tuck into denim

Since your bedroom is the place you start and end your day, it makes sense to decorate it with colours that are gentle on the senses to help ease you into your day and wind down after it. Denim blues are among the easiest colours to live with and send a soothing message to your brain. Plus, their inherent greyed quality not only works well with our intense natural light but makes them even more recessive and restful than brighter, glassier blues. With walls in cosy Resene Rhino, a rich denim blue, this bedroom sets the tone for rest and rejuvenation. But to keep this deep colour from feeling too dominating or heavy, we've painted the floor in Resene Iron and added lightly coloured bedlinens for levity and balance. To dampen the contrast between your lightest and darkest hues, use mid-range tonal hues across key furniture and decorative accessories.

When it comes to colours that are both universally liked and considered universally restful, blues simply can't be beaten. This serene bedroom features a range of tones right from a soft, shell white with a whisper of blue grey, Resene Barely There, through to deep and inky charcoal blue Resene Cinder. The look is all about layering those blue hues sky high to create depth and cosiness. To break things up, a few deliberate touches of dusty brick red in Resene Mocha provide complementary contrast to the greener tones of Resene Hermitage on the back left wall, deeper Resene Inside Back behind the bed and paler Resene Half Duck Egg Blue on the floor. A bedside table and a few small accessories in deep Resene Cinder play off the dark navy bedlinen to ground the space while the cosy rug and throw bring tactile comforts and the textured artwork and potted plants lend an organic touch.

top tip

a touch of texture

While you won't want to fill your slow-down space with too many wildly different colours or décor that shouts for attention, it's still important to create interest – and the best way to do that is with contrast. While bringing in colours in sharply contrasting values is one way to break things up, mixing in a few items that have different textures is a gentler option. Choose natural textures, like dried florals, woven linens and handmade pottery to contrast with your smooth painted surfaces. Try using warmer colours like dusty rose to accent cooler tones such as powder blues to create a contrast in visual temperature.

art appreciation

Visiting an art gallery or museum is a rejuvenating activity, but there's nothing stopping you from replicating that same experience in the comfort of your own home. Simple and clean yet warm and inviting, walls in Resene Cashmere, a soft suede with a hint of blush in its undertone, make for an elegant and refined base when combined with a light violet-grey floor in Resene Quarter Rakaia – one that's far more welcoming than a plain white. Rather than pricey and impossibly heavy granite plinths – which you might be hardpressed to get inside your home - mimic the look of Carrera marble by painting fibreboard cylinders in two coats of Resene Alabaster before adding thin layers of mottling and veins with Resene FX Paint Effects medium mixed with Resene Half Stack to create dedicated displays for your well-curated treasures.

For most of human history, our connection to nature was a given as our daily lives were intimately tied to the cycles of the sun, the seasons and the natural world around us. It's only in more recent times that we have started to earn a living, go shopping, enjoy endless entertainment and even socialise without ever leaving home. While convenient, this separation from nature may be taking a toll on our health. Although no indoor environment can replace the experience of the natural world, research is showing that incorporating nature into the built environment – whether in the form of sunlight and fresh ventilation, decorating with plants and organic materials or painting your space in earth-inspired hues – can improve comfort, reduce stress and potentially contribute to improved health indicators. This principle is known as biophilic design.

As more of us have begun to understand the benefits of biophilic design, natural colours like Resene Bone, Resene Copyrite, Resene Castle Rock and Resene Stonewashed have become increasingly popular. But today, there is no earthy hue more desirable to decorate with than green. From olive and army like Resene Olive Green, Resene Waiouru and Resene Siam, deep forest greens like Resene Black Forest, Resene Jurassic and Resene Raptor to grey greens like Resene Paddock and Resene Finch, the choices for on-trend greens are as broad as the ways you can use them in your home.

earthy elegance

Leveraging the potential health benefits of an earthy look doesn't mean you have to forgo an air of glamour. In this sophisticated space, the deliciously saturated Resene Waiouru headboard wall oozes earthy yet refined charm and effectively grounds the space. But rather than take the colour all the way from floor to ceiling in the ensuite, the colour drenches the lower half of the wall while Resene Eighth Black White on the upper half of the wall helps reflect more light onto your face as you're looking in the mirror getting ready for the day. Finish off your palette with details in a classic black like Resene Nero, a blackened white like Resene Black White, brass finishes and soft bedlinens in a mix of white, olive and forest greens for an extra chic look.

out of the woods

Earthy greens like Resene Wilderness have skyrocketed in popularity as the base hue of choice for grounding colour schemes - and with good reason. This warm and welcoming tone has nature written all over it, and what could be more relaxing than being cosily tucked away in a cabin in the woods? Bring this bedroom look home with walls and a lamp painted in Resene Woodland, timber flooring stained in Resene Colorwood Rock Salt and furniture stained in Resene Colorwood Natural, then laver in small accessories painted in Resene Scotch Mist, deliciously soft bedding in hues inspired by Resene Brown Sugar and Resene Vista White and a few literal nods to nature like fresh greenery or dried florals.

back to nature

Biophilic design makes ample use of materials like exposed wood to create a warm, natural aesthetic that supports a home's healing objectives. So if you're including timber flooring, walls or ceilings as part of your design, you can create a positive biophilic response by choosing Resene wood stains or washes that allow the natural beauty of the timber grain to show through, such as Resene Colorwood Whitewash. Choosing paint colours that evoke nature can also provide a positive biophilic response. Resene Copyrite is a wonderful choice for walls and ceilings because it's a chameleon, making it a flexible option for the base of your palette. While not overtly green, this warm grev has a green undertone that becomes more or less pronounced depending on what it's

Clay colours like Resene Tuscany and Resene Chelsea Gem have earthy warmth baked right into them and make a welcome addition to a restful living space through accents like vases, bowls or smaller pieces of furniture. And woody browns like Resene Triple Dune and Resene Wood Bark can bring added contrast and depth without the starkness of a black or charcoal



a place amongst the pines

There's renewed popularity in wall panelling, including batten and tongue-and-groove looks as well as more traditional wainscoting - but with a creative twist. While it may sound counterintuitive to add formality to an earthy space that's meant to be a casual, restful retreat, minimalist timber wall panelling can actually enhance its tranquillity by creating a sense of order. Rather than standard wainscoting, which often includes ornate trims to create a recessed effect, opting for simple, linear panelling that protrudes from the wall puts an interesting, contemporary twist on a traditional idea. With little more than a tape measure, a level and a power drill, you can install MDF panelling yourself over the course of a weekend. Prime your panelling and trims first in Resene Quick Dry primer before painting both them and your walls in two coats of Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen tinted to Resene Jurassic or another favourite earthy colour of your choice. Incorporate a shelf into your panelling design to give you plenty of space to display books, accessories and DIY artwork in popular pastel tones like Resene Emerge, Resene Urbane, Resene Half Rakaia, Resene Double Rakaia and Resene Alpaca to offset the depth of your new wall colour. Finish the look with a whitewashed timber floor in Resene Colorwood Whitewash for balance and levity.

tap into texture

Take a woven texture to your walls in an earthy green hue with Resene Wallpaper Collection ORB105. Evocative of a grass cloth but with a tighter weave, this design lends a touchable, organic feel and rich colour to a space. Pair it with décor made from natural materials like granite, soapstone and clay with a few painted accents in brick red like Resene Hot August, sandy brown like Resene Desert Sand and green grey like Resene Grey Olive for a warm and grounded look that's rooted in nature.

taking shape

Double down on your earthy look by using organic hues to paint a wall design made up of organic shapes. To create an ombre-style design that fades from darker Resene Pewter to lighter Resene Pumice, first divide your wall up into a grid using a ruler and a pencil. Then, draw different shapes within each square – with smaller/fewer shapes on your outer squares and larger/extra shapes in your inner squares. Then, handpaint your shapes and backgrounds in two coats of Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen using a high-quality angled paintbrush – available at your local Resene ColorShop. Use your darker colour for the backgrounds on the right side of your wall and your lighter hue for the backgrounds on the left and use the opposite colour to fill in your shapes. Because there is no taping or masking involved, the process of painting this design is very therapeutic and can be done at your own pace, in your own time – it's the imperfections that give it its charm.

nouveau chic

Popular in parts of Europe during the first two decades of the 20th century, there have been a few noticeable nods to Art Nouveau-inspired design popping up. While this trend could be attributed to the recent revival of Art Deco colours. shapes, materials and finishes - the design movement that immediately followed – it may also be tied to the resurgence in nature motifs as Art Nouveau was renowned for its flowing, vine-like shapes. Décor as simple as this headboard design, which echoes the period details from the Paris Métro station entrances, a lamp that resembles a calla lily and a painted mirror that emulates Charles Rennie Mackintosh's famous rose design are all you need to add an Art Nouveau touch to your space. But don't overlook a period-appropriate colour palette of Resene Finch, Resene Black Forest, Resene Lime White and Resene Nero to support your more overt motifs.

Though plain, pared back, all-white spaces may have once been thought of as the epitome of contemporary design, it turns out living in an environment that's too sterile and devoid of colour doesn't do your mental wellbeing any favours. As a remedy to boring walls (and something fun to do to pass the time), spaces with bold and graphic painted elements surfaced as a significant trend during lockdowns. But even as restrictions have loosened, decorators are continuing to uniquely express themselves through creative and customised decorating. Whether you're dreaming of a statement wall in an eye-catching colour and design, want to build up a richly layered pattern-on-pattern look or feel like even just a little more character would go a long way, putting your personality on display has never been more in voque.

pattern play

Pattern mixing is one of those decorating skills that many of us are afraid to try ourselves, but it's far easier than you might expect. One foolproof idea is to stick to patterns which are all within the same colour family, such as blue, so it will be immediately noticeable that they share something key in common. Don't overlook walls, furniture and flooring as places you can add more patterns using paint. To create this wall design we painted two different types of stripes on top of our base wall colour, Resene Alabaster. First, use high quality painter's tape to mask off where you want your wider stripes to be and then paint them in two coats of Resene Frozen. Once dry, remove the tape and use Resene Quarter Frozen to hand paint your thinner top stripe on in two coats using a large paintbrush to give it softer, imperfect edges and a casual vibe that's perfect for relaxed everyday living or the bach.

walls that move you

Adding a dynamic painted pattern to a wall can be a great way to bring interest to an otherwise simple room. Depending on the colours and the busyness of the design, it can either inject energy into the room or create a sense of balance and harmony. There are plenty of interesting patterns in the Resene Wallpaper Collection to choose from or you can paint your own design on your walls, floor, ceiling or a piece of furniture.

Resene

This allows you to completely customise the size, shape, scale, colours and form and create a look that's entirely unique to you and your space. The painted herringbone design in this bedroom, with its embedded arrows, pushes the eye back and forth across the space to take in all the details. But because it is made up of gentle tonal blues, the pattern doesn't overwhelm. Instead, it sets the tone for the colour scheme used throughout the rest of the space so that it all hangs together cohesively. The best part is that it's simple to create using high-quality painter's masking tape, a pencil, a ruler and a level.

Checkerboard designs are not only hugely popular. they're also classic and versatile. The pattern can be spun to fit with just about any style from French country to retro, chic or funky. You can paint this design anywhere to inject a bit of fun into your space, even on something as small as a coaster but a painted checkerboard floor is a choice that will keep looking classic long after the peak of this trend has passed. Once your floor is finished, you may not want to stop! Create repetition within your space by painting vases, plant pots, lampshades and furniture in checkerboard designs using different colour combinations like Resene Triple Bison Hide and Resene Half Bison Hide. When picking a place to paint a bold or graphic design, don't discount your fifth and sixth 'walls' – the ceiling and floor. With a stencil, you can create the look of a tin ceiling or tiled floor in a matter of hours at a fraction of the cost of the real thing. A high contrast dark on light design in Resene Meringue and Resene Black Sand spells sophistication and elegance in this lounge. The bold DIY artwork, created with Resene testpots, brings the palette and geometry of the floor design up onto the wall, repeating motifs and shapes featured throughout the space for a unified look.



circle back

Resene Sea Fog

Rethinking the way you use neutrals can set your space apart and even a simple achromatic palette can be bold, eve-catching and undeniably modern with the right design. This graphic black, white and grey dining room adorned with a split circle motif has style in spades. What makes it so effective is its clear repetition of the same design and colours across multiple surfaces. However, the scale of the circle design gets smaller in proportion to the surface it is covering. While you could keep the look entirely neutral, a few pops of golds like Resene Apache, Resene Tussock and Resene Hot Toddy on plant pots, vases and bowls breaks things up. They are an ideal accent colour for their vibrancy and strength - just what is needed to stand out against the high contrast hues.

pixel perfect

You don't have to be a masterful artist to create an artistic wall or floor design. With a pencil, ruler, level and some high-quality painter's masking tape, a 'pixelated' design is always within reach. Once you decide where you want to put it and what scale to paint your squares, the more challenging part will be which Resene colours to use and what shape you want it to take. You could stick to a single colour family for an ombre effect, choose a selection of complementary hues for a boldly contrasting look or leverage the whole spectrum and create a rainbow. While you can certainly take this concept across an entire wall, it also works great in smaller doses to act as artwork, fill in odd areas or visually frame your furniture. Use select pixel colours to paint various objects and accessories to bring the colour off the wall and into the rest of your space for a cohesive look.

Since the pandemic began, maximalism has made a big comeback. But there's a common misconception – mainly, that maximalism implies that your space needs to be filled with a lot of 'stuff'. However, maximalism is more about having lots of colour. And rather than just increasing the number of possessions you own, it's more important to surround yourself with objets d'art, mementoes, curios, rich textures and bold patterns and hues that you truly love. Maximalism also stretches across movements: so depending on what you want to display, its principles can be used to create very different looks. For one decorator, maximalism might be found in an eclectic guest bedroom in the English countryside with patterned wallpaper, chintzy drapery and a somewhat chaotic collected atmosphere. The Memphis Design movement, with all its playful colours, geometric patterns and squiggly silhouettes can carry the same exuberant spirit – as can a room filled with treasures from far flung places which give off a well-travelled air – with a completely different treatment. Whatever your style and tastes, a proper maximalist look is a wellcurated one, where everything in the space has importance and meaning. Colours, textures and materials that reflect a collective sense of nostalgia are a significant current design trend, and it's understandable why. Given the amount of time most of us have spent inside lately, the popularity of pastoral looks - which embrace the essence of homeliness and a wistfulness for the 'good old days' - are an attempt to ground ourselves during uncertain times. Decorating with natural tones, artisanal objects and tactile textures reflects our desire to protect and preserve what is becoming increasingly important to us: the environment we live in. Stonewashed linens, plaid and gingham patterns, dried florals, handmade pottery, solid timber furniture and vintage antiques are all part of the look, but today's preference for minimalism puts them to use in more pared back ways. Sun-bleached pastels, mauves, greys, beiges, browns and terracotta tones are natural fits for pastoral looks, but their mismatched

nature also lends an opportunity to use quirky colours to customise your space.

While an authentic vintage patina can be guite desirable on older items, there are also many Resene products that you can use to restore an item that's looking a little too worse for wear or to lend a weathered vibe to a newer piece Resene Colorwood Natural timber stain is a beautiful hue for bringing golden warmth to wooden furniture or flooring while Resene Colorwood Whitewash and Resene Colorwood Greywash can be used to create a weathered look. Chalk finishes and waxes such as Karen Walker Chalk Colour and Karen Walker Vintage Wax can be used to add colour with a velvety matte finish or be rubbed over a colour coat to impart a rustic one. And noncontact surfaces such as light fixtures or decorative accents in materials like plastic, timber, concrete and metal can be given the look of years of rust in mere hours with Resene FX Faux Rust Effect.

Use Resene FX Paint Effects medium to give newer walls an aged look. Choose two similar Resene paint colours – one that's lighter and one that's a couple of steps darker – that are similar to the material you want to mimic. At the end of a long day, there is nothing like coming home to a bedroom look that's rooted in beloved memories and the things you love most. This pastel paint palette was inspired by a favourite throw, one that always brings comfort when it's wrapped around the shoulders. By taking Resene Half Halcyon, Resene Moonbeam and Resene Moby to the walls and Resene Scotch Mist to the floor, that same sense of cosiness and nostalgia envelops the entire space. Resene Moonbeam has been painted only partway up the main wall, which not only echoes the squares on the throw, but the contrast between the Resene upper and adjacent walls creates the effect of a headboard without overwhelming the space with too much yellow. The rest of the space has been kept simple and understated, with only a patterned rug and a few woven cane furnishings breaking from the white, yellow and blue colour palette, lending the space a simplistic yet sunny vibe.

An eclectic mix of tones can create a rich and complex look rather than one that's overly matchy. Industrial interiors are often associated with lofty apartments and gentrified factory buildings that have been repurposed and converted into urban dwellings, especially those that feature exposed brick or metal beams, pipes or ducts. However, you can take elements of this trendy interior style and make them work in nearly any type of home. From upscale Scandi homes to casual farmhouses, industrial elements can be mixed with many different decorative styles. Leaving unfinished, raw and exposed elements is key for getting the 'factory' vibe that's synonymous with industrial style, so it's important to show the 'bones' and interesting architectural features of your space where possible. The colours you choose to decorate your industrial design are an important part of getting the right effect, too. Grey, brown, silver and black are prevalent in industrial colour schemes. 

Textured finishes. whether achieved through a Resene paint effect or wallpaper soften the edges of a space and make it more comfortable and appealing to be in. They add interest and a sense of movement to large expanses of wall, and make you want to reach out and touch surfaces. Textures are becoming more casual, a simple and effective way to add interest to neutral wall colours and evoke far flung exotic destinations.

There are many ways to add texture to your spaces with Resene products such as Resene FX Paint Effects medium. Resene FX Faux Rust Effect. Resene FX Crackle. Resene Sandtex or Resene FX Metallic paints.

One of the most popular modern textured styles is a casual limewashed concrete look, reminiscent of Mediterranean villas or mudbrick homes. Try a tone-ontone effect by picking two variations - one dark, one light - of the same hue for a natural earthy finish. For example you could try popular Resene Tea as your main wall colour, then apply a patched topcoat in Resene FX Paint Effect medium mixed with Resene Half Tea for a hand-washed chalky effect.

A retaliation to design industrialisation and digitisation is a resurgence in artistic styles. One trend that's big right now is the brushstroke look where you can add bold strokes of paint in a different shade over your base wall colour. It can be a really fun, creative way to add texture and interest to large stretches of wall, and some complexity and interest to your colour palette.

Try a subtle neutral base colour like the soft pink of Resene Wax Flower and add edginess by overlaying it with strokes of deeper Resene Cab Sav. Add a layer of wispier white with Resene FX Paint Effects medium mixed with Resene Scotch Mist. The Resene Colorwood We Speak Beach range is a colour wash as opposed to a wood stain. Both enhance the timber colour and allow the timber grain to show through. Some of the most popular interior colour and design styles are also finding their way to our home exteriors. as we aim for seamless transitions between inside and out. These include the use of warmer neutrals like Resene. Triple White Pointer, or Resene Carrara, with the warmth

of Resene Uluru wood stain.

On the flipside many of us are appreciating the power of colour on our exteriors to give our homes the uplifting individual touches we love inside. When choosing bolder exterior colours think about the landscape your home sits in or the colours in your garden to find inspiration – whether it's beachy blues like Resene Duck Egg Blue or vibrant sunset shades like corals or leafy greens.





Painted archways are a quick and easy way to makeover a room without the need for complete reinvention. Arches make a great focal point to show off items of furniture or decor, and are an inventive way to mark out different spaces in a single room. Try an arch as a headboard, a dining room backdrop or even to frame wall shelves painted in the same shade. going up

If you're looking for a sense of height and airiness in a space, vertical stripes or lines will make a room feel taller - just as horizontal stripes can make larger spaces feel cosier and more contained.

A wide stretch of wall in a block colour can start to make your room feel squat in shape. Adding groups of three or five narrow stripes, or painted battens, spaced around a room will balance that out by drawing the eye up, rather than out.

This stripe effect is also worth remembering if you're putting in a fence or deck outside. The direction you lay your timber will change how long or wide your outdoor area feels. Looking along long lengths of timber over a deck, then up vertical lines on a fence, will elongate your space, while upright posts will shorten the space and make your garden feel more compact.

The plainest of walls can be easily dressed up with battens, which continues to be a popular trend. But there's another option to create interesting walls without needing any building skills – simply add frames!

Resene Merino

Upcycle or buy new inexpensive frames depending on the style and look you are after. Op shops are a great place to find these. Remove the glass and backings – you can put them aside for another project. Paint the frames inside and out with your chosen Resene colour. Use masking tape to decide where you will place the frames on the wall or lay your frames out on the floor and get the combination right before you start hanging the frames. For a fun alternative look, add a mirror, a piece of art or paint the framed area in Resene FX Chalkboard Paint

While it is most common to paint the frames in the same Resene paint and colour as the wall, you can opt for a contrasting sheen, using Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss to give your frames a subtle visual contrast to low sheen walls.

Simple, painted lines can be a very effective way to break up large stretches of wall and create the illusion of extra space in smaller rooms. Use outlines to frame hero furniture. pieces you want to showcase or create different use areas within a single room. Try painted outlines in bold contrasting colours or for a subtler, shadowy effect try a darker shade of your wall colour. For example, if your walls are Resene Quarter Tea, try adding a painted outline in Resene Triple Tea for a tonal finish.

Whether it's the hub for your business, a sometimes satellite office to keep you up to date or a space to pay household bills and organise the family, a home office should offer a comfortable, practical space to get things done. Do you have under-used spaces in your house? They're typically transition areas like a landing at the top of stairs, entry foyers, back porches or a joining point of two passageways.

With some imagination and smart design a lot of these spaces can be transformed into functional, appealing places that add value to how you live in your home. It might be a comfy spot to put your shoes on when you're leaving home, a handy place to perch groceries as you
