

## black tie

A cool colour combo for any occasion.

**It can be** smart or casual, it can give a Scandi look, a beach buzz or a hit of French flair. Black and white is one of the most classic and versatile colour combos. Here, a monochromatic scheme of black, white and grey is given a lift with metallic accessories, as well as a beautiful Moroccan-style stencil in Resene Half Delta on the back wall (Resene Alabaster) of the cabinet.

The exterior of an upcycled cabinet is painted in Resene Blackboard Paint, acting not only as a handy place for family messages and notes, but also as a bold frame to the lovely collection of objects behind the glass doors.

The wall, skirting and floor are in Resene Quarter Alabaster while three vases are in Resene All Black, Resene Transmission (tall) and Resene Triple Rakaia (small round). The letter E is in Resene All Black, and the number 2 is in Resene Enamacryl Metallic in colour Resene Exponent. For more ideas and stockists, see page 11.



# citrus splash

#### A zesty twist to a summery dining room.

**Grey is an** on-trend neutral and when you add a slice or two of the zesty citrus tones of yellow and orange, you create a stunning colour-popping dining setting.

The yellow chairs are not only mismatched in style but are painted in similar but different Resene yellows from the new Resene The Range fashion colours 16 – Resene Wild Thing (at back), Resene Bright Lights (side) and Resene Teddy (front). In a similar vein, a grouping of old plates has been painted in a variety of oranges – from bottom left clockwise, Resene Adrenalin, Resene Touche, Resene Juicy (two plates on right), and Resene Clockwork Orange (centre).

Add some bright tableware (including a vase painted in Resene Touche), hand-painted geometric placemats in the same colours as the plates, tropical greenery and fruit... and you have a sizzling summery setting.

The wall is in Resene Quarter Foundry, the palm pot is in Resene Transmission and the floor is in Resene Colorwood Whitewash.

#### easy ombre

This is a super-easy way to create an ombre (graduated tonal colour) wall. Simply paint a series of planks or weatherboards in dark to light shades of the same colour using a decreasing number of boards – five for the darkest, then four for the next colour and so on.

#### moorish magic

Add a magical twist to the back of a cabinet or bookshelf by stenciling a pattern in paint. It can be as simple or complicated as you like – this one has a lovely Moorish or Moroccan flavour and is done in Resene Half Delta on a Resene Alabaster background. The vases are also painted in (from left) Resene All Black, Resene Transmission and Resene Triple Rakaia.

#### well placed

Make your own herringbone patterned placemats by painting pieces of ply or old placemats in a coat of Resene Half Athens Grey, hand-cut and apply some masking tape for a more organic feel, then paint with a variety of orange paints (Resene Juicy, Resene Touche, Resene Clockwork Orange and Resene Adrenalin). Remove the masking tape, lightly sand back the surface if you want a weathered effect, then protect it all with Resene Aquaclear.

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

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

Colour perception is affected by many factors, including the size of the sample viewed. Generally the bigger the sample, the easier it is to distinguish the colour, which is why Resene recommends using all of a Resene testpot on an A2-sized card to view the true colour. To make this even easier, Resene BigColour – a large A2 sized paint swatch – is available for the most popular Resene



colours. The Resene BigColour swatch can be moved around the space to be painted, and folded into the corners to see how it will look on adjacent walls. To imagine how a colour would look on all four walls, bend the large colour sample into a cylinder shape with the paint on the inside, then look down into the cylinder for the full colour effect. Resene BigColour swatches are available for ordering from Resene ColorShops, RRP \$8 per swatch.

## high fashion meets colour

Young Kiwi fashion designers took up the challenge to turn silks into high fashion recently at a Resene-sponsored event for New Zealand Fashion Week.

50 silks inspired by paint colours from Resene were selected. Then 45 students from NZ Fashion Tech's Diploma classes in Auckland and Wellington were briefed to design and make a contemporary-chic fashion look from the delicate hand-woven silks, responding to the Resene paint colour they had been given.

The result was a colour spectacle. Marketing manager Karen Warman of Resene says: "Paint colours have for many years been inspired by colours seen on catwalks and in the latest fashion trends. It's a nice twist to reverse the order and have paint colours used as inspiration for the catwalk."

Reds are strong and powerful, with influencing blue tones, such as the ever-popular Resene Pohutukawa and new Resene Red Letter. Fire engine red is not to be ignored with hues such as Resene Havoc.

### top trends



- Use colour blocking, stripes and stencilling to combine favourite colours for a personalised look. Rotate stripes to the vertical and don't just restrict yourself to the walls furniture, flooring, spread your creativity around.
- Coloured ceilings: once pure white, ceilings are increasingly being painted to complement or accent the wall colour. Wall colours that extend onto the ceiling create a sense of enclosure. Bold feature colours on ceilings are the next frontier; a new twist on a feature wall.
- Walls are becoming multipurpose, with clever products to turn them into write-on walls, chalkboards or magnet boards.
  - Enhance the raw beauty of natural materials with protective products. Think concrete wax
    on concrete floors and benchtops, clear finishes on timber and water repellents on exterior
    concrete. These products protect the surface and keep it looking good without changing
    the aesthetic.

When it comes to green, the coming trends are diverse. On the dark side there are the earthy camouflage and natureinspired shades with hues such as Resene Seaweed. On the lighter side there are the striking look-at-me greens, such as Resene Kakapo. For something more restful there are fresh mint and airy greens. Neutrals act as a backdrop to the brights, a launch pad as you progress down the path to bolder choices. Blackened neutrals such as Resene Quarter Alabaster continue their popularity and work well with the deep grey accents, while green-edged neutrals like Resene Ragamuffin are on the up-swing. H

rainbow of waterfront buildings, sea tones set beside each other on a bach exterior, muted colours used as feature blocks on a home's ceilings and walls, and a magical colour blocked stained ceiling... carefully chosen Resene colour palettes became the highlights across the spectrum of categories in the recently announced Resene Total Colour Awards.

The **Residential Exterior** category was awarded to Edwards White Architects for a bach inspired by the 1950s and 1960s 'dune-hopper' vernacular in which forms and blocks were treated to a simple related colour scheme of Resene Undercover, Resene Avocado, Resene Gravel and Resene Rice Cake. The paintwork in coastal colours provided a cost effective method to distinguish the respective forms and evoke a relaxed atmosphere suited to the beach.

The **Residential Interior** award went to Henri Sayes for his own new home where the integration of

feature walls and ceilings helped to delineate and define spaces as well as make the space feel playful and considered. As the judges commented: "Subdued and considered, the integration of colour adds an element of surprise. It's not bright or garish yet still adds personality to the space." The colours shown here are Resene Bonanza on the ceiling, Resene Raptor in the study and Resene Friar Grey on the living room walls. Other walls are Resene Black White.

A Residential Interior Maestro award went to architect John Mills for a colour blocked ceiling of stained plywood inspired by the flight of the tui. The judges said: "Ceilings are often neglected yet the sense of colour is spectacular on this ceiling and simply framed by the subtle use of colour on the walls." The stains were customised for the project by Resene; the stairwell wall shown here is in Resene Gulf Stream. Also see our colour blocking feature on page 46 for another view of this home. H

# coast meets country

The colours of a driftwood-strewn beach on a bright summer's day gently wash over this designer's own home.

he soft greys and whites of driftwood and sand; the luminous teal blue skies of North Otago. These are the colours that inspired the interior of Annabel and Simon Berry's home on the rolling downs behind Oamaru.

At the same time, other features in the house – like the replica tongue-and-groove doors and dado panels – reflect the rural setting of their newly built home and their love of character detailing.

Simon, CEO of the multi-award winning Whitestone Cheese company, lured Annabel from Christchurch to Oamaru in 2010. She found her niche as the general manager at Tourism Waitaki and the couple married the following year. They built their four-bedroom home in 2012 and have three children: Mia (two), Jackson (16 months) and newborn baby boy Boe.

While Annabel was on parental leave with Mia, she completed a Diploma of Interior Design. "I've always loved design and styling, so I launched my new business, Design Federation."

While the house was built and decorated with children in mind, it's also a casually elegant domain for adults. The media room is Simon and Annabel's evening retreat, where the rich dark Resene Tuna hugs the walls. An open fireplace and floor to ceiling bookshelves painted in Resene Half Milk White create a homely atmosphere.

"When we were choosing the features for the house we were advised to decide on just one or two rooms where we could be a bit more Resene Tuna



Both Simon and Annabel grew up in older villas on their families' farms and wanted their newly built home to retain the soul of the villa style... but without the draughts.





# paint's changing face

It's easy to forget that paint as we know it today is a relatively modern invention.

**For artists and** homeowners alike, paint as we know it today has not always been so readily accessible. Colours were limited and formulations were basic.

That all changed around the middle of last century and in an example of industry affecting art, a number of local artists began dabbling with the cement-based paint that Resene Paints founder Ted Nightingale had begun making in his Wellington garage in 1946.

The emergence and influence of modern paints has been documented and celebrated by an exhibition at the Auckland Art Gallery. Opened in April this year, *Modern Paints Aotearoa* offers a unique insight into the imagination, innovation and sheer resourcefulness of major New Zealand art names of the 20th century, including the legendary Colin McCahon, Gretchen Albrecht and Ralph Hotere.

Earlier artists were limited by the colours and textures of mediums in existence at the time: for example, the medieval era, when only natural pigments and basic handmade paints were available. While various advances occurred along the way, last century in particular saw the introduction of myriad alternatives. These were embraced with huge enthusiasm locally.

Auckland Art Gallery principal conservator and exhibition curator Sarah Hillary tells of one delightful older visitor who told of his own personal connection with the then relatively unknown brand, Resene.

"He left school at 16 and worked for Resene, putting lids on paint tins. He said he was 'chuffed' to see some old tins in the vitrine (glass showcase) and even wondered if he'd placed the lids on those particular ones!"

A huge amount of research underpinned the curation of *Modern Paints Aotearoa*. "Some visitors mentioned that until watching the videos we've put together, they had previously had no idea that art conservation is technical – and that conservators are actually scientists," smiles Sarah.





"These new paints had different qualities to traditional oils; they enabled artists to break away from past traditions – something that was already happening internationally and they were cheaper and more readily available than artist-quality paints."

She explains that the artists themselves didn't always remember or note what medium they'd used at the time, but there was definitely a move towards experimenting with general household paints during the mid-20th century – often with the addition of other materials such as sand, which is something that McCahon liked to do.

Identifying the actual paint and other artists' materials might not seem important on the face of it, but to conservators it is absolutely vital.

While overseas artists were using acrylics in the 1960s, Sarah says most local artists were using PVA. "There has been a great deal of research into the cleaning of acrylics, but not PVAs. We know that they are not as durable so great care is required."

As well as admiring and appreciating the paintings, visitors to *Modern Paints Aotearoa* can also see the well-used paintbrushes of Ralph Hotere and read Colin McCahon's original correspondence about his *Northland* panels, which are in the exhibition. There are also touch panels where a number of these artists' paint effects have been recreated.

The exhibition runs until March 2015 with various activities and events planned. For more information, visit www.aucklandartgallery.com. **H**

If it has a set of legs and a certain quirkiness, Emma-Jayne Scott will give it a great new look with paint. We're talking furniture, many pieces of which are now resplendent in bold and colourful geometric designs courtesy of Emma-Jayne's brush.

Emma-Jayne originally began painting furniture for herself, when she couldn't find a suitable buffet unit for her living room. She loved the process, so kept on going, and now promotes her pieces through her Facebook page (www.facebook.com/DrawnInDrawers) and selling on TradeMe. She also does commissions.

She loves to stretch her imagination, choosing a design to specifically suit an individual piece. Many of her designs are inspired by buildings or architectural details, and of late, geometric designs have featured.

"Geometric forms have been featuring heavily in my designs lately because they have been very popular across the board. They also work very well with the square nature of the drawers. But anything is possible; you just have to have an open mind."

Using a mix of interesting colours has often been a feature of her works. "What is design without colour? Paint was always going to feature heavily in whatever I was going to do. Each season brings new inspiration and fresh ideas," she says.

When it comes to choosing those colour combinations, Emma-Jayne has an interesting methodology: "I have little wooden houses that sit on my mantelpiece that are painted in all of my latest Resene testpots. We – my children and myself – move them around a lot and from there we seem to get some very interesting colour combos."

# like **clockwork**

**Some people were** born with design nous. Auckland designer Nikolai Sorensen is one of them. He's taken a simple product as old as time – the clock – and given it a simple and stylish makeover that draws the eye.

A plywood dodecagon with slices of washed colour, each clock is so much more than a timekeeper. The sharp design reminds us of the segments of a cleanly sliced orange – made more so when Nikolai uses a wash of Resene Clementine Orange from the Resene Karen Walker Paints collection.

Nikolai majored in product design for his design degree at AUT University, and worked part-time at design store Essenze at its (now closed) Parnell store. Surrounded by works of top New Zealand artists, Nikolai realised that the products instore, as well as beautiful, were also manageable to produce. He also noticed a gap in the market for functional wall art. He got to work.

Not long after, Nikolai's segment clocks caught the eye of AUT University peer Mike Grobelny. They collaborated on product design and in 2012 started furniture design company Trestle Union.

Their pieces are affordable and practical, but still stylish: they include sturdy trestle legs with coloured

ropes and hardwearing trestle tops made with functionality in mind.

"I found at my age that I wanted quality design pieces but couldn't afford them," says Nikolai. "We decided to strip back all the fluff and frills of the design and materials to make it more affordable. When it comes down to it, Mike and I share the same design ethic: products need to have clean lines, be uncomplicated and, most importantly, be practical."

The pair is constantly prototyping new ideas, and it takes months before they test it on the market. Their focus on lower priced product with higher design value has garnered Trestle Union a loyal following for those decorating home offices and small business fitouts.

But back to those beautiful clocks. Nikolai enjoys taking custom orders from clients, letting them choose their colours and the number of painted segments.

"I'm really big on co-creation – with their input, I hope to help our buyers feel more connected to our pieces."



# how to... colour block

It's a simple on-trend way to create eye-catching and personalised interiors – colour blocking. Left: Making the most of her already panelled kitchen, Karen Kyriakoudis used Resene Ziggurat (blue), Resene Glamour Puss (paler pink) and then Resene Havoc mixed with Resene Alabaster to inject some colour into the room.

Right: To offset the predominantly raw, natural materials of this house designed by Tim Dorrington of DAA, he and homeowners Mark and Susie Easterbrook chose strong, sunny, vibrant colours – Resene Monza (red), Resene Supernova (yellow) and Resene Chilean Fire (orange) for the kitchen. **Colour blocking is** exactly what it sounds like: a design technique that groups blocks of colour together. It's a simple way to not only dress up your walls but also your house exterior, ceilings and furniture.

#### **Colour blocking tips:**

- If you're colour blocking interior walls, start with one wall of a room or you'll end up with visual confusion.
- When you're starting out, stick to three colours, which are easier to manage. Also limit yourself to simple shapes: squares and rectangles.
- For added dimension, you can add white or black lines between each colour, easily created with masking tape. Think Mondrian paintings.
- Use colours with the same saturation values, ie either all soft pastels, or all deep clear colours.
- Or, use varying shades of the one colour, like four different blues.
- Or for a more intriguing effect, use colours close to each other on the colour wheel, ie oranges and reds, purples and blues, yellows and oranges.
- For a subtle take on colour blocking, try varying the gloss levels and texture. For example, if you use Resene Enamacryl gloss next to Resene SpaceCote Flat, the change in finish will provide the interest. You might then include an anaglypta wallpaper to paint over, for texture, in another block.



joyous jumble of sunny colour welcomes visitors to the Nettle house on the outskirts of Havelock North. Pinks, blues, oranges, yellows and greens – walls painted in almost every hue of the lolly bag mix it up with an array of multi-coloured furnishings.



Yes, Trudie loves colour but the interiors didn't start out that way. When the family first moved in, all of the walls and trims were in white Resene Alabaster. 
## go colour block crazy in this smart living room

These owners clearly love colour. In the existing room, my eye was drawn to the highlight window. I used colour blocking to create pattern and remove the window from being the feature of the room. The colours chosen were from the new Resene The Range fashion colours 16 fandeck. What is a fashion colour? You only need to look toward your latest clothing purchases. It's fun to play with colour in an area like this. It can be easily repainted when the moment passes or your tastes change. These colours only pop when balanced by the right white. I chose Resene Double Alabaster for its warmth. It's best to have neutral well-designed furniture that will last, and then experiment with paint colours. The over-scale pendant light over the coffee table creates a focal point, centered to the room, to add scale and balance.


## differing greys backdrop this sophisticated room



## Sydney-based designer **Meg Tuckett** suggests this alternative scheme:

I chose to use a 'true grey' (Resene Armadillo) as a feature wall so that it frames everything in the room, letting your eyes travel over the furniture and accessories. Although dark, Resene Armadillo does have warm undertones. A 'warm grey' (Resene Eighth Tapa) is then used on the other walls. It's a perfect complement for most of the furnishing colours, especially the pink and bright whites, and also works well with the natural timbers to really warm up the room. The room is quite sophisticated but also contemporary and comfortable. The timber floor, finished in Resene Teak from the Resene Colorwood stains range, grounds this scheme and is balanced by other timber elements, such as the furniture. Resene Double Alabaster is my go-to colour for ceilings and trims. It has warmth and is the perfect white.

# **softly** SOftly

Soft whitewash-effect cabinets and a shot of green give this kitchen natural good looks.

rom amidst the grunty robustness and honesty of a house sculpted from concrete and finished with sweeping plywood walls, a bright pop of Resene Wasabi green springs from the kitchen.

It's a fitting colour, matching the sweeping grass pastures outside the large windows in the adjoining living room. Used sparingly, it freshens the kitchen's glass splashback as well as an upstand at the end of the island bench.

Joining it, the plywood cabinets have a soft whitewash-effect finish, created by using the pale Resene Rock Salt stain from the Resene Colorwood range, which is then topped with protective coats of Resene Aquaclear. Pine battens decorate one wall of the kitchen, and were given the same treatment.

Says homeowner Ann: I did not want the typical blonded ply finish... We wanted the timber grain to still be obvious but with a white background." She and husband Noel had the perfect person to discuss



their desires with – their niece Tessa Macrae, who worked at the local Resene ColorShop in Masterton for several years. Any walls that aren't ply, and the ceilings, are painted in Resene Quarter Tea.

Aside from the green touches, a feature of the kitchen is the unusual Elica extractor fan, which looks more like a light fitting. It has an extensive filtering system so doesn't need to be vented.

The kitchen layout was included on the house plans, from Studio of Pacific Architecture in Wellington with input from Ann. At one end of the kitchen, a walk-in pantry has a second sink.

Ann has a dislike of stainless steel appliances so chose white instead. When it came to the bench, however, stainless steel won out for its durability and resistance to heat and staining.  ${\rm H}$

# character

Take a small space and add splashes of personality for a stunning result.



### did you know...

that the Resene Kitchen & Bathroom range combines anti-bacterial silver protection and MoulDefender to minimise unwanted nasties in kitchens, bathrooms and laundries? t's a homeowner's dilemma – do you insert a modern bathroom into a character home, or design something more in keeping with the original style?

For Maggie Robertson, the answer was clear. It was character all the way... right down to placing a dainty side table beside the free-standing bath, hanging artworks and using a pair of whimsical Venetian glass wall-lights that she had packed away for years.

Says Maggie: "I wanted a look of faded grandeur but I don't like furniture or accessories that are purposely distressed or aged. I also wanted to be able to hang art and for it to not look out of place."

One artwork is by Otago-based stonemason Marcus Wainwright who specialises in repairing statuary. Sitting above the bath, it is lit from above to highlight the carved relief and set into an impressive layered frame.

The result is a space that looks like any other room, but just happens to include bathroom ware. Even the oak vanity wouldn't look out of place in a living room.

Maggie actually planned and ran the renovation of her 1917 Auckland transitional villa remotely from Wellington before shifting cities, so relied on her builder Kevin Kirkbride, who she describes as a true professional and a craftsman, to make decisions on her behalf and keep her abreast of progress.

The space used to be a bedroom. The architect's layout separated the toilet which left a small bathroom. Kevin suggested the new integrated layout and included a fin wall to tuck the toilet behind and outlined the various components on the floor to demonstrate to Maggie how the layout would work.

The colour scheme of Resene Pewter and Resene Double Spanish White was inspired not only by the existing roman blind on the window but also to integrate with the rest of the house where warm creams and egg-shell blues are used. The trims are Resene Quarter Pearl Lusta.

The tongue-and-groove panelling adds character but also has a practical purpose, hiding any irregularities in the old walls behind.  $\,\,$  H

## top tips

- Circus tents are billowy, so don't worry if you paint outside the lines. Take your time.
- When painting the flag, avoid overloading the small brush with paint, as it will dribble.
- Have a play with other colours. Try Resene Zappo (purple), Resene Splat (blue) and Resene Tutti Frutti (green), all from the Resene KidzColour range.
- Finish off by painting a square from the bottom of the tent to the floor. This means that if you move the bed, you'll have a mural instead of a bedhead.

# join the circus

Create your own big top with this fun wall art.







#### Step 1

Kids, you will need an adult to help. Outline your tent by drawing a triangle. Start by ruling a line along the width of your bed at its height (we allowed for one pillow). From the centre of that line, measure 50cm up and mark. Draw two lines to form a triangle. Pencil four evenly spaced points along the bottom line and connect each to the top point, making five panels. Keep lines straight by using the level when necessary.



#### Step 3

Get painting. Use the masking tape to outline the first and fifth panel. Paint with Resene Razzamatazz (red) using the medium brush. Remove the tape and repeat with the middle panel, this time using Resene Sea World (blue).



#### Step 5

Using the small brush, paint the tent pole with Resene Sea World and flag with Resene Fizz. Once the flag is dry, fill in the letters with Resene Sea World.



#### Step 2

Use the ruler and level to draw a 20cm circus pole at the top, 3cm wide. Draw a small circle on top of the pole. Lightly pencil your name beside it. For longer names, drop down half a letter for each syllable for a 3D look. Draw a flowing flag around the letters.



#### Step 4

Paint Resene Fizz (yellow) on to the remaining panels (second and fourth). Allow one colour to be touch dry before starting the next.

# build a **birdhouse**

Adding a birdhouse to the garden is a win-win – you're supporting local bird life and gaining a slug and bug buster.



## you will need:

**Tools and equipment:** Work bench; slide compound mitre saw; nail gun, or hammer and galvanised brad nails; belt sander or sheets of sandpaper; drill and bits, including 42mm hole saw bit; jigsaw; post-hole borer or spade; wheelbarrow; safety googles and ear-muffs; Resene paint and brushes.

**Materials:** 3m of 180mm x 19mm non-treated pine, cedar or macrocarpa; 75mm x 75mm 2.4m long post; 60mm piece of doweling; quick-set concrete.

Use our bird outline as a stencil.






Cut out the pieces for the birdhouse, using the full plank width. The 180mm x 270mm roof pieces have a 45-degree bevel on one long edge so they fit together to form a gable. Ours is made for starlings so measures 450mm high to the top of the gable, with 360mm high sides. The base measures 180mm x 140mm. Sand any rough edges or surfaces.



Draw a bird shape around the hole with the foot ending on the peg and paint with Resene Black. Or you can jigsaw the shape instead. Paint the peg and insert it. Paint the roof, using a Resene testpot (which is fine for outdoor use). We used Resene Clockwork Orange.

NB: You may prefer not to include a peg as many cavitynesting birds don't need them. If you live in the north, the peg may encourage predator birds like mynah.





Mark the hole in the centre of the front panel. Line the top up with the 45-degree gable angle. Drill a hole for the peg. Also drill a couple of drainage holes in the base piece of the birdhouse.

Assemble the body of the birdhouse, nailing the front and one side together. Attach the base and the 40mm wide landing ledge inside, then add the second side and the back.

### the best birdhouses

- and finished in non-toxic finishes.
- Face east to avoid strong
- up of nest material and have a couple of drainage holes in the base.
- an annual clean-out by humans.
- Are placed by a vege garden if high enough off the ground and away from trees and fences so







Assemble the roof, spacing the struts so that they slip inside the body of the house. Fill nail holes if desired and lightly sand.

Attach the platform to the top of the pole. Bore or dig a hole and set the pole with quick-set concrete. Fill half of the birdhouse with dry wood shavings, moss or pine needles to give the birds a nesting start.

oving north to the sunny climes of Hawkes Bay inspired Steve and Annie Harrington to give their garden a radical makeover.

Magical views capture the colours of the changing seasons over the Tukituki Valley from this tranquil rural spot, making it perfect for the couple's home, and their accommodation and day spa business.

Their vision of glorious, beautifully planted outdoor entertaining spaces weren't borne out with the newly purchased property. A draughty corridor between the home and garage meant the courtyard wasn't as sheltered as it could be. The garden had "done its dash. It just wasn't going to work. The trees in the central courtyard had grown too big," says Steve. The entry was also badly positioned and lacked the sense of arrival expected of a quality quest retreat.

Most importantly, Steve and Annie wanted a "real showpiece" in the sheltered courtyard; an inviting,

yet relatively easy-care, semi-tropical enclosed area for guests that would set the scene for the uplifting experience they were about to embrace when staying here.

As for the colour choices, these were obvious. A palette of natural hues in various shades of sand, to silver grey and green was selected to harmonise with the existing walls painted in a green-edged neutral Resene Half Ash and darker trims and doors in Resene Grey Friars. That colour combination, says Annie, suits the crisp clean lines of the home and gives a smart, formal quality to the courtyard that they like.

Shots of colour and sweet-smelling plants were key to create allure around the day spa, explains Annie. And with Steve's background in advanced lighting systems, sensational outdoor lighting was always going to be part of the scheme.

When the former owners agreed to spend a year





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longer in the property, perfectionists Steve and Annie had the chance to spend time carefully planning the changes. Integral to the project was landscape designer Charlotte Pedersen of Espaso Verde.

The house and a lap pool along one side now completely define the courtyard with an impressive central outdoor kitchen and a large sitting area with an outdoor fire.

As soon as they began digging the soil Charlotte discovered, "it was all, revolting clay. So everything had to be dug out and replaced," which gave carte blanche for a totally new look.

For shape and form, Charlotte planted enormous Ligularia reinformis just inside the entry. Ilex crenata hedging defines the edges of the garden complemented by softly veined Heuchera 'Green Spice.'

Small maple trees change colour with the seasons, cycads add sculptured texture surrounded by silvery Lomandra longfolia Nyalla grass, native iris and handsome grey-green Euphorbia x martinii. Citrus trees line up against the wall closest to the outdoor kitchen ready to offer their fruity abundance.

Paradise stone inlays add detail to the courtyard floors and marry with the limestone walls built in terraces at the front of the house. Between the stone inlays, coloured concrete gives a warm sandy hue to the paths.

With the planting completed, boosted by plentiful winter rain, the Harrington courtyard garden has matured into an elegant outdoor room – the perfect setting to enjoy balmy Hawkes Bay summers, relaxing and entertaining with friends, family and guests. H

# **Emily McEwan** of Outright Landscape Design suggests this alternative look:

Bold and striking, this Mediterranean-inspired outdoor scheme has a strong underlying structure, softened by ample planting and the gentle sound of running water. The sensory experience is amplified by the use of fruiting plants such as lemon, bay laurel and Myrtus ugni hedges (Chilean guava) which when laden with ripe fruit in autumn emit a heady strawberry fragrance. Taking reference from the Roman Peristyle gardens of thousands of years ago, a chunky timber pergola in Resene English Walnut stain frames the space, supporting the elegant hanging panicles of wisteria 'Lavender Lace'. Resene Ayers Rock as an exterior house colour contrasts with the azure blue mosaic tiles of the pond, making the space sing. Invigorating, yet restful, this dual entrance and private walled garden suits its location perfectly.

The sculpture provides a key focal point within the centrally placed arrival court and a green wall creates a lush backdrop to the sculpture and softens this space. The simple yet strong design is enhanced with a richly exotic materials and plant palette. Natural materials including stone, concrete and dark stained timber in Resene Treehouse provide texture and interest. The lush sophisticated plant palette includes a native theme with groves of nikau palms under-planted with Poor Knights lily, ferns, grasses and reeds with a backdrop of textural plants on the green wall.

### What do you love most about your busy, multifaceted life?

### Tell us a bit about your current ventures.
