The borders are open, travel plans are in action and those working from home have mainly returned to the office, at least some of the time. New shipments have rejuvenated the design world, and fashion and architecture shows have brought fresh ideas.

There is no better time for the arrival of the Resene The Range fashion colours. Down to earth

Mother Nature continues to be the ultimate trendsetting 'It Girl' of the design scene, with colours, materials and furnishings inspired by the outdoors leading the way. 'Biophilic' is a term familiar to the architectural world since the 1970s, referring to the sense of comfort humans feel when in natural spaces. Now interior designers are joining architects in their love of all things natural (read more on page 28).

"Biophilia can be introduced with colour, shape, texture and the use of natural materials," says Resene Senior Architectural Representative, Rebecca Long.

"Wood is a great way to bring the outside world indoors. Wood provides comfort, warmth and a connection to nature." Adding a natural touch to your home could be as simple as enhancing wooden flooring with Resene Colorwood – try Resene Breathe Easy, a soft colourwash from the Resene We Speak Beach range. Painting walls in soothing greens and blues will also bring in relaxed charm – try Resene Vantage Point, Resene Green Days and Resene Tarzan from the Resene fashion fandeck.

Dark arts

Black has been trendy for home exteriors for the past decade, but now softer natural blacks that sit more gently in the landscape are coming into play. Opt for Resene CoolColour formulas when choosing dark exterior paints and stains, made with heat-reflective technology that helps keep dark colours cooler – so there's no need to race across a hot deck barefoot.

"Whether it's in the interior or on the exterior, we're seeing people step out of their comfort zones by using stronger colours," says Resene Colour Consultant Amy Watkins. "The key to using richer colours is to choose ones with dusty or chalky natures as they are easier to live with."

Warm it up

While the Y2K era is often synonymous with Scandinavian-inspired stark cool-white interiors, neutrals have shifted towards warmer whites. Put the change down to comfort. As many of us discovered during lockdown, cooler whites are not as soothing as their warmer counterparts. Creamy whites with yellow, brown or green undertones imbue comforting tradition and stability. Try Resene Half Blanc, Resene Quarter Pearl Lusta or Resene Half Spanish White.

"Resene Half Blanc is my new favourite white," says interior designer Melle van Sambeek. "I like its warmth, and it has a beautiful creamy softness. Use varying strengths of the same neutral throughout a home to create cohesion and depth."

Resene FX Paint Effects medium is a way to create the two-tone look of limestone or other natural materials such as cob. Try combining Resene Caraway and Resene Half Nomad for a soft,

earthy look. "Paint effects are easier than they look," says interior designer Kate Alexander. "Start with a base colour in a darker shade and then use a rag to dab on a lighter colour, working in a circular motion. Paint effects are intuitive, so it takes a bit of experimenting to get the colour balance. Avoid starting in the centre of the wall – work from a corner, where it's less noticeable, while building the colour."

A touch of sparkle

'Pearlcore' is a nature-inspired trend straight from the fashion runway. While pearls were once the emblem of tradition, they are now a youthful trend, with pearly or iridescent accents appearing on clothes, makeup and even glowing, doughnut-glaze nails.

At home, this trend translates to shimmery wallpapers (see page 47) and painted gloss and shimmer finishes. Use Resene FX Pearl Shimmer pearlescent glaze over the top of your desired Resene colour to add an iridescent sheen. "The Resene FX Pearl Shimmer product is awesome to use. It's easy to apply, and you can see the pearl shimmer immediately," says Melle.

Reinvented heritage

People often turn to the past for guidance during times of instability. In the entertainment world, lockdowns kicked off a craze for historical documentaries, Jane Austen adaptations and a slew of other period dramas. In interiors, there are multiple eras seeing revivals. Grandmillennial style is a traditional maximalist aesthetic now popular with millennials and Gen Z.

Victorian-inspired floral and botanical wallpapers are a crucial part of this trend (see page 48); wainscoting and collections of books and art complete the more-is-more look.

Grandmilliennial is a reaction to minimalism and the disposable culture millennials grew up with. An extension of this trend is the rise of a vintage beach aesthetic, with classic Hamptons and Victorian-era safari-inspired interiors having a moment. Think tongue-and-groove walls, rattan furniture, stormy blues such as Resene Watermark paired with crisp Resene Double Alabaster and canvas colours such as Resene Epitome and Resene Rice Cake.

That 70s trend

Although often maligned for questionable options, such as carpeted bathrooms and plastic couches, there's much to love about the 70s. The 70s colour palette features earthy browns, olive greens, spice hues and rustic décor, reflecting a resurgence of cottage industries, such as pottery and woodwork. The 70s look dovetails nicely into mid-century style and lends itself to mixing and matching.

"Mid-century colours tend to be vibrant and bold with some earthy tones thrown in the mix," says interior designer Annick Larkin. "Try mixing rich caramels such as Resene Yogi, burnt brick such as Resene Arriba and edgy orange such as Resene Thunderbird as they work harmoniously together thanks to their warmth. Deep aubergine and soft feminine pinks will balance this palette."

Playtime

When life gets too serious, fashion and our home décor choices become opportunities to have a little fun. The rise of neotenic design is the idea of interiors with child-like qualities. In nature, neoteny is defined by adult animals that retain juvenile features. In design, neoteny includes round-shaped furniture and pastel colours such as lilac, candy pink and buttercup yellow. "This is such a fun trend," says Kate. "An easy idea to try is painting a scalloped shape around door architraves or curved shapes on feature walls. When picking colours, opt for chalky pastel lilacs and yellows with a touch of zesty citrus edge, so any shapes are clearly visible." Try Resene Hawkes Blue, Resene Illuminate or Resene London Hue.

Embrace your curves adds Amy. "I'm seeing lots of curves in designs at the moment and a movement away from sharp edges. Curves create the feeling of movement and can be welcoming and soft."

Whichever way the wind blows – whether your decorating is inspired by the fresh greens of spring or the deep oaks of tradition – there's style on the horizon. **H**





hen David and Kirsty Wraight built their 1910s-style Marlborough villa overlooking an artificial lake, they felt the steep slope needed pathways. Since pathways need destinations, they made a summerhouse.

With its jaunty, shingled peak roof, different-coloured glass panes salvaged from a glazier's workshop and a balcony among the upper poplar branches, the summerhouse is like an illustration from a children's book. It's a perfect place for guests to relax or watch the wildlife on the nearby lake.

Inside, upcycled furniture and walls painted in Resene Quarter Rice Cake provide a light, restful space. The steeply pitched ceiling is chapellike and stained in Resene Colorwood English Walnut, a bold nut brown. "The pine timber had quite a lot of colouration, and the treatment of the timber had made it quite pink," says Kirsty. "I think if we'd gone with something paler, we wouldn't have the effect we wanted."

Resene Sandwisp, a pale corn-husk yellow, adorns the door and shutters. The summerhouse's exterior is Resene Hi-Glo gloss tinted to Resene Half Rice Cake.

The main house, a classic-style villa, sets the sophisticated mood of the property. Called Willow's Green, the home overlooks the roses, hydrangeas and azaleas to be enjoyed by guests at the Garden Marlborough festival. They may assume the house is a restored homestead, but it's just five years old. Through their business, David Wraight Cottages, David and Kirsty have been creating classic-style homes for 20 years, presenting vintage charm with the light and year-round comfort of modern homes.

But even if a house differs in style from its neighbours, it must fit in. "Communities look best when their houses blend aesthetically with each other," David says. Kirsty chose Resene Kensington Grey for Willow's Green's exterior walls to complement the neighbouring homes. "I wanted a true grey, not a blue-grey or lavender grey that would throw another colour," she says. Paints often look different in different lighting as they pick up nuances of the colour.

all the small things

Accessory dwelling units (ADUs) are small, self-contained living units, such as sleepouts or granny flats, usually on the same lot as the main house. With houses in short supply, ADUs are gaining popularity as homeowners look for options for growing families or as additional income as an Airbnb. Regulations and consents for ADUs may vary from council to council, so check local guidelines before finalising your plans.

All the exterior paint is Resene Hi-Glo waterborne gloss. "It is so durable," says David. "It will last longer in the sunlight and is easier to clean."

David, a qualified builder, oversees the construction of the houses and transportable homes produced by David Wraight Cottages; Kirsty is the interior decorator and has won a Resene Colour Home Award for this home. "I've always been interested in homes," she says. "Even as a kid, I would often rearrange my bedroom. I love playing; I love persevering. I follow a lot of designers such as designers and personalities Sarah Richardson and Lisa Holt. I tend to stay away from the ones that are straight influencers and what's trending now. I like to learn about the history of design."

She says many villas started as relatively square boxes and gradually acquired a lean-to and other additions. The kitchen was always out the back, and toilets were outside. But now, kitchens have become the centre of the home, and there are strong trends with kitchens and bathrooms.

Historically, there was far less choice in paint colours. Dark colours such as burgundy, dark blue and emerald were more commonly used in bigger homes – the colours required more dyes, which were expensive and usually only affordable by the wealthy. Kirsty appreciates the variety of Resene colours she could choose from for her villa.

She says it's easy to select complementary colours,

but to successfully bring them together, the perfect white or off-white is crucial.

Kirsty often uses Resene A4 drawdown paint swatches (A4 colour samples) to assess a colour for a space. "Especially when I'm picking off-whites. I'll take it outside, hold it up against the exterior, and then inside, to see what colours it's throwing. Because sometimes I'll think it's a bit mushroom or a bit green. which might not be what I'm after."

She wanted Willow's Green to be "restful, not too bold. I like a little bit of French inspiration and a little bit of the Hamptons – a lot of white, soft greys, panelling, but even though the house is big, I wanted it to feel cosy."

To maintain a cohesive flow through the house, Kirsty used Resene Ouarter Rice Cake on all decorative features, such as the bolection-moulded skirting boards and cornices, dado rails, wall panels and ceilings.

The walls in the main living area are painted in Resene Emerge with panels in Resene Quarter Rice Cake. "I didn't want a blue-blue, but I didn't want green either," Kirsty says. All the paints were applied by local painter David Price. The kitchen joinery, architraves and interior doors are painted with Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss waterborne enamel for easy cleaning.

Like many restored homes, the kitchen and pantry have tongue-and-groove-style ceilings. Kirsty loves the pantry as a place to prepare meals and clean up without disrupting guests.






colour me happy

As an interior designer and project manager for David Wraight Cottages, Kirsty works with colour full-time, so what is her process for choosing combos? It changes every time, she says.

- "Often, I will find a colour I like, and I'll think, 'What can I do with this?' and then I pick a fabric and flooring and light fittings and then look at the white or off-white to work with it.
- "With a spec house at work I go through the Resene fandeck, and there might be a colour I've never used before. I'll read the blurb on the back of the fandeck, but I may even choose the colour of the aluminium joinery next and then pick other colours."
- Every Resene colour is coded with a letter, which
 denotes the base colour. Numbers also indicate
 where the hue sits on the colour wheel. They start
 with reds at 0, moving through oranges and yellows
 to greens around 180 and on through blues and
 purples. For example, a white with code 020 will
 have red undertones; the undertones determine
 how it relates to other colours in the room.
- "I don't think I'm that good at colours," David says, "but what I've learned with Kirsty is the hardest colour to pick is white. It's relatively easy to pick nice colours, but if you don't match the white or off-white to go with it, it doesn't work."

She originally painted the cabinetry in Resene Blackjack but found the dark colour hard to keep clean, so she had it repainted in Resene Quarter Rice Cake. The laundry is still in Resene Blackjack. "Which I love," Kirsty says.

About those walls and ceilings: they are MDF, either plain or with a tongue-and-groove effect.

"I got into it 20 years ago," David says. "We have had great success with MDF linings in houses that have come through the earthquakes. It's only 9mm, but it's thermally extremely efficient." He covers the joins with battens.

David and Kirsty have run their home as a B&B in the past and will again when business and travel restrictions allow. In the guest lounge, a French-style chandelier provides fitting illumination for walls painted in Resene Blanc.

The hallway, also in Resene Blanc, leads to three guest bedrooms. The south-east room is in Resene Linen, with panels below the dado rail in Resene Quarter Rice Cake, paired with plain bedlinen, floral cushions and curtains. This room opens to the deck. "We live out here in the summer because it is out of the northwester and shady in the heat."

The lower third of the walls in the middle guest room also feature Resene Quarter Rice Cake and, above the dado rail, Resene Brandy Rose, a smoky pink that may have intimidated less experienced designers. "I was just looking through the Resene palettes one day," says Kirsty, "and I thought, 'Oh, that's interesting'."

Kirsty wanted to try wallpaper panels for something different in the third guest room. The blue and white embossed design, Resene Wallpaper Collection E375052, is teamed with blue butterfly curtains.

Kirsty's choice of Resene colours perfectly complements the classic charm of Willow's Green, creating a smooth flow throughout the house. "I don't follow trends for the sake of following trends," Kirsty says. "In interior decorating, it's so important to be yourself." H


country charm meets industrial style



Designer **Shane George** suggests this alternative scheme:

This design is a fusion of French country and industrial loft styles. This kitchen features several grey tones with Resene Colorwood Smokey Ash on the flooring, Resene Half Grey Friars on the cabinetry, Resene Triple Black White on the tongue-and-groove walls and the silver veins of the honed marble benchtop. Designer **Wendie Cantwell** of Mastercraft Kitchens suggests this alternative scheme:

I reimagined this space with warm colour tones and natural textures that complement the architectural style of the home. Rustic elements such as the lower cupboards and pelmet finished in Resene Colorwood Bask and the reclaimed timber slab in the seating area are contrasted with modern white elements such as the upper wall cabinets in Resene AquaLAQ in Resene Alabaster and the Caesarstone 'White Attica' benchtop and splashback. Matte black cabinet handles and tapware from Archant add further contemporary touches to the space. The kitchen layout is functional with a 'working triangle' between the island oven and fridge. The builtin timber bench on the left functions as both a casual dining area as well as a handy study space.

Create good-natured spaces by following the principles of biophilic design.

ver questioned why you relax when you sit beside the sea or how the sound of rain helps you drift off? Do you wonder why you still feel great after a tiring hike in the forest or a backbreaking day in the garden?

The idea that being close to nature makes us feel better is nothing new, but psychologist Erich Fromm first gave it a name in 1973. Fromm's term 'biophilia' is the theory that humans need a connection to their natural environment to feel happy and content. In a nutshell, biophilia is the idea that increasing exposure to nature is good for your mind and body.

Numerous psychological and physiological studies have tested this hypothesis over the years. In one, American hospital patients exposed to views of nature healed faster and needed less pain relief than those without a connection to greenery. In another study, Canadian researchers found the presence of wood in interior spaces, such as exposed beams, timber flooring or timber furniture, to be stress-relieving, lowering participants' blood pressure. Due to these positive results, it's not surprising the architecture and design world has readily adopted biophilic design principles. With a palette of Resene paints and wood stains, you can infuse your indoor and outdoor spaces with calm.

Window to the soul

Look out the window, says interior designer Megan Harrison-Turner. It is an excellent place to start when introducing nature-inspired design. "In New Zealand, our vegetation is often a lush green, while in Australia, the greyed-off colour of eucalyptus is quite dominant. Look at what's in your backyard. Say there's a Japanese maple outside, maybe there's a way to incorporate some of its elements with a Resene paint colour – there's even a wood stain called Resene Japanese Maple," says Megan.

Colours of nature

Blue, white, green and brown are the most dominant colours on planet Earth. But the ocean is never one tone of blue. "Consider thinking beyond a solid colour," says Lisa Day of Day Architects. "The natural world very rarely has one solid colour in any one place. Any landscape painter can tell you just how many hues are involved in the colours of a lake or forest." Resene FX Paint Effects medium is a way to create a multi-tone or limewashed look when painting a room. For example, to recreate the colour variation in mudbrick or limestone, start by applying a basecoat of a darker colour such as Resene Biscotti. Then paint a topcoat of Resene FX Paint Effects medium mixed with Resene Quarter Thorndon Cream.

It's easy being green

Humans are one of the few species with trichromatic vision – the ability to distinguish blues, greens and reds. One theory is that it's an adaptation that helped our ancestors gather ripe fruit and palatable vegetation. In daylight, human eyes detect the colour green more than any other, and perhaps this is why studies have shown the human nervous system feels calmer in the presence of green. There are many Resene greens to choose from – including deep greens such as Resene Jurassic and Resene Karaka emulating ancient forests to cloudy greens such as Resene Ravine.

Rebecca Long, Resene Senior Architectural Representative, suggests looking for greens in places other than tree foliage.

take inspo from biophilic design

- Emphasise your view use Resene Lustacryl on windowsills and trims to frame the vista.
- Play with the light use sheer curtains or rattan pendant lights to cast dappled light in a room. Paint your lampshade in a complementary Resene colour to suit your interior. Use gloss Resene Enamacryl, semi-gloss Resene Lustacryl and textured paints such as Resene Sandtex to create different levels of visual or textured interest in a room.
- Opt for eco materials. Resene SpaceCote Flat, Resene Lustacryl and Resene Zylone Sheen Zero are all waterborne plant-based Environmental Choice-approved products with low odour, low VOCs (volatile organic compounds) and easy water wash-up.

"Resene Tarzan is a gold-edged khaki that celebrates nature's radiant, mossy depths. Tint it into Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen for a smooth, natural finish," she says. To create the colour variation seen in nature, use a few different greens — painting plant pots and furniture — but choose the primary wall colour wisely.

"It is surprising how greyed-off a colour needs to be before it's considered restful," says Megan. "Dirtier grey-greens are the best colour for the walls of a biophilic space. For instance, sage greens such as Resene Tasman are more muted and serene than cuisine greens, such as Resene Parsley, which has yellow tones to make it energising. A related colour scheme or tonal colours will be more restful." Other restful greens include Resene Paddock, Resene Rivergum, Resene Yucca and Resene Spanish Green.

Try texture

Nobody's perfect, even Mother Nature. A key element of biophilic design is texture since irregularity and imperfections make the look more realistic. Create texture through flooring, textured Resene wall paints, Resene wallpapers, or even net curtains, which dapple the light, emulating sunlight through foliage. "It is essential to think about the texture of surfaces that stimulate your senses and catch the light," says Lisa.

Texture can affect the way we move through a space, she explains. "Our bodies have a kinaesthetic response to texture, moving slowly past rough surfaces and quickly past smooth surfaces – this, too, is an intuitive human response to our environment." Resene Sandtex Mediterranean effect is a textured paint that can be tinted to a wide range of paint colours to create a dynamic, textured surface, great for highlighting shadows on the wall. Shadows reflected on texture are often far more interesting than those on a flat surface. Panelling and battens are other ways to create shadows and depth.

A word on wood

Timber is popular in biophilic design thanks to its multi-sensory appeal. Wood has a distinctive smell,

texture and visible grain, which is comforting on many levels. "It is a great way to bring the outdoors in, providing comfort, warmth and a connection to the outside world," says Rebecca. Resene Colorwood interior wood stains and Resene Woodsman wood stains for exteriors highlight the natural beauty of timber by allowing the grain to show through, "There are many different types of wood, which can affect the appearance of your desired stain.

"Pine, for example, is generally guite light, whereas cedar can take on a variety of red tones. I suggest trying a Resene testpot or a small pot first to ensure you achieve your desired look."

Use Resene Colorwood protected with Resene Oristal ClearFloor on flooring. For exteriors, choose from the wide range of colours available in the Resene Woodsman range, and for decking, use Resene Woodsman Decking Oil Stain.

Remember to relax and go with the flow when creating a nature-inspired room. You can't control the weather, but sometimes the stormiest days make the most inspiring landscape artworks. Embrace nature's beautiful imperfections and feel the benefits. H

houseplant 101

Introducing houseplants is an easy way to bring nature indoors - but many plants suffer stress when used in interiors because they are kept in the wrong conditions. Two main reasons indoor plants run into health problems are lack of light and overzealous watering. To test if your plant needs watering, touch the soil with a finger. If the earth clings to it, there's likely enough water.

To test the light, see if there's enough light at different times of the day to cast a shadow – if not, your room might be too dark. A simple rule for beginners is to pick plants with thick glossy leaves such as the ZZ plant (Zamioculcas zamiifolia), monstera, phalaenopsis orchid, mother-in-law's tongue, dracaena or even a pony palm.

Terracotta pots are ideal for cacti or ZZ plants, which don't need much watering. Seal terracotta pots in Resene Aquapel & Terracotta Sealer inside and out before painting in your favourite Resene colours.

king of the Creativity

From Thor, the king of New Asgard, to King Kong and the King of Rock 'n' Roll, Chris Williams has painted scenes to the moon and back.

If there were an award for using Resene products in the most unusual places, scenic artist Chris Williams would take the gold. There's certainly a splash of Resene FX Metallic Gold Dust and other metallic paints in many of the movies he's worked on, like the golden realm of Asgard in Thor Ragnarök, silver space shuttles in King Kong movies and even Resene Lumbersider on the Hollywood sign in the movie Elvis.

The Gold Coast-based artist started his career selling small artworks at the Brisbane markets before taking a job at a theming company, where he learnt the tricks of the scenic-painting trade.

In the 17 years since, Chris has worked on Hollywood blockbusters, including Aguaman, Godzilla vs Kong and Elvis, and has created many imaginative scenes. "I manage a team of 15 to 60 people in charge of the look of every hard surface – buildings, rocks, spaceships and trees; it's our job to make it impossible to tell if it's real or created. On Elvis, the construction team built Beale Street on a Gold Coast lot, and we painted everything – from flaking concrete to the dirt on the road. We even painted every speck of rust on the Hollywood sign."





Resene paints have become an essential tool of his trade. Chris has blended, experimented and brushed them in every way possible and is now an expert on getting the best from the Resene range. "There's so much variety available, with different sheens and coverages. My favourite is Resene X-400 membrane paint great for painting cement surfaces. But I also use Resene Lumbersider waterborne low sheen, Resene FilmPro professional paints and the Resene Summit Roof range. The paints are tough and long-lasting, plus Resene does the best bright colours with exceptional coverage."

With a job as multi-dimensional as scenic painting, it's not surprising that Chris occasionally finds himself in a creative jam. "When working on Godzilla vs Kong, there was a specific shade of silver that I needed for the space shuttles that would break through the earth's core. So I worked with Resene to create a custom colour we called Skull Silver. I've been through hundreds of litres of this colour."

Abstract art - his own - has now become Chris' creative outlet, an antidote to days expended capturing the perfect shade of sand. Chris spends about 70 per cent of his time on set, with the remainder dedicated to his large-scale, free-flowing minimalist artworks. He has two gallery spaces in Gold Coast shopping malls, where he fills empty spaces with his works and potential purchasers can contact him directly. "My scenic work influences my art; I can see how the paint blends and works in my day job and then carry that over. My art is for me; it's my own thing with no rules."

If life were as simple as painting by numbers, Chris would have a near-complete picture. He's committed to working close to home, making sure he's around for family surfing excursions and giving his kids the best 'show and tell' stories - who else can say they've jumped on the Hulk's bed? He's also ticked off a career goal working with renowned Australian director Baz Luhrmann. Now it's time to paint outside the lines. He has more film projects lined up, but he is also looking to new creative outlets, including custom commissions and building a 'virtual art gallery' with design and development company Koda Design. "Working on Elvis was a box ticked, and everything from here on is a bonus." H

owder room, water closet, guest toilet – whatever you want to call it, it's a space that's calling for a little style. As one of the smallest rooms in your home, powder rooms can be tricky but with some careful planning and design tricks, you can pack this small room with personality.

Challenge 1 Lack of light

Many powder rooms, particularly those off a main hallway, don't have a window or sources of natural light. Warm coloured lightbulbs are usually recommended in homes but will cast a slightly yellow light in a space. Warm neutrals with a high LRV (light reflective value) such as Resene Pearl Lusta or Resene Thorndon Cream are an easy choice for spaces with no natural light. Other colours that stand their ground in yellow light include pale blues such as Resene Cut Glass, grey-based greens like Resene Rainee or lilacs such as Resene Ghost. The Resene Kitchen & Bathroom paint range is the optimal choice for any bathroom space as it's made with anti-bacterial silver and MoulDefender for extra protection or you can get MoulDefender added to another Resene interior waterborne topcoat of your choice. Another option for dark rooms is a striking wallpaper design in a pale tone or reflective pattern – try a design like Resene Wallpaper Collection 409543. This doesn't mean dark colours are out of the question – if you're going dark, opt for deep, saturated tones rather than mid-tone colours. Try Resene Palm Green or Resene Midnight Express.

The size constraints of powder rooms generally mean that toilet and vanity options are limited. Measure your space carefully before purchasing new pieces to make sure toilets will fit and that guests can walk past vanities comfortably. Slim floating vanities and mirrors will create the illusion of space. A tiled floor will often emphasise the narrowness of the room but painting the floor in Resene Walk-on or staining timber flooring in Resene Colorwood protected with Resene Qristal ClearFloor is a way to make your powder room feel less enclosed.

Challenge 3 Lacking personality

Small spaces like powder rooms are the perfect place to be creative. As the door to the powder room is most often kept shut, it won't disrupt other colour schemes within your home. It's an opportunity to turn the space into a jewel box using an intense saturated colour or to opt for a large-scale wallpaper design that might feel overwhelming in other rooms. 

One small testpot led to one giant leap in the decoration of this couple's home.

tepping through the doors of Laura and Krispin's home in Te Awamutu is an out-of-this-world experience. There's a 'moonscape' in the landing area near the front door (actually, an original mid-century feature wall in the 1960s home), its craters painted in the otherworldly Resene Cutty Sark like something out of *The Jetsons*.

Then there's a psychedelic ribbon in Resene Toffee, Resene Paper Doll, Resene Cutty Sark and Resene Swamp guiding you down the hall into the living areas, painted in Resene Foundry, a bold charcoal colour. Pops of Resene Teal Blue and Resene Smitten showcase the children's artwork.

A busy family lives here. Krispin is a large-animal vet; Laura is a former sewing teacher turned fashion designer. They have two energetic children - Elijah (4) and Violet (2) - and a baby is on the way. But although they're busy, this is a family who knows how to have fun. Laura can't keep up with demand for Albie, her range of fashion-forward breastfeeding clothes ("our new designs keep selling out"), and Krispin's job sees him delivering calves at a moment's notice ("the calves always seem to come in the middle of dark stormy nights"). Still, their goal – Laura's especially – is to work at creating a home where the kids aren't afraid to express themselves.

"I wanted the kids to be able to relax, put up their art on the wall, turn their rooms into a sea of colour and just have fun," she says.

"I have lived in homes that are quite pristine with everything hidden away, and it's quite stressful. I think it's okay for your home to feel lived-in, especially if you are creative with your things. I have colourful little name tags indicating where the kids can put their shoes and display their things. Resene testpots are great for that."

Laura is a familiar face in her local Resene ColorShop, frequently popping in to pick up testpots, often in unexpected colour combos. Although the main wall of her home is Resene SpaceCote Flat tinted to Resene Alabaster (one of Resene's most popular colours), it's unusual to paint doors and architraves (as Laura has) in Resene Foundry. The rich charcoal is also used on feature walls in the living and dining rooms and in Elijah and Violet's bedrooms.

"Resene Foundry is my favourite colour. It goes with everything and balances out the other colours. I've even used it in the children's bedrooms. My mum was worried that if I put such a dark colour in their bedrooms, it would seem too serious, but it's fun."

In Elijah's bedroom, inspired by a photo she saw in a habitat plus booklet, Laura teamed soft, warm blue Resene Ziggurat with Resene Foundry, creating a wave design using a curved cardboard template. It's the perfect room for a pre-schooler whose interests are ever-changing – in the past year, he has been wild about animals, dinosaurs and now The Incredible Hulk.

"It's cool for the kids to realise early on that they have unique tastes and interests that are different to their parents. I don't particularly like Hulk Smash but my son is obsessed with The Hulk, and that's okay."

Violet currently loves pink, so her room has splashes of Resene Smitten and Resene Gelato. "It's totally unintentional but my boy gravitated to blue and even though my daughter's name is Violet, she wanted pink."

As for Krispin, Laura admits she has a lot of creative freedom thanks to the fact he's colour blind. "I think when he looks at our house, he probably sees it entirely differently to me. So that's why many of the colour decisions have been left up to me.

"I decided to do the stripe in the hallway out of the blue one day, and my husband came home and said, 'What are you doing?'" But even then, he doesn't quite realise what it looks like – he probably thinks the stripe is painted with darker and lighter versions of the same colour. I can get away with a lot."

But when it came to the moon wall, Krispin vetoed her plan to paint it in hotpink Resene Smitten. When they bought the home in 2019, it was a creamy colour and, to Laura, the craters looked a bit like Swiss cheese. She tried 10 testpots before deciding on Resene Lustacryl tinted to Resene Cutty Sark.

"We went for Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss as it needed a little extra sheen to highlight the craters. They collect dust quite easily, so having something easy to clean was essential.

"I've used Resene Lustacryl on the doors as the kids touch everything, and they always need to be cleaned. And I don't know what they are doing, but everything always seems sticky."

Colour – from painted second-hand furniture to vases and picture frames – is in every room, all painted with Resene testpots. An antique bar trolley in Resene Teal Blue is one of Laura's favourite op-shop finds – aside from her antique sewing machines, that is. Laura currently has a vintage Singer with a stand painted in Resene Smitten and a Pfaff machine with a stand painted in Resene Retro and Resene Watermark.

"I love finding something in the op-shop, bringing it home, and painting it. I enjoy learning about history, and that's also why I love having a home from the 1960s. I found out there used to be a little sewing room in the corner in what's now an openplan area in this home. It's nice that someone sat here sewing things as I do."

Although she's brave with colour now, when she and Krispin bought their first home, it took them a couple of years to have the guts to change anything. "It was only when we bought our first Resene testpot and started painting that we realised the Resene ColorShop was right there and it was so easy."

Her advice for other homeowners wanting to dabble in colour is to give it a go. "It's not like you're knocking out a wall. You're just putting on a bit of paint. And if you hate it tomorrow, the colour will be dry, and you can paint over it.

"I think knowing you have that freedom to change it whenever you like is freeing. And for me, I love living in a fun, colourful home – it's inspiring." ${\sf H}$






family-friendly dining with a Moroccan twist



Designer **Kathryn Lyons** suggests this alternative scheme:

I've created a family-friendly dining room with soothing tones and some small pops of colour. As this space is for a family, I have selected durable Resene finishes and furnishings that do not show wear and tear. This includes easy-to-clean panelling painted in Resene Lustacryl tinted to Resene Cashmere and Resene SpaceCote Flat tinted to Resene Quarter Blanc on top of the wall. I have removed the window at the far end of the room, in addition to the pelmets, carpet and the hearth. In their place are Roman blinds and pine flooring stained with Resene Colorwood Rock Salt and protected with Resene Qristal ClearFloor. Every piece in this room is hard-wearing, allowing the whole family to relax at dinner time.

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Wallpaper is the comeback kid of the design world. Here's how to add some 'prints charming' to your home.

Avoiding wallpaper because you associate it with the peeling, dated panels in a great-grandparent's house? Take another look. Tacky 1970s wallpaper in various shades of orange is long gone. Instead, easy-to-hang patterns, including paste-the-wall options, are becoming an essential decorating tool. Bold geometric designs, colourful botanical prints or subtle texture in neutral shades – there's everything you need to lend character to a space. The Resene Wallpaper Collection is a great place for inspiration. It features everything from stripes to delicate art deco motifs and can be easily coordinated with Resene paint colours. Still not sure where to start? Here are some tips for introducing wallpaper to your walls, whatever your budget.

Put it in print

When it comes to prints, start by considering the mood you want. Every print creates a feeling; for example, subtle florals, such as Resene Wallpaper Collection 220482, may evoke a diffuse softness and calm and create a country aesthetic. A bold black-and-white stripe, such as Resene Wallpaper Collection 3342-13, will create classic elegance.

Interior designer Kate Alexander has a simple trick to assess the mood of a design: "A great way to get a feel for a paper is to blur your eyes. What is the dominant colour and/or pattern? Now imagine this colour and/or tone en masse – does this fit the vibe you're after?"

Size matters

When choosing a print, scale is critical. For example, wallpaper with a large pattern works best on a wall with fewer 'interruptions' (i.e., windows and doors) and with space to 'breathe' (i.e., high ceilings). It also makes sense not to use a busy or loud print behind your television.

Light, too, plays a role in deciding scale. Interior designer Megan Harrison-Turner suggests that a small dark room, such as a laundry or powder room, is the perfect place to play with large-scale or busy patterns. Since you spend little time in there, the effect won't become overwhelming. Wallpapering smaller spaces is also a cost-effective way to tap into the dynamism of wallpaper if you have a more limited budget.

Megan adds that playing with wallpaper pattern scale can be a powerful tool in stopping your interiors from feeling 'samey'. "Our eyes get easily bored if the scale of the wallpaper in different rooms is kept similar – especially when the scale is consistently small to medium," she says. "So, mix it up. For example, go for dramatic scale and pattern in an entranceway, leading to a small pattern in a sitting room, perhaps with a patterned sofa. Then try a large-scale pattern on a feature wall in the open-plan family area."

Pattern placement

Another factor is the placement of the wallpaper. Feature walls, where just one wall is covered in wallpaper, provide a focal point and are cost-effective at adding visual interest. But there are so many other ways to use Resene wallpaper.

Try matching prints to a room's architectural lines or furniture. For example, a dado or picture rail can be a natural stopping place for wallpaper. Paint the area below it in Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss or Resene Enamacryl gloss for a classic contrast. Or why not try papering above a fireplace mantel? Alternatively, architectural features such as nooks and trims can be great places to add interest with patterns; as can hanging wallpaper behind an impressive furniture piece. If you're confident with wallpaper, there's always the ceiling, which can look amazing wallpapered.

Wallpaper plays a supportive role in architecture, drawing the eye to features with directional patterns or demarcating zones such as reading nooks.

Neutral party

Colour-shy? The Resene Wallpaper Collection includes a range of neutral and white-on-white wallpapers, including some featuring beaded and pearl finishes – perfect if you're after something subtler, says Megan.

Wallpaper is often associated with loud prints, so why not turn to paint if you're after a neutral? Rough textures can bring a rustic finish and cosy intimacy to a space; they effectively draw people in and set them at ease. Paredback and sophisticated, textured neutrals are a quiet but powerful way of creating comfort. The Resene Inspirations Wallpaper range comes in 12 Resene colours, including popular neutrals, such as Resene Quarter Pearl Lusta, Resene Quarter Tea, Resene Rice Cake, Resene Black White and Resene Sea Fog. Paint skirtings or scotias with Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss or Resene Enamacryl gloss before applying wallpaper to avoid paint drips on your design.

"A home needs to have a sense of unity and flow to work successfully," says Megan. "So that means keeping the intensity of the types of colours similar if you put a different colour in each room. If the look is more limited in its colour palette, vary the depths of colour but keep the tones similar, meaning don't use clear, sharp blues and greyed muted blues."

Paint pals

The easiest way to pair a paint with your wallpaper pattern is to look for its neutral undertones. For example, if your wallpaper features a botanical green print, choose a green-toned white paint to go with it. Hard-wearing Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen is ideal for painting walls, while Resene Lustacryl has an appealing semi-gloss sheen that's easy to clean, so it's perfect for painting trims and below the dado.

Kate adds that it's essential to carefully match white paint to your patterns. "Not all white backgrounds are the same – and if you want a seamless transition, your white paint may need to tone towards a grey or cream," she says. "Always buy a wallpaper sample or borrow the Resene wallpaper book to try your Resene paint colours alongside – especially for papers with texture or shine."

A simple trick to finding a complementary paint colour is to take a photo of a wallpaper sample and upload it to the Resene Colour Match tool www.resene.com/colourmatchonline. Or ask the staff at your local Resene ColorShop for assistance. Another option is Resene Anaglypta, embossed wallpaper you can paint over in whatever Resene colour you choose.

Offcut options


Hanging wallpaper involves pattern matching, so you inevitably end up with offcuts or part rolls. But these don't have to go to waste. Use wallpaper offcuts to decorate pieces of furniture, such as the front and insides of drawers, the sides of a mirror, the backs of shelves or the top of an old desk. An easy way to change the look of a room is to wallpaper the panels of a screen – you could even wallpaper the other side in a different design, allowing you to freshen up the room seasonally. Alternatively, spruce up one of your doors with leftover wallpaper. Small scraps of wallpaper can also decorate a doll's house, be used in découpage or be employed to create paper flowers.

Don't be a wallflower

Wallpaper doesn't have to be intimidating. With a vast array of patterns and a much easier hanging and stripping process than you may remember, it's one of the simplest and most effective ways to add texture, colour and style to your home. Flick through some samples and let your imagination run wild.

Resene Wallpaper Expert Ingel Janssen shares tricks and tips for hanging wallpapers like a pro.

- Work to rule: Measure your room before buying wallpaper and check the codes to see the type of wallpaper and the pattern repeat. As a simple guide, most rolls are 52cm to 53cm wide and in most designs three drops per roll. Always order an extra roll in case you make a mistake or the roll sells out. Check all wallpaper is from the same batch.
- Dark arts: If hanging a dark pattern, ideally paint the wall colour a matching dark colour, so a lighter coloured wall beneath doesn't show between the wallpaper gaps.
- Reverse it: Many rolls come with the pattern facing outwards. Check the pattern when rolled out to ensure you hang it the right way up. You may need to reverse roll the wallpaper (so the pattern is on the inside) to make applying the wallpaper easier.
- Go large and go central: With a big pattern, it's best to start from the middle and move outwards. This will centralise the pattern on the wall.
- **Get cornered:** "There should always be an overlap in the corner, and that's done for two reasons. One is that the corner might not be straight. The other is, should the house move, the wallpaper won't split open."
- Take a step back: The key viewing point for wallpaper is 1.5–2 metres from the wall. You've done well if the pattern looks good from that distance.
- Slowly does it: "Take your time. If you get it wrong, peel it off and stick it back on. Don't stress."
- **Bubble trouble**: There is not enough paste on the wall if there are bubbles in the wallpaper after wallpapering. "There's a quick trick to fix this, cut a tiny hole in the paper, stick some paste in it and press it down again."

ature is full of nuance. Dramatic skies and stormy seas are filled with hundreds of shades of blue and grey, evolving and changing as the wind blows. Impressionist artists such as Monet, Degas and Van Gogh used brushstrokes to create airy skies and dreamy garden spaces, but to capture the drama of the Pacific Ocean in your home, all you need is a paintbrush, rag and Resene Colorwood wood stain. To create a dramatic watercolour wall, first start with your brightest coloured wood stain - we used Resene Colorwood Skywater, a warm slate blue. Use a paintbrush to roughly brush the colour in random spots onto plywood following the grain of the timber before using a rag to rub the stain into a soft edge.

Blend grey colours into the blue to create the look of rolling waves - we used Resene Riverstone and Resene Silvered Grey. Add additional coats of your chosen Resene Colorwood colours to make the colour appear darker. Finish with Resene Colorwood Whitewash, using the whitewash to fill in any unstained plywood and brushing it over the top of any blue or grey stains that are looking too dark. Overcoat using Resene Aquaclear satin clear urethane. Then sit back and admire the view.

- Wallpaper offcuts, we used Resene Wallpaper Collection 91310 for the petals and Resene Wallpaper Collection M30602 for the stamen
- Hot glue gun
- Resene drop cloth
- Resene Woodsman Dark Oak
- Paintbrush
- Rag
- Branches or large twigs plum tree or apple blossom branches work well for this project

Step 1: Cut out the wallpaper template onto thick card. Put your template onto your wallpaper, selecting an area with interesting colours and patterns. Trace around the wallpaper with a pencil and cut it out.

Step 2: Cut a straight line between two petals into the flower's centre.

Step 3: Using a hot glue gun, apply glue around the edges of the right-hand petal next to the cut line. Take the petal on the left-hand side of the cut line and place it over the top of the petal on the right, pressing down to seal together. Your flower should now have five petals.

Step 4: Curl the petal edges wrapping them over a pencil.

Step 5: To create the flower stamen, measure and cut a 40mm x 70mm rectangle of wallpaper, we used Resene Wallpaper Collection M30602. Cut straight lines down the long end of the rectangle to form thin strips, leaving a 1cm gap at the edge of the

Step 6: Roll the wallpaper into a tube shape, making sure that the underside (white side) of wallpaper is on the outside. The hole in the middle should be about the width of a pencil. Secure with a small blob of glue.

Step 7: Splay the stamen out with your fingers and gently fold forward the tips of each thin strip to reveal tiny segments of white. You can use a pencil to help you do this.

Step 8: Use a hot glue gun to glue the stamen to the centre of the petals.

Step 9: Using a small paintbrush, apply Resene Woodsman Dark Oak to each branch. Leave to partially dry and then rub off slightly with a soft rag.

Step 10: Using a hot glue gun, apply a blob of glue to the base of each flower and attach it to the branches. Tip: It's easiest to position the flowers on the branches when they're standing upright in a vase.






Sarah's vision for the kitchen combined "classic country and youthful contemporary", inspired by the English countryside's dignified and elegant yet informal cottages. "I wanted to renovate without losing the heart of the home and it was important to me to honour the house's bones rather than modernise too heavily."

Thoughtfully laid out for entertaining and socialising, with practicality at the forefront, the considered U-shaped stone countertop allows Sarah to chat while chopping. Likewise, she can curl up with a morning coffee in the newly created breakfast snug while her child chews on toast.

There was one constant throughout the design process - colour. "I love the idea that each room has a life of its own, and I want every doorway to transport you from one state of consciousness to another," she says. So, Sarah turned to Resene's free online colour experts at www.resene.com/colourexpert to guide her in the right direction.

"I love colour and have always loved the idea of a pink kitchen. Pink represents love and family, and what room embodies this more than where you prepare food together? However, I was very conscious that it needed a mature anchor. The Resene Colour Expert's suggestion of Resene Cab Sav felt like a natural choice. Its deep wine shade adds dimension and depth to the room."

"A good paint job makes such a difference to a home," she says. "I love creating spaces that evoke an emotional reaction - life's too short to look at white walls." H

his year I became a first-time homeowner, a dream I never thought attainable. My new home is an untouched 1980s gem that needs a lot of work. To make it a home, the natural place to start was the first thing that welcomes everyone in – the entranceway. It's easy to make a big impact in such a small space. For this DIY, I painted the weatherboards, soffits and porch walls and stained the steps and deck. Let's get to work.

TradieGal Tutorial: Porch makeover

Step 1: First, I needed to clean and treat the mould on the timber steps. Fill a garden sprayer with Resene Moss & Mould Killer concentrate and dilute it with water following the instructions on the label. Leave for 24 hours before scrubbing and rinsing with water.

Step 2: Clean the timber with Resene Timber and Deck Wash using a brush to scrub in the same direction as the grain. Rinse thoroughly and allow to dry overnight before painting or staining.

Step 3: As I knew I'd be walking back and forth up the steps while working, I decided to save the staining of the steps until last and moved on to painting the porch and

weatherboards. First, prep the painted surfaces by washing with Resene Paint Prep and Housewash or Resene Bio-Cleaner. Sand and then dust with a clean, dry cloth.

Step 4: Put down drop cloths and mask anywhere you don't want to get paint. Pour your paint into a tray – I used Resene Sonyx 101 tinted to Resene Oxygen for the weatherboards.

Step 5: Cut in the weatherboards on the edges using a flat brush, working your way from bottom to top. This helps you see if you've missed any weatherboards, and if any flecks of paint from the brush go onto the board above, you can catch it with the roller before it dries. In cooler weather, you can cut in multiple boards at once if you keep a wet edge. I recommend cutting and rolling one board at a time or using Resene Hot Weather Additive in warm weather to slow drying time.

Step 6: I used an 8mm nap, Resene No.1 roller sleeve for the weatherboards. This type

of roller sleeve holds enough paint for the weatherboards and walls and has enough nap to get into the grooves of the weatherboards. When rolling weatherboards, hold the roller flat and work in a long rolling motion with consistent pressure.

Step 7: Moving onto the soffits, hold the brush sideways (as opposed to flat) to cut in around the edges, light fittings, mouldings or beadings. Make sure the quarter-round beading is coated with paint but don't waste time cutting this in perfectly. If you accidentally paint the main wall, you can cover this up when you cut in the main wall later. For the soffits, I used Resene Sonyx 101 tinted to Resene Half White Pointer. Once dry, repeat with a second coat.

Step 8: Roll the soffit paint to the edges, covering any harsh brush lines.

Step 9: While waiting for the soffit paint to dry, move on to trims and joinery such as windows, door architraves and handrails.



Start by sanding, dusting then filling any gaps. Use a flat brush to cut in the window frame's sides, bottom and corners before using nice long strokes to finish off the faces of the frame. To paint the trims, I used Resene Lustacryl tinted to Resene Half White Pointer. Repeat with a second coat once dry.

Step 10: Prepare and paint the remaining walls of the porch. Sand them using 120grit sandpaper and then dust. Start by cutting in internal corners, around any frames or wall fixtures and the soffit.

Step 11: You're now ready to roll. I recommend an 8-10mm nap roller to paint the walls. Start in the middle and move outwards - this helps you put the bulk of the paint in the middle of the wall. Moving the roller back over the area will pick up any excess paint and allow you to spread it over the rest of the wall, providing an even coating. Layoff the paint by running the roller up and down your finish lightly once each piece of the wall is painted for a smooth even finish.

Step 12: Before staining the deck and steps, give them a sweep to remove any dirt. Using a brush, cut in the edges and down the cracks of the deck, then use long strokes to finish off the top and wipe away any excess stain with a rag. You could use a Deck Master or a lambswool applicator on large surfaces. My deck was made from kwila, so I used Resene Kwila Timber Stain to rejuvenate it. Allow to dry before applying a second coat. H

hey sit, broodily, on many a mantelpiece. windowsill, atop a fridge - anywhere that provides a comfortable roost. A Wyandotte, pencilled Hamburg, Norfolk, Light Sussex or even Black Ancona, all resplendent in their bright Resene colours and simplified but easily recognisable patterns.

Whatever the breed, they're Happy Hens, and, from Portobello in Dunedin, they've been making people happy worldwide for nigh on 40 years. That's how long it's been since Yvonne Sutherland moulded and painted her first - the bird that hatched her ever-popular ceramic Happy Hens. An art teacher then, she was clay modelling with her class and shaped up a small, round hen. It was logical to paint it, and she was pleased with the bright and happy result.

With encouragement from her husband John, who introduced clay-work into Otago schools in the late 1960s, she started moulding and painting more, inspired by the decorative heritage hens colonial women brought to New Zealand. "I based some of my first designs on them and started selling them at markets. From there, they caught on, and Happy Hens grew and grew."

Then, and always, Yvonne applies their bright hues with Resene paint. "An architect friend mentioned Resene, saying, 'Those are the paints architects use.' I also really liked – and still do – the availability of Resene colours in small quantities so I could test-drive them. Bravo for Resene testpots; the best thing since sliced bread! And, of course, the colour range is fabulous."

Yvonne's customers thought her hens were gorgeous and still do. "All cultures can relate to hens and roosters, and most people have warm associations with hens. I've been asked to do others such as kiwis and sheep over the years, but no, I've stuck to hens, I think that's part of the success – to concentrate on one idea and develop it into an instantly recognisable brand that's fun and colourful."

When she started painting Happy Hens, Yvonne used Resene Lumbersider, a waterborne low sheen paint based on a tough waterborne resin, before applying a gloss topcoat. But, using her favourite Resene Enamacryl gloss waterborne enamel, she now paints directly onto clay blanks, eliminating the final

glossing. "Resene Enamacryl gives the required shine. It's taken a whole step out of my work system," she says. "Sometimes I will still use Resene Lumbersider to create a flat base, then add a high-gloss design with Resene Enamacryl, which creates an extra dynamic."

With a customer base built up over four decades, Happy Hens have been adopted into households worldwide, including many given as gifts to VIPs visiting Dunedin. Pre-pandemic, Yvonne's Portobello store was a destination for Happy Hen seekers, but with the border closures, Yvonne closed her shop and now paints from her home studio. Luckily, her online sales stayed strong, so her Happy Hens continue to fly off around the world.

"It's wonderful that people still love the Happy Hens," she says. "They're a unique little keepsake, and they're very tactile – they sit so happily in the palm of your hand. But it's also about their colour. Colour lifts people's spirits, and it's an absolute delight to use Resene colours. We have been partners since the very start of Happy Hens!" H





- Scissors, pencil and ruler
- Thick cardboard or foam
- Strings of beads

- 2 washers
- String or cord
- Super glue/epoxy/glue use exterior grade if you are leaving your finished creatures outside
- 4 terracotta plates 2 large plates (22cm), 1 medium (15cm) and 1 small (10cm)
- 5 wooden craft knobs 1 large knob and 4 smaller knobs
- Seashells preferably some with holes in them and of varying sizes
- Resene Sea Fog Resene Sauvignon

To make 'Chrissie the Crab':

Step 1: Apply one coat of Resene Aguapel & Terracotta Sealer to all sides of a terracotta pot and allow to drv.

Step 2: Apply two coats of your choice of Resene colour, allowing the paint to dry between layers we used Resene Bright Red.

Step 3: Paint small swirls in a lighter colour; we used Resene Sauvignon. Paint the eyes using Resene White and Resene Black.

Step 4: Paint your cardboard to match your pot or use another Resene testpot colour if you prefer. We used Resene Salsa. Once dry, draw four simple crab legs using cardboard, a pencil and a ruler. If you wish to keep your crab outside, you could use foam. The legs should be approximately the same length as the height of your pot. Draw two crab's pincers on the cardboard. The claws should be half the height of your pot and about double the width of the legs.

Step 5: Assemble the crab by gluing the cardboard claws close to the painted eyes. 'Fan' out your crab legs, two on each side, and glue them to the back of your pot.

















To make 'Terry the Turtle':

Step 1: Apply one coat of Resene Aquapel & Terracotta Sealer to all sides of four terracotta plates (2 large, 1 medium and 1 small).

Step 2: Paint two coats of your choice of Resene colour onto the plates and onto five craft knobs,

allowing them to dry between layers. We used Resene Aqua for the medium craft knobs and medium plate and Resene Surfie Green for the large craft knob, two large plates and the smallest plate.

Step 3: Paint the turtle's face on the large craft knob; we used Resene White and Resene Black.

Step 4: Assemble the turtle by gluing the two large plates together to form the base. Glue the medium plate on top, followed by the small plate. Glue on the craft knobs – first the large craft knob (the turtle's head), then two more knobs on each side.

Step 5: Paint a pattern on the turtle's shell, experimenting with spots, swirls or a hexagonal pattern in your choice of Resene colours. We used Resene White, Resene Wistful and Resene Polo Blue.

To make 'Jerry the Jellyfish':

Step 1: Apply one coat of Resene Aquapel & Terracotta Sealer to all sides of a terracotta pot and allow to drv.

Step 2: Paint a basecoat in your chosen colour; we used Resene Kingfisher Daisy. Leave to dry, then paint one coat of Resene metallic paint onto the pot; we used Resene Funtasia metallic.

Step 3: Paint the eyes; we used Resene White and Resene Black.

Step 4: Paint the cardboard in your choice of colour for your starfish. We used a basecoat of Resene Golden Sand with a topcoat of Resene Gold metallic. Trace three starfish onto the cardboard and cut them out. If you want to keep your jellyfish outdoors, you could use craft foam. Attach a starfish to the upper side of the pot with glue.

Step 5: Thread seashells, pearls or beads to lengths of string. Tie all of the strings to a washer.

Step 6: Take a length of cord (strong enough to hold your pot) and tie a knot in the end of it. Thread it through the large washer your beads are attached to and poke the cord through the hole in the pot. Glue the cord and washer to the pot, then thread another washer down the top of the cord, gluing it to the top of the pot.

t's the most practical part of your home, but a garage can be more than a place to park your car – also functioning as a workshop or workout area when organised well. Here are a few ideas for making use of yours.

Get it sorted

More than any other space, a garage can become a dumping ground for unused or cumbersome household items. It's a good idea to sort it out at least twice a year and throw away or upcycle unwanted items. Decluttering a garage is all about storage, says interior designer Kate Alexander. "Consider different types of storage: tall and narrow, hanging, boxes and cupboards. And think about installing it close to power points for items such as cordless vacuum cleaners, which need to charge," says Kate. "If space is at a premium, especially with cars taking up most of the floor space, think about how you can use vertical space for storing tools."

Paint, paint, paint

Thanks to their large doors, which are regularly open to the elements, garages tend to get dusty quickly. Resene Enamacryl gloss and Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss waterborne enamel are ideal for painting cabinetry as they create easy-to-clean surfaces. Paint concrete flooring in Resene Aquapoxy for Flooring for durability – and hiding scuffs and marks.

Colour me right

As garages are not generally for relaxation, they can be opportunities to use bright colours and blacks. "Blacks such as Resene Blackjack and Resene Nero are great because they make brightly coloured tools 'pop' and therefore easier to see. Dark walls also recede, and a dark wall in a small space will make it seem bigger," says Kate. Then again, she adds, a light hue can hide wear and tear in a workshop. "A coloured stripe around the lower area of a garage wall is a great idea for managing wear, tear and scuffs, and damage will be less noticeable than on a white wall."



It's best to avoid all white walls where you can – while they will help bounce light around, they do tend to show up every mark.

Reuse and repurpose

Interior designer Vanessa Nouwens suggests turning trash destined for the tip into storage by transforming it with paint. "If you have some old pallets, bricks or blocks lying around, why not put them to good use by converting them to storage solutions? Paint old pallets and screw them into the walls to hold brooms, rakes, spades, etc. You can use blocks and planks of wood to make shoe racks or shelves for paint. Giving these items coats of paint makes them more of a design element rather than just functional."

You could even paint your garage to match your car – try Resene Jaguar, Resene Racing Green, Resene Fast Lane or Resene Turbo.

o and Graham Sutton's Blenheim garden may be small. But what it lacks in area, it makes up for in colour, thanks to Resene testpots and paints, nature's flamboyance and Mo's maximalist vision.

Mo and her husband Graham bought their 496-square-metre corner section in 2005. By the time they'd built the house, adding verandas and patios, there was little space left for gardens.

So, they created some – visually, that is. Mo is a garden designer and has a company called Garden Planit, so she knows how to make a small garden speak up. Her language is colour: pink and gold as the stars, with supporting acts in reds, oranges and whites, mostly in roses. Her favourite roses include the apricot-orange 'Westerland' climbing rose, the pink-flecked cream of 'Claude Monet' and the white-with-yellow-centre 'Margaret Merril'. She adds blues and mauves with the 'Rhapsody in Blue' rose, and, in summer, extra colour comes from sweet peas and dahlias.

"I've always had hedges," Mo says. "We are on a corner, so I wanted them for privacy, but we didn't have the space." Instead, they built a concrete block wall, painted it in Resene Lumbersider tinted to Resene Lemon Grass and planted *ficus pumila*, or creeping fig, to grow over it.

"Ficus is a creeper, so from inside our property and from the roadside, it gives the effect of a hedge, which started everything growing upwards. I knew that we had to garden vertically rather than try to garden horizontally."

Clematis and roses climb skywards over the ficus. As the viewer admires the flowers, their eyes are already looking up and beyond. While waiting for the clematis to grow, Mo used artificial ivy and fake hostas as temporary fillers.

Marlborough is good for roses; they like its clay soil. Graham and Mo ensure the plants have good drainage and are watered and fed regularly. "It's important to keep the roses bug-free," Graham says, "because disease and bugs such as aphids suck out all the nutrients from the plant."

The courtyard-style garden takes inspiration from the Mediterranean, with three seating areas to follow the sun. The patio has a style of table seen in many local homes: a round timber top on a pedestal supported by three curvy feet. Mo has refreshed hers in hot pink, using Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss waterborne enamel tinted to Resene Glamour Puss. "Pink's one of my favourite colours, so when I saw that hot pink, I thought, 'Well, this is it'." Mo credits interior designer Simone Hill at Cinnamon House in Blenheim for introducing her to the Resene colour range.

She painted a couple of ageing wicker chairs to match. Oops. "It didn't work because it was just an old cane base underneath, and it didn't do anything for the pink, so we changed it to soft lilac grey – Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss tinted to Resene Morepork. The paint is helping to hold them together."

Floral fabric Mo bought years ago and a dappled-green ceramic vase set off the look. "I like putting mad colours together," she says.



Above top: Mo painted the fence Resene Lemon Grass and the grey green is a great colour contrast to the vibrant green climbing ficus, which took seven years to establish. Planted on the berm side is hot pink and orange China rose 'Mutabilis' flanked by the apricot and yellow tones of the rose 'Margaret Merril'. Above: There are multiple seating – and lounging – areas around the garden. It's designed so there's always a sunny spot ready for relaxation – when Mo's not busy gardening that is. Mo created a touch of glam with Resene Coconut Cream painted on the walls, Resene Morepork on the side table and Resene Gold Dust metallic paint on the planter, which houses a life-like artificial palm.

Mo's garden design tips

- For Mo and Graham, a horizontal garden of low-form shrubs and creepers would have literally and visually 'hit' the wall. In contrast, a vertical garden with different layers, textures and colours replicates a rambling forest, and visitors forget that the blockwork is just a metre or two away.
- · Conventionally, vertical gardens are often created with structures supporting layers of pots, but Mo isn't conventional. There are ficus-covered pillars, climbing roses atop metal arches, upright statues and tall, slim clipped yew trees to give height. If a creeper is looking for a ride upwards, it has options.
- Cypress, clipped yews and small weeping trees provide layers of staggered heights underplanted with ferns and a front-layer border of heuchera and mondo grass. With the basic garden structure well-established, Mo can trim it to shape or let it roam wild.
- Every available centimetre is planted; even edibles are hiding among the flowers. They all thrive because they are well-watered and fed with
- And there is more beyond the wall. The street berm is dominated by three Indian bean trees that stand over hydrangeas, astilbes and liriopes with plenty of visual bounce from roses that have come over the wall.

Opposite left: Arched mirrors painted in Resene Gold Dust enlarge the space and create a little Alice in Wonderland magic on the ficus hedge. The metal table and chairs match the Resene Morepork used on the planters and furniture elsewhere in the garden.

Right: Raised beds painted in Resene Morepork create what Mo describes as a "herb corridor". She has planted the raised beds with herbs and edibles as well as shrubs such as Buxus to provide height and structure. The courtyard area is painted in Resene Coconut Cream and a custom Resene pale brown colour similar to Resene Double Sisal.



The vase required no makeover, but Graham, Mo and their paintbrushes have transformed several large urns throughout the garden. "Those urns were a royal blue, but because they had been outside for so long, they were starting to crack. I thought, 'Well, they need salvaging, and we'll do it in gold because I have a lot of gold around.' There are gold urns everywhere."

Testpots of Resene Gold Dust metallic came to the rescue. "It's amazing how far the testpots go," says ${\sf Mo.}$

Everywhere you look, there are joyful Italian flourishes – from plaster motifs painted in Resene Lustacryl in Resene Spanish White to veranda walls in Resene Coconut Cream, the same colour used in the lounge, on kitchen walls and on the painted cork tiles. The front door, veranda ceiling and columns are painted in Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss waterborne enamel tinted to Resene Solitaire.

The patio walls are in a bespoke Resene colour specially mixed for Graham and Mo at the Resene ColorShop in Blenheim (for a similar colour, try Resene Double Sisal).

Unlike interior design, which can be static, the garden décor evolves with the seasons, with Mo using pot plants to adapt to the year's changing moods. "Many things are in pots so that you can switch to summer planting quite easily, and when they fade, you can replace them with a winter pot.

"Most of the flowers are pink, red or orange, but sometimes I decide to add a pot of blue flowers, and it changes the whole effect."


Even the metre-high herb planter boxes have something to say and are saying it in style, in soft lilac – Resene Lumbersider Low Sheen tinted to Resene Morepork.

Mo also uses mirrors shaped like church alcoves throughout the garden, so their reflections appear as windows, bringing light and space. "When you're walking around, there are several vistas where we've used a pot, mirror or garden statue to draw your eye into each area."

And beyond... like the Italian-style fresco of pillars and tall, slender trees against a blue sky, attached to the ficus-covered wall. The faux fresco began as a photo in a gardening magazine, which Mo had reproduced onto a large board. Twenty-five years later, the fresco hasn't faded and is still bringing the aura of possibility to this space.

There's even a tree-lined avenue leading to a fountain, like a feature borrowed from an Italian summerhouse, bringing a little la dolce vita to the top of the South Island. \vdash



Create garden art that's aged to perfection with Resene FX Faux Rust Effect.

Resene FX Faux Rust Effect transforms non-metal surfaces into the look of corroded or weathered steel. In this case, a wooden structure built from battens and timber offcuts becomes a rusted-looking obelisk, ideal for growing climbing plants.

you will need

- Cavity batten 12.5m x 50mm x 25mm (see cutting measurements below)
- Protractor
- Pencil
- Bench or hand saw
- 4mm drill bit and power drill
- Treated pine countersunk self-embedding screws, 8g x 35mm
- Scrap piece of timber, 80mm x 80mm x 35mm
- Ball-top fence-post cap with square base
- Resene FX Faux Rust Effect (basecoat and activator)
- Paintbrush

cutting measurements:

- 4 x 1800mm (frame)
- 4 x 560mm (bottom supports)
- 4 x 420mm (middle supports)
- 4 x 280mm (top supports)

Left: This wooden obelisk is great for climbing roses, sweet peas or climbing edibles such as beans. To create the rusty look, the wooden structure was painted in Resene FX Faux Rust Effect basecoat followed by Resene FX Faux Rust Effect activator. Just like real rust, the rust colour will develop over time. Fence painted in Resene Element CoolColour.

The Resene FX Faux Rust Effect Activator is corrosive. When applying close to any adjacent metal surfaces, ensure plastic covers are in place to protect the metal surfaces against contact.

Resene Forest Green **Step 1:** Using the protractor, mark an angle of 8° at the top and bottom of each of the 1800mm-long pieces. Cut the angle with a bench or hand saw.

Step 2: Working on a flat surface, form an A-shape with two 1800mm pieces, joined at the top, and with 650mm at the base (measured from the outside). Place the support pieces on the frame at the following distances (measuring from the top): 400mm for the smaller support, 865mm for the middle support and 1035mm for the longest support. They will overhang at the edges.

Step 3: Mark with a pencil where the supports sit on the frame for easy placement later, then mark the angle on the underside of each support where the wood needs to be cut to line up with the frame. Remove from the frame and cut the angles with a hand or bench saw.

Step 4: Using a 4mm drill bit, drill pilot holes at each end of the supports where they are to be screwed to the frame. Then screw supports in place. Repeat steps 2 to 4 to create the other side of the frame.

Step 5: Take the 80mm x 80mm piece of timber and cut each side at an 8° angle to form a support for the A-frame at the top. Place one side of the A-frame on top of the 80mm support (as shown), drill pilot holes and then screw in place. The support piece should be flush with the top of the frame.

Step 6: Turn the frame and support piece over, place the other side of the A-frame on top and prop up at the end to a height of about 640mm. Drill pilot holes into the frame and support piece, then screw into place.

Step 7: Place the remaining side supports on the frame and mark the angle on the underside of each support where the wood needs to be cut to line up with the frame. Remove from the frame and cut the angles with a hand or bench saw. Attach to the frame: drill pilot holes first, then screw them into place.

Step 8: Screw the fence-post cap to the top of the support piece from beneath.

Step 9: Paint the obelisk. Apply two coats of Resene FX Faux Rust Effect basecoat using a brush, allowing at least four hours' drying time between coats. Use random brushstrokes in different directions to create an uneven texture to enhance the look of the rust.

Step 10: Apply two coats of Resene FX Faux Rust Effect Activator to the obelisk using random brushstrokes in different directions, completely covering all of the basecoat. Allow the first coat to dry before applying the second.

top tip

Apply Resene FX Faux Rust Effect Activator within 24 hours of applying the basecoat, ideally when the Resene FX Faux Rust Effect basecoat is tacky or touch dry. Rusting will start to develop within 12 hours. The final colour may be protected (not sealed) by applying two coats of Resene Aquapel waterborne diluted 2:1 with water.



Since winning *The Block NZ* in 2013, Alice and Caleb Pearson haven't slowed down on the DIY front – renovating eight homes. Alice shares her favourite Resene colours for creating winning results – on and off the show.

What have you been up to since The Block NZ?

Since *The Block NZ*, Caleb and I have done eight renovations and featured in another television show called *The Ultimate Reno*. I sometimes say that my lifestyle feels like it's *The Block NZ*, but just with four children.

How do your own DIY experiences compare to those on *The Block NZ?*

Everything is a lot harder on *The Block NZ* than in real life. On *The Block NZ*, you can't plan or get enough sleep. It affects your sanity. Caleb and I have gained a lot of confidence because we've done many different projects. Now we know that it's best to have a plan, have the right products, have a vision and then have time to execute it or even develop ideas as you're creating. Time is a real asset when you are doing things yourself. When you are not rushing and can explore your options, you get the best results.

How do you juggle renovations and a young family?

We try to include our kids in our projects when we can. It's not about excluding them from the journey of doing property; it is about bringing them along and making it an adventure. My six-year-old started assisting me with wallpapering with things like pasting the wall, passing me the roller and making sure the patterns match. Our children can do a lot, even at a young age, and I think it's just giving them the confidence to do that safely.

What's your favourite Resene colour and why?

My favourite Resene colour changes a lot because I love colour. Some of my favourites have been Resene Rascal (on a feature wall) and muted pinks such as Resene Bone and Resene Despacito.

What's your favourite Resene white or neutral to use and why?

My top three whites are Resene Sea Fog, Resene Alabaster and Resene Black White. I've used them all in houses and adore how they work differently. Some of my favourite whites are the ones we just

used in our latest renovation. One is called Resene Elderflower, and it's a lot warmer than those other whites and has a creamy colouring. I also like Resene Umber White, a chalky shell-like white. It reminds me of the beach in summer, and I think it's a striking white if you want to make a statement.

What's your favourite Resene wood stain or paint to use on exteriors?


I love Resene Pitch Black wood stain for dark exteriors. It is a go-to as well as Resene Umber White and Resene All Black. Dark features on an exterior allow them to blend into the outdoor environment, making your home, deck or fence line seem bigger. I took a traditional white picket fence and painted it all black. Caleb was mortified because he says you should always do white picket fences. I love the twist of bringing black onto the outside, taking something traditional, and giving it a modern twist.

What's your best tip for beginner DIYers?

Explore all the possibilities that paint can offer. There are so many things Caleb and I paint rather than replace, and it saves us so much money. Painting is an affordable option, and it's something everybody can do. We've painted fireplaces, tiles, benchtops and kitchen cabinetry. Using paint to change the look rather than replace it can save you time and money and give you a beautiful makeover.


