t's testament to the timeless quality of Resene paint colours that when Nicole McKenzie renovated her eight-year-old house, she only changed one wall colour. "I was still in love with the original colours I had chosen," she says, looking around the light and airy Auckland home.

Soft greens, blues and palest stone flow in a cohesive but interesting colour palette throughout the house. Nicole's desire for a casual and beachy, "but not twee", scheme is given life through colours such as Resene Tasman, Resene Foggy Grey, Resene Pewter, Resene Tana and Resene Zen. Each of the bedrooms and the lower living area is given a distinct colour, while the main living rooms and transition areas are in Resene Half Tea.

Nicole concentrated her efforts on new upholstery and artworks, some new furniture and accessories, helped by her staff at Trinity Interior Design. Trinity had also helped design the original interiors and Nicole liked the company so much, she bought it.

The former IT consultant has always loved architecture and interior design, finding an outlet for the passion in various residential developments and renovations. In 2001, she and her former partner bought a subdividable section with a small 1950s cottage in the

middle. They had a month to shift the cottage (fondly dubbed 'the two-bed shed') to the rear of the section, make it habitable and move in. They then had the luxury of time – time to see how the section was during all seasons, time to plan and refine the new house, and time to build it exactly as they wanted. Once the house was designed in collaboration with architectural draughtsman Grant McIntyre, they then mulled over and perfected those plans for six months. "We put a huge amount of thought into it. The actual building phase was a fantastic experience. It went without a hitch. Living on site meant we could see it every day."

The main living areas of the house are on the second floor to take advantage of harbour views, with a pool and garden on the northern side for sun. "We wanted a spacious house but not one with big soulless rooms. The interiors needed to be calm. We were both travelling a lot so wanted to come home and relax."

With travel and a building project taking up her time, Nicole commissioned Trinity Interior Design to interpret her vision for the interiors. She wanted colour, but subtle colour which flew in the face of the then fashion for all-white walls. "I wanted soft natural colours, then used white in the furniture and accessories. I also think black is underrated as an accent colour. It gives a room punch."

In the recent renovations, the only colour change was for the partition wall between the dining and living areas. Once different colours on each side, it is now a uniform Resene Tana.

A window seat was built into the living room, a sofa recovered and the older white furniture replaced with pieces in rich walnut-toned timber. New cushions and artworks gave the finishing touches.

While the work could be seen more as a refinement than a full-on renovation, the decision to make changes and devise a plan was critical for Nicole. While many of us may tinker with our interiors, adding a cushion here or a vase there, she believes that by critiquing the entire house and creating a plan of changes to achieve over a certain time frame, this gives in a more cohesive result.

"In my head I had a checklist of things to achieve over a period of time, something I could work progressively towards. It's the same with our clients. We give them a plan and they work away at it depending on the time and budget available.

"If you have that overview, if you then find things along the way that you like but which aren't on the plan, it's much easier to slot them in. It means you don't have to second guess yourself or do things in isolation." It's a method that's certainly worked for Nicole.





The interiors now have a subtle retro flavour, almost in honour of the property's original cottage. The Eames dining chairs are a 1950s classic, as are the Anna D chairs. Fun, screen-printed cushions mix with more traditional striped velvet and the new timber sideboard in the living room has guirky detailing and modernist lines.

It's an eclectic mix which works because it's borne of one person's vision. "I think it's important to not get too hung up on a style, but to incorporate those things that you really love and make your home yours," Nicole explains. "I know what I like, but it's not something you can describe in one sentence or phrase."

To offset the angular lines of the modern house, much of the furniture has curved elements. Nicole has chosen good quality, classic furniture that can be reupholstered. "I hate the idea of throwing things out, the waste. I like the idea of recycling."

With such a strong vision for both the here and now, and the future, perhaps those paint colours will last another 10 years. H







workshop in Perth when he thought he would try his hand at creating one of the three dimensional geometric figures which had so fascinated him as a teenager. An acclaimed designer with a well-established global reputation, he was experimenting with pieces of cut-out plywood when he came up with a spherical structure – which came to be known as the Coral. Not entirely satisfied with his creation, David decided to see if he could turn it into a light. "I had no business plan, and no idea it would take off worldwide. It was just a bit of play and a bit of fun, but I soon realised there was nothing like it out there."

lighting the way

David Trubridge's fantastical lights

are making an impact on interiors

ight years ago David Trubridge was 'mucking around' in a

While most lighting performs a function, David's designs provide something quite different. "The glow from the wood triggers an emotion in people which you can't get from a piece of plastic or glass," says David. "It throws patterns on the wall which simply don't exist in modern lighting, recreating the feeling you get from flickering firelight or afternoon sunlight."

By 2005, David found himself filling orders for his lights from around the world. And, from the Coral, he and his design team built up a family of lights. Lighting designs now take up around 90 percent of the business, with three-quarters of it exported. Since the first Coral was bought, David has gone on to sell almost 25,000 lights.

All the lights are now available in six Resene colours, the most popular being the lime green Resene Citrus and orange Resene West Side. "We experimented with a number of different paints but the Resene paints were the best. I liked that they were strong, clean colours and I liked the fact it is a local company with a clear commitment to the environment."

All his creations are made in line with his deep commitment to the environment and sustainability. The bamboo plywood is sourced from China where the plants are replenished regularly. "We have to pay more for it, but it is worth it to know that it is a greener product." When David shows at design fairs around the world he carts his lights, often huge installations, broken down into parts in his suitcase to avoid shipping and freight, and the carbon footprint that brings with it.

David says he is often horrified at the waste by his fellow exhibitors. "When I see the props they have brought in to dress up their stands all of which is discarded after six days, it is horrifying."

It is this philosophy which has driven David's new Seed concept. These lights are transported around the world in kitset form, which not only involves less packaging and thus requires less shipping, but gives people a chance to assemble their own work of art. "Some people say if I paid this money why should I have to make it myself but by the end they have really enjoyed it." The idea is that you receive the 'seed' of a lightshade and then make it grow yourself.

David has lived and based his business in Hawke's Bay since 1991. "If I lived in Milan or New York it just wouldn't be possible, it sucks you dry. Here the pace is slower, giving me more freedom to create."

As well as the constantly expanding lighting business, Trubridge and his team (17 staff in all) are developing new works and materials. Right now they are experimenting with a 'plastic' made from flax and plant fibres, which is more environmentally friendly than the polycarbonate they currently use.

David continues to create and produce furniture, but says further developing his lighting designs is his focus. ${\rm H}$






colour recognition

From bright red totems to evocative retro shades, winners of the second Resene Total Colour Awards were recently celebrated.





stunning range of colourful projects were entered into the recently announced Resene Total Colour Awards. Top honours went to Jasmax for its exciting and vibrant scheme for the new Albany Senior High School in Auckland. Residential projects were well represented.

The **Resene Total Colour Residential Interior Award** was won by Daniel Marshall Architects for the Corinth residence. Working with an existing 1960s home designed by the celebrated modernist architect Vladimir Cacala, the design intention was to provide modern living necessities while disturbing the existing house as little as possible.

The only exception was the kitchen, which was moved to allow this larger space to be used as an adaptable second living room, games room or as office studio space.

Judges were excited to see an architectural project use such bold colour. It is difficult to make a primary colour scheme work. The specific hue of red used (Resene Flame Red) is restless and aggressive and works particularly well with key elements of furniture.

Colours used: Resene Flame Red, Resene French Grey, Resene Gallery White, Resene Ship Grey.

The **Resene Total Colour Residential Exterior Award** went to John Mills Architects for a home that had been largely untouched since it was built in the early 1960s. When asked to bring this elegant property into the new millennium, revitalised and fresh for a family of four, the focus was to create a much bolder flow and visual connection from inside to out.

The exterior colour scheme is part of the interior and vice versa. The clients were open to strong, saturated colours that revitalised this gem of 1960s suburban culture.

The grey mid-blue (Resene Calypso) engages with the surrounding hills, which are clad in native bush, while also delivering a crisp and confident response to the beiges and greys of the surrounding houses. The colours appropriately reinforce the 1960s architecture and seem reminiscent of tints used to paint old baches, capturing the joys of the 1960s and the days of flower power, peace and hippies.

Colours used: Resene Black White, Resene Bullseye, Resene Calypso, Resene DNA, Resene Stonewall.

and the winner is ...


The overall award and winner of the education section, went to Jasmax's design for Albany Senior High School. Exciting, vibrant and strong, the colour palette highlights the architecture, while still being appropriate for an educational setting. It has energy without being overwhelming. There is an immediacy of the colour; used with black it is not overpowering.

Ten separate strong colours are introduced, one for each of the 10 learning communities. They are played off against bright carpet stripes and muted pinboard stripes. All the school's colours are then brought together in the heart of the school, the entry foyer, where they are all represented in a larger than life pixelated wall that encloses the library.

A **Resene Total Colour Residential Exterior Maestro Award** went to Pacific Environments for the Bourke House (see over), a 'campsite' of conceptual 'tents', formed as connected pavilions. Neutral interior colour provides an inviting backdrop to the exterior, with native timbers salvaged from the seashore and eclectic collections.

Splashes of red (Resene Burgundy) represent the Christmas flower of joy and celebration – a client favourite. Without this unexpected use of colour the house would appear bland. The judges admired the uniqueness of the totem effect. The use of colour brings this design feature to life and helps integrate exterior to interior.

went to Dalkie Architects for the Janssen house, which rests on the edge of an ancient river terrace looking north out over farmland to the Tasman Sea in a vast sky dominated panorama.

Conceptually the home is a piece of driftwood caught on a rock at the water's edge; its movement represented by mass flax planting to the bank. Colours are carefully chosen to reinforce this concept and to strongly reflect the local environment while simultaneously being bold enough to stand alone.

The anchoring form, or 'rock' articulated as a climbing wall accessed from the roof terrace is painted Resene Half Tapa, a warm light grey reminiscent of the base grey tone of local granite gravels. To contrast with this, the main body of the house was envisioned as a rich warm burnt orange brown, a colour glimpsed in wet timber and the local iron pan layer beneath the site.



Using eco-friendly design ideas in a new home is relatively easy but what about a renovation?

State houses are built to honour certain principles – to give anyone, no matter what their income, a quality home in which to live. Now one of those earlier homes, tucked into a quiet corner of Auckland, has been renovated to honour a different set of principles – to be as energy efficient and therefore as eco-friendly as it can be.

Early state houses were certainly solidly built, often of brick and native timbers, on generous sections. They may have been highly functional, but they sometimes weren't that comfortable, lacking insulation and good sun orientation.

Many older state houses have now passed into private ownership and have been renovated. When Eddie and Hilary van Uden planned

the renovation of their ex-state 1940s house in 2009, they chose to make it as 'green' as possible. As a way of measuring how successful their eco-renovation has been, Eddie assessed it with a new rating system called Homestar which gauges a home's energy efficiency (see box overleaf) and other sustainability features. The original house scored two out of 10 and the renovated and extended house now scores seven.

As an architectural designer with his own company Equinox Design Ltd, Eddie has had an on-going passion for 'green' building. The renovation of his own home was the ideal opportunity to show what could be done, no matter what era the house. Using eco-friendly design principles on a new home is relatively easy with the ability to incorporate features such as passive solar (sun orientation, shade control, storage masses like concrete floors or walls), cross ventilation, high-grade insulation, solar panels and more from the outset. But to retrospectively add these to an old house is more difficult.

The van Uden house was essentially a small brick box. Additions were made to the front and back to give extra living space, a home office, main bedroom and a garage. To improve wall insulation, the bricks were removed, insulation added to thicker-than-usual walls, and the entire house wrapped in a fibre-cement wall underlay and reclad in timber weatherboards.

One of Eddie's principles was to reuse as much as possible so that little waste left the site. The bricks were used to create a new driveway >

How Homestar[™] works

Homestar is a comprehensive rating system launched late last year to help homeowners create healthier, more comfortable and energy-efficient living spaces. An initiative of our building industry, Homestar[™] provides a free online assessment at www.homestar.org.nz allowing owners to assess their home's performance in comfort, health and energy-efficiency.

If the house doesn't achieve a minimum performance level in core areas of overall warmth and comfort (specifically the ability for the house to achieve healthy winter-time temperatures without using excessive energy), Homestar[™] will provide suggestions on how to make the home healthier and more comfortable, as well as being kinder to the environment.

Some suggestions may involve simple actions that involve little or no cost, while others may involve investments that will pay for themselves through lower running costs or other benefits to the household. To gain a higher star rating the homeowner needs to address the core issues highlighted in the initial assessment, and then reassess the house once the changes have been made.

Homestar[™] was developed by a joint venture between BRANZ. Beacon Pathway and the New Zealand Green Building Council with the support of the building industry and key Government agencies, the Department of Building and Housing and the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority. Homestar[™] is officially supported by industry partners, including Resene, and is also working with industry organisations such as Certified Builders, Registered Master Builders, the Designers Institute of NZ, and the Concrete and Cement Association of NZ, amongst others.

and paths, and to build raised vegetable gardens. All soil excavated from the foundations was reused on site. The old roof tiles, timber joinery, hot water cylinder and oven were sold on TradeMe.

Most of the demolition plasterboard was buried on site. All of the old concrete from the driveway and paths was either used as fill under the concrete slabs or buried on site. The old kitchen cabinets were reused in the new workshop at the back of the garage.

A key goal was to incorporate passive solar design. The additions were built on solid concrete foundations and the floor slabs covered with tiles, which gives the vital solid mass required to capture the sun's warmth during the day, and slowly release it at night.

Big sliding doors and windows were added to the north-facing side of the house to let in as much sun as possible, with the house eaves built to the right depth so that hot summer sun is blocked yet winter sun is allowed in. Says Eddie: "It's such a comfortable house. In summer indoor temperatures stay below 25°C even when outside temperatures reach 29°C. On sunny days in mid-winter, the living area temperatures seldom drop below 20°C, even if it is below 10°C outside. The house is much drier and there's never any condensation on the windows."

All window joinery is now double-glazed, water tanks were installed to collect rain water to use in the toilets and garden, solar panels were added to help heat the water, a wood burner installed and energy efficient appliances chosen.

Timber ceiling battens were used; steel battens are now more common but transfer electromagnetic fields throughout the house as lighting wiring is draped over them, says Eddie.



scheme on a concept design and thought it was very successful. Hilary also liked it. Then we chose the carpet for the library and main bedroom to match the Resene Pohutukawa."

The 'green' approach also extended outside, with a back garden now dominated by fruit trees and raised vegetable gardens. Two fruitladen persimmon trees grow alongside the deck while the original rotary clothesline lazily spins in a sunny corner.

The van Uden's electricity use now averages less than 10kwh a day (which includes running a home office) with a total consumption of less than 3600kwh for the first year. This is less than half the average for a normal two-person household. "We're now cosy and content," laughs Eddie.

Average water consumption is down to 170 litres per day (Watercare states two-person households as averaging between 225 and 401 litres a day).

That champion of the state house movement, the first Labour Prime Minister Michael Joseph Savage, would no doubt approve. H

The philosophy for this fun room is the option to 'push' the buttons when it is a time to relax, or 'play' when you want to, well, play! I wanted to give this room a strong personality, and make it into a family-friendly, television-watching space. As a place to not only watch the television (which takes centre stage on the far wall, in a shelving unit) but to also play interactive games, the furniture needed to be simple but also out of the way. A big bold chaise-style sofa is joined by side tables rather than a central coffee table. A second set of shelves sits behind the sofa for books, a cup of coffee or glass of wine. 



The reasoning behind this scheme is to create a clean contemporary space with enough neutral colour to help warm the interior and help blend it together. The strength and contrast of the wall colouring in Resene Nero and Resene Eighth Thorndon Cream is complemented with some of the darker furniture pieces and yet softened with cushion and rug selections. The sofa colour and finish adds interest in an otherwise neutral scheme. This is a sophisticated interior for the professional couple who like just a bit of glamour in their lives.

making it easy

fter 27 years of being in a wheelchair, Phillip Blundell knew what he wanted in an ideal home. Admittedly during this time he had retrofitted several to make acceptable dwellings but to achieve this required constant compromise with unsightly ramps and whole areas being out of bounds simply because making them wheelchair accessible was unfeasible.

-

It wasn't until some years ago that he decided to build new for the next stage of his and his wife Helen's life. "We'd been thinking for years of what would make the perfect house for someone in my position, and reading through the BRANZ publication *Homes Without Barriers* got me thinking really hard about what I needed. Also building new meant I would be able to indulge my love of a wide horizon. Growing up in Napier that had always been there, but living in the Hutt area didn't allow the same open space opportunities."

However a bit of searching turned up a new subdivision in Silverstream, where Phillip and Helen were able to buy a site with allday sun and wide views out to the snow-tipped Rimutaka Ranges in one direction and across bush-covered valleys in the other. Working with Bosnian-born architect Davor Mikulcic from Studio MWA in Wellington, who in Phillip's words "threw his heart and soul into the project" the long design process was begun.

Phillip decided that to be truly suitable, his new home had to adhere to the five key principles of Lifetime Design (see box at right), as designated by the worldwide Lifemark movement. A key one of these is that the house should be on one level and be easily accessed from the chief mode of exterior transport, in Phillip's case, his car.

By offering the trademarked Lifemark seal of approval, Lifetime Design (which is supported by Resene) aims to raise public awareness of the desirability of homes that have the capacity to work for their inhabitants either over a lifetime of changing needs, or for varying

Usability: Design should allow for safe, uncomplicated use by users of differing ages and abilities.

Adaptability: Design should be able to be cost effectively and simply adapted to meet changing or differing needs.

Accessibility: All users can easily access their home from the outside and move freely within all parts of it.

Inclusion: A well-designed home should be inclusive for all its users, regardless of age, size or mobility, and should ensure that no group is segregated from the rest.

Lifetime value: Good design for either housing or products should be financially accessible and should add value to the residence over time, both in terms of user friendliness and the cost savings engendered, and thus ultimately to the resale value.

groups of users regardless of age or physical ability. It's not just for those in wheelchairs. This seal of approval is given only to properties that meet the worldwide Lifemark movement's exacting standards of accessibility and adaptability, and is awarded only after a rigorous independent peer review process.

What eventuated was a multi award-winning piece of architecture with around 270sq m of floor area and more than 300sq m of decking and raised wheel chair-accessible gardens plus internal triple car garaging. It took four years of meticulous planning and construction, but was worth it.

Says Phillip: "In every possible way this is a home that works wonderfully for me and, of course, for Helen, but it could just as well be a family home where the children were all very young, or for that matter where there are teenagers around. My son has even announced that this is the house he wants to inherit one day." It has the fairly standard specification with three/four bedrooms, two bathrooms, formal and informal living spaces and a streamlined kitchen. It's just that extra attention has been paid to wheelchair accessibility.

But practicalities aside, stand-out features for Phillip abound. Chief amongst these are the cleverly angled roof lines which allow the polished concrete floors to act as passive heat sinks in winter while shading the interiors in summer, the extra-wide cavity slider doorways and the elegant detailing that gives no indication that this is a home designed for a client with special needs. "We have all day sun and wonderful open views, and the design is such that I will be able to live here as long as any able bodied person could hope for. Getting the Lifemark seal of approval from Lifetime Design just confirmed what I already knew from living in it." H

th its fresh-toned wall of Resene Pacifika green and curvaceous bath taking its dress circle position in front of the window, this bathroom is now a haven for its Auckland owners.

Unsure what to do with the small L-shaped bathroom of their 15-yearold house, Sarah and David Morton turned to friend and interior designer Liz Kerby. She suggested increasing the size of the room by incorporating part of an adjacent linen cupboard and embracing the house's location on a slope of native bush adjoining a harbourside reserve by bringing some of that green inside. The colour also echoes Sarah and David's love of the subtropical resort style.

Other walls and the ceiling in the room were kept neutral in Resene Black White, so as not to overpower the space. The only window in the room is small and tucked around the corner, and with the mix of subtropical and native bush outside, any light that does come in is quite diffuse and soft.

Another problem was that the bathroom could be seen as soon as visitors walked in the front door. When the room was increased in size, the door was relocated to deflect that sightline. Now, any glimpse is of the luscious green wall and a peek of curved bath.

The green wall highlights the outline of the bath in a way a neutral colour could never do. That bath has been a key component for the owners after Sarah spotted it at a local bathroomware showroom. "I had to have it," she says. It was the sort of conviction necessary considering the lengths the couple had to go to. Their house has no drive-on access, just a timber boardwalk winding down to it amongst the trees from the road above. The heavy bath had to be carried >

Mirror mirror

Although Sarah and Dave's oval mirror looks great with this scheme, Sarah plans to replace it soon with something more decorative. These tips from Christchurchbased Trendy Mirrors could help:

- For darker and smaller areas use a large mirror to add light and the perception of space.
- To get an idea of the size and shape you need, cut a template out of newspaper to hold against the wall. For size symmetry, compare against the vanity width, window framing or shower height for alignment.
- How high should a vanity mirror hang? Measure up from the basin 150-200mm and add sufficient height to accommodate all members of your household. Normally about 900-1000mm is enough.
- For double basins, use two individual heated mirrors for a contemporary finish. If you want to increase natural lighting and the perception of space, one long mirror is best.
- Shaped mirrors add character and balance, and are especially suited to a pedestal vanity and a bathroom with square lines.
- Vertical side lights give the best light reflection and effect.

down by about eight men, and the floor of the bathroom had to be reinforced to take its weight. "It's not just the bath of course, but once you fill it with water and put my husband in it, it's seriously heavy," says Sarah.

The bath is positioned for a view of the treetops and sky outside the bathroom window. While these baths are often seen as centerpieces in large spaces, in this situation the free-standing bath makes this more compact space seem larger. A boxed-in bath would be much more visually and physically intrusive.

Liz used other visual devices to make the room appear more spacious, such as a wall-hung vanity, large floor tiles and a glass-walled shower. The toilet and glass-walled shower are tucked discretely behind the door. The shower is larger than normal with a normal showerhead as well as a rainhead.

The vanity is custom-made out of rosewood veneer with a top of black granite. The oval top-mounted basin echoes the shape of the bath, as does the simple mirror on the wall above.

Liz chose an unusual ochre-coloured grout for the floor tiles to echo tones from outside the window, namely the rust-coloured undersides of the leaves from a large magnolia.

Says Sarah: "It's a magical place, with the candles lit, a real haven." ${f H}$

the **backdrop** colour question

The widely held view is that art looks better on white walls. But is that always the case?

he theory goes that art looks better on white walls – it apparently allows the art to stand out, and for the eye not to be distracted by the coloured walls behind.

But it isn't necessarily so! Some recent exhibitions around the country have showcased the vitality and impact which results from acting fearlessly with colour. One of these, an exhibition simply titled *Colour*, staged last year in two venues in Wanganui, used 11 distinctly coloured spaces to explore the feelings produced by art against the different backdrops.

The Northland Society of Arts' Reyburn House Gallery has also taken the colour principle seriously. David Cunis, the society's gallery technician, sees neutral walls as both boring and out-dated, minimising rather than maximising the art's impact. The society's chairman, David Procter, agrees that hanging art against a rich colour often works wonders.

The same principles can be used at home. Approach your own 'artwork styling' by taking stock. Examine each space's character, scale, >

setting, lighting, and reflective properties. This sounds complicated, but a little thought and planning can have a fabulous result.

Next, ask yourself whether you adore those artworks you own. Just because some painting was handed down to you doesn't mean you have to display it! Life is too short to look at things you don't cherish.

So – here's the fun bit – what is it that you really adore in art and life? What moods or themes would you like your own spaces to evoke? Why not reflect these passions? If you want to remind yourself of a specific place or create a certain atmosphere, you can do so through art. Other possessions can always be stored, given away, or sold! If you have admired artworks you've seen in a particular café or while on a wonderful holiday, commission or buy something similar. Your surroundings should psychologically lift you.

You may have totally differently themed artworks assigned to different rooms. Each room can have its own distinctive feel. Think about those rooms in relationship to the artworks. Could the colour or treatment of the walls be changed to better suit?

Some people work in the opposite way. They'll 'inherit' a certain interior wall colour, and then find artworks which they think will suit the colours. It may work, but do this and you may never truly love your surroundings!

Why not experiment with different wall settings by painting different

coloured Resene testpots onto large pieces of paper? Try A3-sized pieces of card, and place these behind the artworks you intend to display in each space. Now cast a critical eye over the colour in its setting. Does it work with the current amount of light? How does it look against what's beyond the windows?

Will this background colour calm you down? Or rev you up? Which feelings would you rather experience daily?

Take a look at the stunning colours in Whangarei's Reyburn House, on the previous page. Do you like the feel of strong colour contrasted against other strong colours, or would you prefer the rooms to be graduations of similar basic tones? Maybe you'd prefer just one definitely hued wall in each space, with a certain grouping of themed artworks hung here.

Curator and public programmes manager of Wanganui's Sarjeant Gallery, Greg Donson thoroughly enjoys using strong background colour. A recent show titled *Song of the Woods* focused on trees, and therefore featured a leafy green (Resene Grass Hopper) painted backdrop.

Greg finds that "quiet, unassuming artworks" can receive more attention against a coloured wall. Such artworks, on cream, would "get lost," he says.

"Selecting a colour provides drama and draws attention. You



shouldn't match a wall colour too closely to a major tone within an artwork, though, as this can look too contrived. What you're after is a tone which enhances but won't overpower the works," he says.

Auckland auction house Art + Object often repaint their walls in strong colour (electric pink, yellow, sleek silvery grey) for different exhibitions to utterly change the way people view an artwork.

Director of art Ben Plumbly cautions against using too bold a colour that will drain the life out of artworks. Sometimes, he says he'll take his cues from background colours in the artworks to be displayed. He says you know you've been successful when the art appears bigger and more substantial, rather than weaker, smaller or more pallid.

Finally, if you've painted a wall for particular artworks, and don't love the result, it may be an issue of visual balance, or too many focal points. Try subtracting room items. Add black or white accessories, ceilings or floors. These may 'ground' or lighten your scheme so it all looks right. Switch paintings around. Your eye should be the final judge! H

top tips

Art placement advice, courtesy of the galleries:

Don't be afraid to experiment. Everyone loves seeing art against solid colour, rather than white or cream. Hang it no higher than general eye level.

Having two or three strongly coloured walls to choose from means more of your pieces can have the perfect backdrop. For instance, a dark-blue-toned piece with no frame will disappear against a similarly dark backdrop, but will zing against a yellow wall.

Take your cues from the art itself but also the size and light of a space.

Contrasting art against different colours of similar 'weight' or 'depth' is a good thing, visually pushing a picture out.

Don't be timid. Create bits of theatre with strong colour, even if it presents more of a challenge when styling your home. Remember, more lighting might be required for optimal effect. Your everyday backdrop can become a whole lot more exciting.

And if you do end up deciding that white suits you best, try something with a touch of black in it, such as Resene Black White, which will add more depth.

Kitchens and cooking have never been so sexy and exciting, thanks to new technology and design.

he technology and quality of the kitchen and its latest cooking appliances is of such importance to us these days that it has been known to break or make a house sale – such is the powerful impact of a room which used to be totally enclosed and produced only meat and three vegetable dinners.


Thankfully we've come a long way from the humble coil ring and over-boiled cabbage. Today's cooking appliances are statements of contemporary design and style as well as the latest computerised technology, providing an extensive choice for your individual needs and preferences. There's a trend toward more frequently cooking at home as we save on restaurant bills and try to imitate the contestants on MasterChef. But by providing for the family during the week, and entertaining in the weekend, we demand a lot from our cooking appliances. In response, today's appliances are become increasingly technologically sophisticated but easier to use.

We want appliances that offer versatility of use and are ecologically responsible, achieving the highest energy and water use standards. We want appliances that reflect who we are – whether through an oven which automatically records our most frequently cooked meals like a 'favourites' section on an iPod, or through innovative design rich aesthetics.

Pyrolitic ovens are increasing in popularity as they don't need cleaning with harsh chemicals, leaving more time to do what you really enjoy – not cleaning ovens.

During the pyrolitic self-cleaning cycle, the oven is heated to about 480°C, reducing any fatty deposits to a thin layer of ash, which can be wiped away with a damp cloth.

In a similar vein, Eco-Clean liners are a world first from Bosch, offering a highly efficient

Other new technologies include the infrawave speed oven and the halogen cooker – both boasting cooking times up to 50 percent faster than conventional ovens.

Stephen Bruce, Fisher & Paykel's product marketing manager, says the kitchen is more than just a room – it's the heart and soul of the home. "People want kitchen appliances for mid week convenience, and at the weekend their requirements change because of the trend toward eating in, or they may want to treat themselves by creating a masterpiece in the kitchen."

One of the latest conceptual developments from Electrolux in induction cooking is the Rendez-vous' table, which extends the idea of a multi-functional piece of furniture. This technology not only allows friends and family to congregate around a stylish and functional table, but also enables them to cook with pots placed anywhere on the table surface – thanks to the technology of induction cooking.

This is done by creating sensors that tell the inductors where the pot is and then heats it. Because induction generates heat directly to the cookware and minimises residual heat in the actual surface, someone could be sitting beside the cooking, reading a magazine on the same surface.

Induction cooktop technology is widely recognised as one of the quickest, safest and most efficient methods. Induction heating relies on creating a controlled electromagnetic field, which requires magnetic based cookware.

Glass, aluminium, copper or ceran pots are not suitable, but to check, hold a magnet to the base of the cookware. If it sticks, you can use the pot.

Research is continuing into the use of copper and aluminium, and while this is currently being tested in a very limited way in Japan, a successful commercial application is still some time away.

Troy Hinchco, Electrolux's category manager of food preparation, says: "Products like the Rendez-vous' give us an opportunity to climb into our customer's future, a future with consumer needs that don't exist yet. Possibly the most noticeable advances in technology will be in the user interface between the appliance and the user. Controlled units will evolve to being even more intuitive, easier to use and complement their frequent users' cooking habits more effectively."

Now we just need one of those clever MasterChef people to come and use the appliances for us. ${\bf H}$



boxing clever

This cool multi-purpose trunk is finished in timber stains for a slightly weathered effect.





You will need:

Note that the timber cutting list and the final size of the trunk will vary according to the plank sizes available at your timber merchant.

- 140mm x 18mm planks (we used dressed timber but you can also use rough-sawn) cut into the following lengths for a trunk that measures 1200mm long x 540mm deep x 623mm high:
- 8 planks at 1200mm long for the front and back
- 8 planks at 504mm long for the ends
- 4 planks at 1220mm long for the lid
- Either use four more planks at 1164mm long for the base or use a piece of chipboard or plywood measuring 1164mm x 504mm. We used 10mm thick plywood.
- 25mm x 25mm battens for the inside corners: 4 at 520mm long
- 25mm x 25mm battens for framing the plywood base, two 1164mm long and two 454mm long

- Two 65mm x 18mm battens at 530mm long for the underside of the lid
- Two 45mm x 45mm battens at 530mm long for the feet
- Resene Waterborne Woodsman timber stain in colours of your choice. We used two testpots of Resene Woody Bay (dark); two testpots of Resene Skywater (mid-tone) and 1 litre of Resene Weathered Grey (light).
- Wood screws, galvanised or stainless steel (25mm, 40mm and 65mm)
- Electric drill
- Square
- Sanding block and sheets of 120-grit sandpaper
- 50mm paint brush
- Card or thin plastic to use as spacers and to mask
- Two galvanised strap hinges and two galvanised trunk handles

step by step

Step 1 >

Fix 25mm x 25mm battens around the underside of the plywood base.

Lay the end planks (550mm lengths) in two sets of four and screw 25mm x 25mm battens to the edges to hold the planks together, using two screws per plank. If you are doing a striped pattern like ours, you will need to slip a piece of card or thin plastic between each plank as a spacer (later on you will use the card to separate the planks to 'mask' the adjacent plank when staining). If you are doing the entire box one colour or individual sides the same colour, don't worry about the spacer.

Attach the ends to the base with screws along the bottom edge.

Build up the front and back by attaching one 1200mm plank to the base and bottom of the batten, using two screws for each end of the plank. Then add the other three planks on the front and back.

Attach the feet to the underside of the base.

Step 2 >

Make the lid by screwing the 65mm x 18mm battens across the underside of the longest (1220mm) planks, making sure to fix the battens so the lid will close neatly.

If you have used dressed timber, give the box a light sand with 120-grit sandpaper. This will allow the stain to penetrate better and give a more transparent look.





Step 4 v

Attach the lid to the rest of the trunk with the strap hinges. Screw the trunk handles to both ends.

< Step 3

Apply the stain in whatever pattern or style you want. With stain, you won't be able to use masking tape to mask off an area as you do with paint as the stain will bleed into the timber and under the tape.

We chose to use the planks for individual colours, sliding a piece of card or plastic between each plank to stop the stain from spreading onto the adjacent plank.

keeping it **safe**

It's not just locks and alarms that can keep your home safe this summer.



fence to let burglars

hether it's a large estate on the edge of a forest, or a tiny apartment in a happening part of the CBD, your own pad functions a bit like a personal security blanket. Which is why the experience of being burgled or intruded upon is so disquieting.

If you are about to enter the design phase for your new abode or its landscaping, why not incorporate features which deter criminals?

The idea that design is a successful deterrent to crime is not new. Several decades ago it was dubbed CPTED, or Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design. City and regional councils routinely adopt CPTED principles to make their public parks, reserves and commercial spaces as safe as possible.

Start by thinking like a criminal intruder. What opportunities does your home present? Does it have a creepy, over-grown ambience? Are big trees or shrubs obscuring views of your windows or doors from the street? Is your garden dark and solitary at night? Or is it well-lit, overlooked by the neighbours, and easily seen from the street?

Having a well-maintained property sends out signals which deter intruders. This is called Broken Windows Theory, in which vandals can see an unkempt property as an invitation to do further damage. An obvious demeanour of pride in your place says you're likely to be here often, and be aware of unexpected changes.

Christchurch landscape architect Graham Densem is well-versed in the principles of safe design. After recent involvement in the safe design of Canterbury's alpine village, Castle Hill, he is keen to preserve unobstructed sight-lines. In Castle Hill, the lack of residential fencing, with reserves threaded throughout

Holiday security... the final checklist

- Close and lock all doors and windows, and don't have hidden keys anywhere obvious outside.
- Televisions and computers shouldn't be visible from outside: hide them.
- Lock away official personal documents and financial details along with door and car keys – make these impossible to find by anyone but you and yours.
- Arrange to have newspaper deliveries stopped, and for neighbours to clear your letterbox and mow the front lawn if you'll be away for long.
- Never leave a message on the answer phone or social media such as Facebook about being away.

the housing, serves to provide this, as well as lending a rural community feel.

"Being seen doing a criminal act is not high on a malevolent person's list of priorities," says Graham.

Fellow landscape architect Andrew Craig agrees that preserving uninterrupted sightlines over your property is an age-old security principle. "It's the prospect/refuge theory which says humanity likes to sit on the edges looking inward, watching for both prospective threats and social/romantic opportunities. If these seating spots are warm, sheltered and with an open visual aspect, security is enhanced."

In a domestic setting, why not make use of passing traffic as a surveillance asset? It's actually beneficial to avoid long stretches of solid, high fencing, particularly between the house and street. Why not use wrought iron and personally design its lines for a distinctive effect? This has the added bonus of not being a typical tagging target.

Perceiving anew

Go out to the street and try to 'see' your home for the first time from every vantage point. Which way appears to take you to the main entry? Could you further clarify this main entrance? Does it look well maintained today? Could an intruder break in, completely unseen? Could high bushes be culled or thinned? Interestingly, research reveals that outdoor spaces with trees are seen as significantly more attractive, safer, and usable than gardens without, so don't get rid of trees altogether.

Do the same check at daybreak and nightfall. Would extra sensor lighting help make entrances, exits, and burglar alarm signs highly visible, no matter when? Are there shadowy areas in your garden? Some help with lighting now may pay dividends in future, to avoid glare or blind spots. It's often better to use several light fixtures of lower intensity, placed at exactly the right height, to illuminate visitors' faces.

If you have back or side gardens, it's always a good idea to have a locking gate between these and the front of your home.

Do you have ground floor windows that can't be seen from the road or neighbours? Why not plant some low, thorny bushes underneath to discourage entry? Climbing (barbed) roses are so pretty, no-one will suspect your ulterior motive.

The scaffolding effect

If you have been burgled in the past, could it be because there's access to roofs or upper levels? Could you alter the design so there isn't? Also, if your property bounds a public alley-way, that's where the fencing should be solid, without footholds or views through. Where your fences are shared with neighbours, open-style shoulder-height fencing is probably the most secure, sociable option.

Counter-intuitively perhaps, CPTED principles don't suggest you use barbed wire atop your fences. That's because these seem to suggest there'll be no-one home watching.

You don't want to appear paranoid about security; just proud of owning and maintaining a quality home. H



return to eden

After a barren dirt garden in their Nigerian home, this family wanted to immerse themselves in colour and greenery.

did you know...

hat's one of the first things you do when returning from a four-year expatriate posting in Nigeria? Well, if you're Aucklander Jane McRae, you set about creating a magical garden retreat incorporating palms and native plants, bright colours and lots of bird-enticing elements.

"I'd been living overseas in a third-world country and I just wanted to come home and have a garden," she explains. "At our house in Port Harcourt, Nigeria, the outdoor area was focused around a playground for the kids to enjoy. It was all dirt with nothing green, so when we came back I really wanted to plant things again."

Jane and her partner extensively renovated their Hillsborough home overlooking the Manukau Harbour to create an environment the family could continue to enjoy as their primary school-age children grew into teenagers.

Along with remodelling the house, they also tackled the barren wedge-shaped piece of land on the southeast seaward side of the house, enlisting the help of landscape designer Tania Barke from Through the Garden Gate.

Tania and Jane worked closely together. Jane's scrapbook of ideas included pictures of water features, specific plants, outdoor fireplaces,

paving stones and flowing steps – all of which helped Tania understand her client's vision.

"The scrapbook was a fantastic starting point," says Tania. "But we then had to fit Jane's ideas to the site and the conditions, and marry the garden to the house. It's a very narrow space that steps down from the house. We filled and lifted the site, and the wedge shape of the garden dictated to a large degree what we could do with it. Being a small space, too many elements would have been confusing."

Because the garden is also in shadow all winter and is exposed to strong on-shore winds, the plants had to be wind and salt tolerant.

Low maintenance and privacy were Jane's key requirements. And, of course, there was also the inclusion of the colour orange. Two tones – Resene Sorbus and Resene Grenadier – were used to paint the curved plastered walls and provide the perfect counterbalance to the lush foliage.

"Some of the neighbours were a bit sceptical at first," admits Jane, "but orange and green are beautiful together." Tania agrees: "The orange is stunning and vibrant, and it just calls you out into the garden. Even in winter this garden is enticing from the house." The plant palette Tania chose also includes red, white and a smattering

of purple. And the family pet Snowcone, a rainbow lorikeet, also adds to the vibrancy.

Jane had clear native plant favourites, including nikau, king palms and cabbage trees, which are planted in three 'islands' with sago palms and green mondo grass. Tania offset all this green with the richly coloured Caruba Black and Purpurea cabbage trees, Platt's Black flax and dark bromeliads to complement the Resene Waterborne Woodsman stain tinted to Resene Treehouse on the cedar details of the house.

A karaka tree adds height at the seaward end of the orange feature walls. The other end is lined with a row of fruit-laden mandarin, lime and feijoa trees above a fragrant bank of star jasmine. Philodendron xanadu grows beneath the orange-stemmed dypsis palms that flank the eye-catching custom-made chiminea fireplace.

Irises and liriope musacari add a dash of purple, while native heritage flaxes and grey-green oioi reeds complement the dwarf pohutukawa and the titoki that provide privacy along the boundary fence. Wind-



tolerant Poor Knights lilies add an abundance of crimson bottle-brush flowers, to which the birds flock.

Stepping up from the garden, a paved patio connects to the covered deck and downstairs living area. Table and chairs sit next to a rectangular fishpond with a minimalist water feature – a chute made from glass coated in Resene Kabul to match the painted wall behind. Further on is the children's playhouse.

Says Jane. "The kids can run around the trees, make trails between the flaxes and there are small zones and hiding spots everywhere. They have the pool on the other side of the house in summer and their playhouse, and they can toast marshmallows in the chiminea. The oval amphitheatre is also the perfect place for their shows."

As well as doing virtually all of the planting herself, Jane has added her own personal touches: wind chimes, ceramic leaf-shaped wall art, a Thai spirit house to welcome good karma into the garden and a lime-green bird bath and tall wooden feeding platform to entice native birds into this magical space. **H**

Jennie van der Valk of Artworks Landscapes suggests this alternative scheme:

This design is influenced by the arches and curves already used in the landscape. At its heart is a sweeping koru form made from pavers interplanted with Chatham Island fescue. This koru connects the garden's two main focal points – the water feature of plaster (in Resene Cocoa Bean) and gabion walls, and the cabbage tree sculpture. Both of these are lit up at night along with the 44-gallon drums (painted in Resene Dynamite) which have cutouts on the side to allow light to shine out from within. Low maintenance native plants are used to provide extra colour and form.



an ode to the Islamic paradise garden



Landscape designer **Nicky Samuel** suggests this alternative scheme:

Reminiscent of the walled Islamic paradise garden style, this design features a water rill to create a cooling effect on hot summer nights. Raised planters in each corner are finished in Resene Float, with dwarf magnolia trees underplanted with a riot of plants with cream, blue and white flowers, as well as fragrant plants like roses, stock and herbs. Enclosing the space are Panelrok walls painted in Resene Cream Can, with mock tile details in Resene Float, Resene Black Sheep and Resene Moxie. A relatively new technological advance in landscaping, a green wall, is used behind the whimsical fountain and provides more space on the ground plane. Built-in seating uses Panelrok's Knotwood and gives a place to rest.

cool plant lavels

Use Resene paint stirrers, seed packets and your own artistic skill for these funky vege and here labels.

Hand-painted labels

You will need:

- White card, pencil, ruler, scissors and hole punch
- Resene testpots in Resene Neva, Resene Hi Jinx and Resene Clowning Around, and a Resene testpot brush
- Variety of paint brushes
- 45cm slimline pointed canes (we bought ours from Kings Plant Barn)
- Access to a laminator (most copy shops will do this for you)

Also for seed packet labels:

- Seed packets and glue sticl
- Resene testpots in Resene Bright Spark, Resene Grass Stain and Resene Rocket



Resene Dizzy Lizzy

Step 1

Take the white card and measure up three rectangles 13.5cm x 10cm and cut them out. Use the Resene testpot brush to brush on a sweep of paint using Resene Neva, Resene Hi Jinx and Resene Clowning Around, one per card. Take some spare card and have a practice painting the vegetables you chose.





Step 2

Once the background paint has dried, take the lime Resene Neva card, and paint on pea pods using Resene Grass Stain for the pod outline and Resene Dizzy Lizzy for the peas. Take the purple Resene Clowning Around card, and use Resene Hi Jinx for the carrots and Resene Dizzy Lizzy for the carrot tops. On the Resene Hi Jinx card use Resene Neva to paint broccoli.



Step 3

Wait for the paint to dry thoroughly, then take the cards to be laminated. Measure a 1cm border round each, then cut them out.





Step 4

Use the hole punch to make a hole in the centre of the top and bottom of each card, then run the cane through the holes as shown.

For the seed packet labels

Measure three rectangles of 13.5 cm x 10 cm on the white card and cut them out. Cut out the front of the seed packet from the seeds you are raising and measure a rectangle of 6 cm x 9 cm around the name and picture. Cut out. Glue the seed packet on to the white card as shown.

Paint rough brushstrokes around each seed packet using the Resene testpots. Repeat steps 3 and 4 for the hand-painted vege labels to finish.

Measure out a rectangle of 2.5cm x 3.5cm from the picture part of the tag and cut it out. Turn the Resene paint stirrer to the unprinted side, with the flat end at the top, and nail the plastic tag to the top of the stirrer as shown.



Step 2

Hand print in capital letters, the matching name of the herb onto the stirrer, then use Resene Grass Stain to hand paint the letters onto the stirrer.

Wearable paint

I have used Resene paint not on the walls but to dye fabric. Depending how dark you want the finished article to be, you water down the paint to a ratio of about one part paint to five parts water. For pastels, use a one to 10 ratio. One testpot is usually enough for a large piece of fabric or article of clothing. Mix in a large bowl or bucket and immerse the cloth, squeeze and agitate the mixture, lifting occasionally to check all the fabric has been exposed to the colour. After five minutes or so, squeeze the fluid from the fabric and dry outdoors on the washing line. When dry, leave the fabric for five to seven days then wash in a washing machine with detergent; this won't remove the colour but will soften the fabric. Cotton is more absorbent that synthetic material but most fabrics can be dyed this way. I only use Resene paints as the pigment seems more reliable and colourfast.

Does your roof need a repaint? Why not help the environment and paint it white?

mbracing eco-friendly principles can seem tricky if it is complicated or costly. Now there's a measure that's simple but effective. It's painting your roof white, and usually involves no extra cost during regular maintenance.

The idea is slowly catching on as one of the fastest and cheapest ways to help reduce global warming by mimicking the way that the polar icecaps reflect sunlight back into space and cool the planet. Buildings without air conditioning also benefit by being cooler and more pleasant to inhabit in summer, according to local campaigner lan Montanjees. Those with air conditioners use less electricity.

When sunlight falls on a white roof, much if it is reflected back into space, whereas when sunlight falls on a dark roof, much of it is absorbed and converted into heat. This heat is blocked from passing back into space because it is absorbed by greenhouse gases in the atmosphere.

Says lan: "The White Roofs Project is an immediate action plan that people can do themselves or that can be organised on a national level, as a win-win solution. While many people have a feeling of helplessness about what they can personally do about reducing global warming, when they see people, business, and governments being slow to take the necessary steps, the white roofs idea gives us a positive action plan that we can do ourselves without having to wait for others to act."

Scientific research has shown that a flat white roof measuring 100 sq m (the size of a modest house) reflects enough sunlight to cancel the global warming of about 10 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions (roughly that put out by 2.5 cars over one year).

Ian isn't alone in his passion for white roofs. The US Secretary of Energy Dr Steven Chu, a Nobel Prize winning physicist, is a supporter and the Obama administration is now painting federal roofs white (in America, the movement is called 'cool roofs'). The Mayor of New York's cool roofs campaign has passed the one millionth square foot of white roof and attracted partnerships with local well-known businesses. There is now a Cool Roofs Project co-financed by the European Union in countries like the UK, Greece, Italy, and France.

White roofs have been used here not just on houses but also on large buildings like the Sylvia Park Shopping Centre in Auckland. The off-white Auckland International Airport roof is another well-known example. www.whiteroofs.org.nz. **H**

When white's not alright

A white roof won't be suitable for every home. If your roof is overlooked by a neighbour who might find a white roof too bright, then use a deeper tint of off-white or consider a darker colour using Resene Summit Roof CoolColour paint.

When town planning regulations in some areas only allow for dark roof colours that blend in with the bush, darker shades of Resene CoolColour paint offer a valuable alternative. While this paint is not as reflective as pure white paint, it is significantly more reflective than standard paint of the same colour due to special pigments that reflect more of the sun's energy, keeping your roof cooler.

A Resene CoolColour option is also ideal if you want to improve the amount of heat your roof reflects but don't like the thought of having a pure white roof as part of your exterior colour scheme.
