from an all-neutral room, adding a new wall colour doesn't mean that it has to be everywhere," she says. "One or two walls or the paint wrapped round at dado height can be all that is needed."

"Often, a second opinion is invaluable at this stage for picking the right paint colours that will change the space to make it truly theirs. It is fun to have your child's involvement too, and taking them for a visit to a Resene ColorShop can be of great benefit." Start with small projects and look for ways your kids can help out.

Framing your child's artwork is another way to brighten things up with minimal change to the room's main decor. When you and your child have agreed on a colour scheme, pick up a few Resene testpots in colours that coordinate with their walls, floor, furnishings and bedding and let them paint up something especially for their space.

Flexible furniture, either in its ability to transform from one thing to another or for its multi-tasking qualities, can also be a great investment during this phase. When your child has grown out of their cot, wooden bunk beds are perfect for freeing up floor space and can be painted to suit your child's personality. As your child gets older, simply lose the bottom bunk and add a study nook underneath the top bunk.

Children love their privacy, too, and often enjoy having their own hideout. Bunks can easily convert into forts with a few blankets and boxes. And in the transition to a teenage bedroom, they will probably appreciate that privacy all the more.

### The move to maturity

In the teenage years, it becomes especially important that bedrooms reflect identity and interests.

"At this age, there will likely be requests for more colour on the walls and possibly the ceilings," says Sylvia. "If it is a room where a lot of time is going to be spent, the atmosphere will be important. A starting point such as new bedlinen, a wonderful rug, a hobby or interest may steer a scheme."

"Creative ideas such as hand-painted stripes or a creative wall mural can be restricted to one wall to add personality while keeping things from getting out of hand. Adding a large mirror can help throw the size so that it will seem bigger to your teen."

Photo and pin boards are popular with teens and can help save your walls from too many holes and tack

marks. To steer clear of holes altogether, paint Resene Magnetic Magic under Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen tinted to the same colour as the rest of your walls and your teen can hang notes, posters or artwork – and even write on it with chalk. Simply use a damp cloth to wipe it clean. Or, finish your wall colour in Resene Write-on Wall Paint for a coloured whiteboard finish and your teen can use whiteboard markers to write on their wall.

To get your teen organised, incorporate shelving. Wooden crates are easy to stack and don't take up too much room, while box or honeycomb shelves make a fun DIY painting project and can be arranged in different patterns on the wall. Picking something in a solid, classic shape means you can hang on to them once your teen moves out – and give them a pick-me-up with new paint colours.

### **Reclaiming the room**

top tip Opting for a matte finish, such as Resene SpaceCote Flat, can help mask imperfections in older walls.

When your child leaves home, you'll be reverting the room back to its original purpose, or giving it a brand new one. At this stage, the focus will return to you and your needs.

What you might not have anticipated is that it can be emotionally difficult to make changes to your teen's bedroom after they leave home. But, if you've planned for that in advance of their departure, you might be able to redesign the space in a way that will make it easy to give it new purpose after they're gone. Painting a colour block headboard behind their bed, for instance, could become a clever way to define your work space once the room becomes your home office.

Choosing multifunctional furniture when you're refurnishing the room will also help you to make the most of your reclaimed room, especially if the space will likely be used for more than one purpose. If your teen has taken off with their bed, consider replacing it with a fold-out couch. That way, the space can still serve as a spare bedroom when company comes over but do double-duty as an office or library. Alternatively, try a bed with pull out drawers underneath to give yourself more storage space.

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
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### Getting another opinion

No matter what age of child you're trying to design a bedroom for, it's okay to seek out help if you're feeling stuck for what to do.

"Colour is very personal and affects everyone differently, evoking varying emotional responses." says Sylvia. "It's important to try to understand how each family member responds to colours, as we can sometimes jump to conclusions. Choosing the right colours for the personality of the room's user takes some skill. Professional guidance can be helpful and necessary."

# lace up for **summer fun**

Grab the kids and some Resene testpots then let your imagination run wild.



### **Foot fancy**

Who wouldn't want to show up to play in flash shoes like these? Customise a fresh pair of footwear or fancy up some old favourites – while covering up scuff marks – with nothing more than a few Resene testpots, artist's brushes and a bit of good quality masking tape.

If your kids are little, you can help mask off any of the harder parts – such as around the soles – that you want to keep paint off of and remove laces, if there are any. Show them how they can mask off parts to make straight, clean lines when the tape is removed to create these looks.

We had fun 'painting within the lines' by colour blocking different sections and features of our shoes, but your kids can keep things even simpler or get as crazy as they'd like. With imagination and a steady hand, their shoes can easily become favourite animals, book or movie characters or could feature the logo of their favourite sports team. For an artsy, splattered look, you can flick paint off artist's brushes onto the shoes – though it's definitely best to do so outside or in the garage with a Resene dropcloth underneath.

We used testpots in Resene Sunbaked, Resene Crowdpleaser, Resene King Tide, Resene Meditation, Resene Bismark, Resene Soulful and Resene Raging Bull to make our kids' shoes into something special, but there are hundreds of other testpot colours you and your kids can choose from at your local Resene ColorShop or reseller. They can also be purchased online at shop.resene.com/testpots.

You can also refresh your shoes using Resene testpots too. If you have a pair of old heels that you love the design of but the colour doesn't go with the rest of your wardrobe, consider giving them a colourful update with Resene testpots. ### Let the games begin

Recreate a classic game in an unconventional format using Resene testpots to paint your own dominoes. Smooth rocks, like those found on the beach or in a river bed, work best for this project. Take the kids out to search for ones that lay flat and are generally round or oblong in shape. If you don't live near water, you should be able to get some from your local garden supply store.

Since a traditional domino set contains all number pairs from double zero to double six, with each number pair occurring once, you'll need 28 rocks in total. We painted ours first in Resene Noir with a small, flat artist's brush and then added our number dots and lines using a fine round brush and a testpot of Resene Despacito – a creamy blush-beige – but you can use any colour combination your heart desires. Let your background colour dry completely before adding on the details. To speed up the process, use a hair dryer.

While our rocks were all golf ball-sized or smaller, you could also make a set using big rocks so that your dominoes become an outdoor game that takes over the yard where the whole family can join in.

Most Resene testpots are made using Resene Lumbersider paint which is ideal for exterior or interior use. They don't need overcoating if being used outside. If you'd prefer a higher gloss finish you can overcoat with Resene Clearcoat UVS or Resene Concrete Clear. H

# open up and say **'wow'**

The line between kitchen and dining spaces continues to blur – for the better.

or many of us, the notion of maintaining a formal dining room is a distant memory. In larger, older homes where a separate room may have initially existed, many are breaking down this traditional barrier in favour of a modern open plan layout – and it makes sense. But, it also requires a fair amount of careful planning in order to get a layout that works and a design that wows.

These two thoughtful kitchen renovations show how much can be accomplished with a great layout and a clear design vision.


### Warm and welcoming in white

Homeowners Kate and Nick recently completed an extensive renovation to enhance and maximise the potential of their beloved home in Auckland's Meadowbank neighbourhood. As the owner of Williams Road, a furniture company that creates beautiful commercial fit-outs, Kate definitely has a strong sense of style and was instrumental in setting the vision for the entire project. With three young boys at home, she wanted to make sure the family's needs would be met both in the present and in the long term while opening up the living spaces in a way

that would allow more natural light and movement to flow through.

Kristen Basra, of Spatial Studio, was entrusted to head up the redesign of their kitchen and bring Kate's ideas to life.

When it came to deciding on the overall look, Kristen says that the brief from the clients was clear right from the start. Kristen's task was primarily to refine it within the kitchen area so that it would fit naturally within the grander open-plan living space. Clever use of space, maximisation of storage and creating a space that supports social entertaining just as much as busy mornings with the children were all equally important.

The style of the v-groove doors required particular attention to detail in order to pull off the look. The spacing between the grooves needed to look similar from cabinet to cabinet, regardless of differences in widths, and proportion was crucial in order to maintain the feeling of spaciousness.

This meant that the bulk of the design time was spent planning the layout of the kitchen to find a solution that best suited Kate and Nick's lifestyle. "Larger cutlery and crockery drawers were more important to them than the position of the bins and dishwasher, which resulted in a highly customised layout that was unique to the homeowner's needs," says Kristen.

"In the bar area, I suggested an antique mirror to break up the white-on-white and lend an aged, lived in feel to the space. It also helped soften the heavy barn door by balancing it with something else that was noticeable and of a larger scale."

Top to toe in Resene Eighth Rice Cake, the finished space feels warm and has a touch of glamour, thanks to the eye-catching rose gold dome pendant lamps.

For those looking to achieve a similar look, Kristen offers this advice: "The proportionality and balance with other surrounding textures is very important in an all-white kitchen. Lines draw the eyes in visually, so having too many lines on the cabinet doors would have made the v-groove detail into a distraction. And the larger the span of cabinetry, the better the continuity."

### An inspired palette

Petra and Milan Jurič have been busily renovating their 1960s home in Brightwater, not far from Nelson, which they purchased a little over two years ago. The couple recently completed a year-long makeover of their main living area, which included the kitchen, dining room and lounge.

While Petra knew she definitely wanted the lifestyle that an open plan kitchen and dining area offered, she also wanted to separate the different areas visually – something she achieved by choosing three different colours and separating them with Resene Alabaster trims.

"We started off with the kitchen and dining area and decided to mix up three colours – green, blue and grey," says Petra. "With the help of the knowledgeable staff at the Resene ColorShop in Nelson, we chose the colour scheme and went to work."

"In the kitchen, we painted the walls Resene Happy Hour. The name has been chosen really well, as this colour definitely makes us happy whenever we see it. It works really well with the antique white cabinetry and concrete grey counters and gives this space a boost. For the dining area, we chose Resene Moby, which goes so well with Resene Happy Hour and gives a nice contrast. For the house entrance area, we chose Resene Half Jumbo, which was a great 'toned down' option and nicely complements our vertical post wrapped in manila rope. All three colours create a perfect balance."

Petra says that the inspiration for their lounge came from the Autumn/Winter 2018 issue of *habitat* magazine. "The cover featured plywood planks painted in multiple colours and it looked so awesome that we decided to try something similar."

"After painting sample planks with Resene Moby, Resene Half Jumbo and Resene Alabaster, we decided that it wouldn't work for our area because we have multiple colours already in the kitchen/dining area. In the end, we decided to use just Resene Moby as the planks themselves provided such a nice backdrop. And, because of the texture of the plywood, it actually feels quite different to Resene Moby painted on the plasterboard in the dining area."

Petra's advice? "Don't be afraid to be bold – and buy as many testpots as you need to find the right shades because just looking at the colour chart isn't enough. I learned that paint colours are affected by the lighting, surface reflection and the size of the space. I tested many colours before my final decision to find just the right fit."

With the renovation of the major living spaces complete, Petra loves that she can now sit at the dining table and is able to see the whole area from one spot and finds the mix of colours she selected to be quite calming.

"Thanks to Resene," she says, "we now have a fresh, vibrant and harmonious living area."  ${\bf H}$

The ceiling, architraves and door are in Resene Eighth Parchment. efurbishing a heritage bathroom is a labour of love, and not one for the faint of heart. But for those with a passion for restoring older spaces back to their original beauty, and an inspired colour palette to back it up, the results can be sensational.

Lucky for a beachside cottage in Oamaru and a villa in Waiuku, they each found new owners keen to bring them back to life.

The former has a rich history as one of the oldest timber houses in the North Otago area, one that dates all the way back to 1872. Given its age, the homeowners were faced with a big decision: to renovate or start from scratch with a new build. They began drawing up concepts for a new home that would have character features but they kept being drawn back to their original home and what could be done to refurbish the existing property. They turned to designers Annabel Berry and Meghan Nockels of Design Federation to help bring out the best bits of the original home.

"The intention of the design was to combine the historical cottage look with a coastal beach feel," says Annabel.

"We had two site visits to Kakanui Beach and Campbells Bay to review the main colour cues that inspired our palette. Using the Resene Colour Palette Generator tool, we were able to see from our photographs what paint colours we could use that were directly generated from our surroundings."

In the bathroom, they went with classic Resene Duck Egg Blue on the walls complemented with crisp Resene Half Black White panelling while Resene Eighth Parchment was used for the doors, architraves and ceiling. The old claw foot bath was original to the home and was restored by a car painter in Oamaru; it has since become a crown jewel of the home.

Over in Waiuku, Jane Thorne and her husband Pim Slagman became enamoured with a century old villa and the couple have been working hard on it ever since they bought it in 2015. They knew that they wanted to embrace the age of the home while sticking to a very tight budget. For them, it meant that most of the restorative labour fell to their shoulders.

"The hours and hours of sanding were one of the biggest challenges, but it was worth it to get the perfect paint finish," says Jane.

When they began work on the bathroom, Jane discovered the original tub when she found its taps poking out of the wall. It had been completely boxed in by previous owners.

"Curiosity got the better of me and I decided to see what was underneath and began to dismantle the structure. I barely slept that night as I was so excited to discover an enormous claw foot bath underneath!"

"It was in terrible condition, with rust around the drain and rough, peeling paint all over. We had it restored to its former glory by a bath resurfacer and we couldn't be happier with the work."

Jane says she was inspired by the soft pastels popular in the 1950s, which became the basis of her bathroom palette. She selected Resene Half Pale Rose for the walls with Resene Quarter Villa White for the tongue-and-groove panelling, ceiling, trims and architraves. For the tub, they chose buttery Resene Pale Prim and Resene White for the feet.

To Pim, the newly restored bathroom is grand, spacious and classic with a nod to its heritage. For Jane, the space feels tranquil and has become her favourite room in the house.  $\bowtie$

### top tips for freestanding tubs

Deep and luxurious, freestanding tubs feel timeless in any bathroom. But, before you purchase one, make sure you've taken these considerations into account:

- Be sure your bathroom is big enough to accommodate one.
   Freestanding baths tend to take up more room than built-in models and need space between them and the wall. The plumbing and tapware will also take up extra room and will be more visible than it would be with a built-in.
- If you opt for a footed tub, you'll need to clean beneath it. Even freestanding tubs that sit flush on the floor will leave a gap between the wall and the bath that may be tough to reach when cleaning. But, if you have space to place it in the centre of the room, it can actually make cleaning easier.
- Your bathroom floor needs to be strong enough to support not just the weight of the tub you choose, but the weight when it's filled with water and has someone sitting inside. This is particularly important if you are putting a tub on the second floor of your home as the floor may need to be reinforced first.
- Make sure you have a place to store soap that'll still be within reach when you're in the bath.

Enter the 'she shed' – a space for women to immerse themselves in activities that bring them joy. While the word 'shed' may bring to mind a shabby chic sort of space, there is no limit to how luxurious or humble your hideaway can be.

And take note – gifting a 'she shed' to your special someone would make an epic anniversary or birthday present.

Depending on how you or the woman in your life likes to spend time, here are some ideas of how different types of she sheds could take shape.

### The zen retreat

Artist types will love a relaxing space to seek out inner peace while bearing their soul on the canvas. Painters, sculptors and other creators of fine art typically need some peace and quiet – and plenty of storage space – for them to work their magic. With enough floor space to roll out a mat, this shed could also double as a yoga den.

The focus of this space should be to minimise distractions as much as possible. Choosing a natural and serene colour scheme can help.

Consider installing a rack to hold finished artworks and drawers with plenty of dividers to keep supplies and tools organised. Create a separate compartment for each Resene testpot in the drawer where they are stored painted with the same colour as what's inside the testpot so that it's easy to remember which colour hasn't been put back where it belongs.

### The green thumb's refuge

A place to get your hands dirty, this is a she shed for a woman with a penchant for all things green and growing; its a space to hang her hat – and her gardening tools.

To ensure there is a designated place for each shovel, spade and pitch fork, install a large pegboard and paint an outline around each tool. That way, you'll instantly know if something is missing when you pack up for the day.

### The crafter's hideaway

Crafter's bits and bobs are best stored in ways where they can be easily seen so that you can always find what you're looking for. Paint up a pegboard to hold spools of ribbon and hang up small shelves to house glass jars of smaller supplies.

Colour coding can be a key to help identify where different types of tools and craft provisions can be found. Paint storage boxes in an inspiring spectrum of colours using Resene Chalkboard Paint or Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen. These finishes work as a chalkboard, so they can be written on with chalk and wiped clean with a damp cloth. Or, get really crafty and paint a symbol on each that hints at its contents.

#### The biker's haunt

Whether you prefer your noble steed to be motorised or self-propelled, a biker chick would love a space to fix up her favourite mode of transportation.

Storage should be a priority for a space like this, but so should ease of clean up as many fix-it-up activities involve a certain element of grease and grime. If the bike has an engine, starting it inside the shed to check how the motor is running could cause blackened stains to appear on the wall behind where the bike sits. Paint that wall a darker colour, such as Resene Quarter Bokara Grey, and use a durable paint like Resene Enamacryl for a high gloss finish or Resene Lustacryl for a semi-gloss finish on surfaces that will need frequent wipe-downs.

#### The page-turner's paradise

A tranquil place to read in peace is just about the best thing a bookworm can imagine, especially if it includes plenty of built-in shelving. Work with restful hues like soothing pinks, soft greens and blissful blues such as Resene Ethereal, Resene Peace and Resene Unwind and be sure there is adequate lighting by installing windows or electricity in the shed. Or, try an LED lamp or two powered by rechargeable batteries.

A cubby-style shelving system makes it easier to categorise books by topic and keeps the contents from toppling over each time you go to grab a book from the shelf. Each topic could get a cubby in a different colour. Or, just paint the edges of certain cubbies in a single contrasting colour so that you always know where you can find your favourites. H

## small house, big

### Meet the family who embraced minimalist, Scandinavian living when they built their own tiny house.

ocated in the heart of Hawke's Bay and next to acres of farmland is Mike and Loren's striking home. It's a build that's a little smaller than your average home – at just 22m<sup>2</sup> it makes the cut for what's known as a tiny house. The project has taken five years to complete, and it all began when Mike was researching American tiny houses. It was a relatively new concept to the local market at the time when they began their design for the build. But with Mike's skills as a mechanical design engineer, and Loren's as a fashion designer, together they created a practical home painted in soft, neutral shades of Resene paint for themselves and daughter Hazel.

When it comes to tiny homes, the devil really is in the details. A practical and functional layout is critical to ensuring a liveable space. For Mike and Loren, it was important to first establish what they both needed, wanted and desired in order to establish a workable and comfortable home environment.

"As far as tiny houses go, our home isn't very traditional. Normally, tiny homes have loft spaces at each end for sleeping quarters. Ours is single storey and

a little wider, too. We found it fun to do things slightly differently and not as the status quo," Mike explains.

In order to create individual living spaces, the tiny house is compartmentalised throughout with sections raised to different heights. The design maintains an open plan appearance but also an aspect of separation between major activities. As a young family, it was important to the couple that the most space be allocated to the kitchen, their most used section of the tiny house, and that the area was efficiently laid out with adequate storage.

"We're heavy kitchen users and are in there most of the day. We wanted to include decent sized appliances and we can access almost everything from one place without having to walk."

To provide a degree of space and height within the house, the couple decided on a light, bright and neutral colour palette. Choosing the right colours is critical in a tiny home, as the ceilings are usually a lot lower and the side walls closer together.

"In order to open up the space, we wanted fresh, bright hues on the walls," Loren says.

"It's a colour palette inspired by Scandinavian design trends combined with a Kiwi bach vibe. We wanted the colours and look to be indicative of our home's surroundings."

Mike and Loren decided to keep the colour palette consistent throughout the build so that the entire area had a degree of open plan living. It's an element that is common in Scandinavian builds, along with clean lines and clutter-free space. Resene Colorwood Whitewash teamed with Resene Zylone Sheen Zero in Resene White help add a sense of space. To elevate the design, they relied on soft furnishings to add texture and a point of difference.

The exterior of the home, however, deviates away from the neutral palette. It's clad in recycled pine stained in deep blue Resene Waterborne Woodsman Woody Bay timber stain while the windows are trimmed in soft grey Resene Atmosphere for contrast - a choice that blends the understated and natural look of local beachside baches and Scandinavian homes.

When Hazel was born, however, Mike and Loren had to make adjustments.

"We thought we might need to consider a child, but we decided we would just get through it. The first six months were fine, you're all in the same room anyway. Now, it's a little harder. You ideally need another separate room to close off for sleeping," Mike explains.

A curtain rail now wraps around the cot to further compartmentalise the space so baby Hazel can sleep. The new parents also have an additional space outside - a shed where they can retreat to. But as they toy with the idea of growing their family, is a tiny house still a sustainable choice, and would they do it again?

"I'm keen to build another house after what we learned from the first, but if we had another baby it would be too much. Though it can be done, for us, it's been a really good bridge between buying some land and building another house there. In all, it's an experience we will never forget." ⊢

Want to build your own tiny palace? Here are Mike and Loren's top tips:

- Book a stay in a tiny house on Airbnb, take your family and treat it as a living dynamic rather than a holiday.
- Be prepared for hard work.
- Assess where you want your life to be in a few years' time and plan for potential adjustments.
- Stick to a light and neutral colour palette to help open the space visually.
- Decide what your favourite part of your home is first and make sure that's a feature in your tiny house.

# make your own outdoor ottoman

An old tyre gets reimagined as functional furniture.

## top tip

Create a "tufted" effect on the top of your cushion by using a staple gun to create an "X" in the centre with staples, then glue or stitch on a button.

## you will need:

- An old car tyre
- Rope (50m long x 10mm wide)
- 2 round MDF or wooden panels (precut to 600mm diameter x 20mm thick)
- Power drill/screwdriver
- 8 wood screws
- Square of foam or thick quilt batting (at least 600mm<sup>2</sup> x 30mm thick)
- Square of outdoor fabric (at least 700mm<sup>2</sup>)
- Marker
- Fabric shears/scissors
- Hot glue gun
- Industrial strength glue
- Resene Lustacryl in your choice of colour to complement your patio furniture – we used Resene Double Pravda
- Testpot brush and small artist's brush
- Low-tack masking tape

Resene 🔄 Kandinsky 🗖 **Step 1:** Wash the tyre thoroughly with hot soapy water then let it dry completely.

**Step 2:** Trace your round MDF panel with your marker on to the foam or batting then cut out the circle with fabric shears.

**Step 3:** Trace approximately 4-5cm larger than your round MDF panel with your marker on to the back of your outdoor fabric then cut it out with fabric shears.

**Step 4:** Centre the MDF panel on top of the tyre and secure it in place with four wood screws. Flip the tyre over, then centre and attach the second panel on the other side using another four wood screws.

**Step 5:** Using a hot glue gun, start affixing the rope to the bottom rim where the tyre and the MDF panel meet so that it coils from bottom to top until the surface has been covered almost completely, except for the last one or two coils. If you have trouble getting the first bit started, use industrial strength glue that's suitable for rubber and your chosen rope fibre to affix the first coil.

Step 6: Glue your circle of foam or batting to the top panel.

**Step 7:** Secure the outdoor fabric to the bottom of the top MDF panel by hot gluing small sections at a time around the edges, tucking the excess fabric underneath as you go and keeping the top smooth and taunt.

**Step 8:** Finish gluing the last of the rope around the tyre so that it covers up the edges of the fabric. If your rope is too long, trim it just before you finish coiling and then use hot glue to tuck it underneath the bottom of the cushion so that it's hidden.

**Step 9:** Mask the edge of your cushion with low-tack masking tape to protect it from paint.

**Step 10:** Paint the entire surface of your rope in Resene Lustacryl in two coats using a testpot brush. Use a small artist's brush to get into any tight spots. Leave it to dry overnight, remove the masking, then pour yourself a cold beverage and put your feet up. You've earned it!

for a striking transformation.

Situated at the end of a lovely cul-de-sac in Hamilton, not far from the river, Lisa Harvey's home is a standard Huntly brick bungalow. Built in the 1980s, the original exterior finishes, while classic at the time, were beginning to tire and in need of a refresh.

Designer Deanna Hills of The Designery Room was enlisted to help. She says that her mandate was to modernise the house and give it a stylish look, bringing it up to scratch, without going overboard on budget. Her selection of Resene paint products and a simple colour palette were just the ticket.

"Resene Element is a lovely soft black, which toned in with the old school bronze joinery, as we wanted to hide the joinery to an extent. We didn't want to accentuate any of the timber elements, so we went for Resene Woodsman Pitch Black in the CoolColour formula. It flows seamlessly to the Resene Element on the bricks and also gives the house a lovely sense of height," explains Deanna.

"We wanted to add some character and definition, so we used Resene Sonyx 101 tinted to Resene Half Sea Fog on the fascia and key pieces of trim. This black and white scheme gives a modern yet timeless look to the home and works really well with the existing materials and substrates." **Opposite:** A fresh coat of Resene Lumbersider tinted to Resene Element on the brick, gables and garage door, Resene Summit Roof in Resene Element on the roof, Resene Woodsman Pitch Black CoolColour on the cedar cladding and window heads and Resene Sea Fog on the fascia, spouting, soffits, posts, downpipes and garage surrounds made all the difference in this monochromatic modernisation.

Deanna says that the right tradie was important to make sure the right finishes and products were used on the existing and weathered materials. "We also needed someone who took attention to detail. Our painters, Hallie Decorators, did an amazing job."

"The main challenge was the cedar gable above the garage. This timber was left for too long and – let's say it was past its use-by date. The painter ended up needing to organise installation of new timber."

Serendipitously, the change-out ended up benefiting the overall design as they were able to get rid of the odd triangular shape from the front of the house and tone the horizontal boards in with the existing cedar window heads.

"The painted brick was definitely the most successful element of the project," says Deanna. "It's actually a very simple and cost effective way to modernise an old dated brick home.

It looks simply spectacular – like a completely different home."  $\ensuremath{\textbf{H}}$

This house has some lovely bones. We wanted to work with the existing structure but completely transform this house into a fresh modern home – with a Mediterranean twist. This option shows another idea for a relaxing home exterior, featuring a fresh white colour palette and a minimalist garden full of gorgeous greenery.

The seamless flow of Resene Whitewater to Resene Half White Pointer gives the house lovely simplicity. Adding in some beautiful raw copper features, which protrude out, frames the windows. This warm contrast mixed with the fresh white scheme, adds a modern twist to the home and tones in with the warm timber hues.

Since we were in daydream mode, we also let Kate Rogan and Eva Nash of Rogan Nash Architects take a crack at another stunning alternative scheme:

Our inspiration came from recent projects, both in the planning and the colour scheme. We find in urban areas people are forgoing the garage in favour of an extra living space. So with this in mind, we have altered the house to create another living area at the front and changed the cladding to cedar with a Resene Waterborne Woodsman stain. The rest of the scheme is also urban focused with the dark roof and joinery, the bagged brick walls are in a lighter colour to give relief to the scheme and tropical planting sets off the palette.
